- Strategies path to reach those targets
- Actions specifics of how to travel the path
- Tracking tracking goals to determine how close we are to target

Sector goals should be SMART:

• Specific:

- Be specific to **the community's priorities** and **ability to influence** the emissions reduction strategy or action (but not limiting); and
- Be set for specific metrics that are understood by the public and would contribute to the overall goal (generally, not specified with a GHG emission reduction target)
- Measurable: Be measurable based on available data
- Attainable: Be attainable if in the short term
- Results-Oriented: Support target year goal & focus on larger sectors (not strategies)
- **Time-Bound:** Set a specific **timeframe** to achieve the goal

Natural Resources – What We Heard/Proposed New Action

- Natural Resources Goal is a SECTOR BASED goal.
- Strategy 12, and its Actions 12a and 12b, are in CECAP regardless of SECTOR BASED GOAL.
 - Strategy 12: Support preservation, restoration, and expansion of natural systems and green spaces
 - Action 12a: Conservation of existing tree canopy and green spaces
 - Action 12b: Expansion of green spaces and tree canopy
 - Natural resource considerations are also woven throughout the report in other strategies and actions.
- Feedback received: Desire for comprehensive approach for Natural Resources plan with Climate Focus
- Suggestion for new Action (Action 12c): "Cross-disciplinary county staff team to analyze existing programs and policies across county to evaluate where climate change and natural resources intersect, and what can be added or strengthen to create a comprehensive climate (mitigation plus adaptation/resiliency) approach."

RNG Discussion

- What is Renewable Natural Gas (RNG)?
 - Pipeline gas that is equivalent to natural gas in its makeup and uses.
 - Common sources are from landfills, animal waste, wastewater plants, food waste and a variety of other feedstocks.
- How does it differ from natural gas?
 - It is derived from organic or biological sources, not fossil sources.
 - Considered carbon neutral (or close to it) because it comes from sources that once absorbed carbon dioxide
 from the atmosphere during photosynthesis through the natural carbon cycle.
- Other Considerations
 - Uses existing distribution systems and infrastructure. Tends to be a cost-effective way to decarbonize certain types of uses.
 - Some processes are very hard to electrify (industrial uses, heating in some large commercial buildings).

Revisit Transportation EV Sector-Based Goal Percentage

Reasons for New EV Percentage

- Modeling originally completed in October/November...since that time
 - New federal administration
 - Several car manufacturer announcements (Ford being the latest)
 - Several states have announced a ban on gasoline car sales by 2035-2040 (California, Massachusetts)
 - Strong post pandemic recover with a strong EV market
- In March 2021, Virginia became a ZEV state.
- Several reports outlined opportunities for larger EV numbers
 - The Virginia EV Incentive Working Group
 - EV adoption
- ICF reviewed modeling following May meeting
