


Children have increasing mental health needs


Protective factors associated with reduced risk


Children and Youth referred to STBH in the past 3 years

Top 5 zip codes (40% of referrals) are from:




These zip codes have between 10% to 33% of children living under poverty level.





Fairfax-Falls Church Children's Services Act (CSA) Program



CSA provides intensive interventions. It was designed for children who are:

- System-Involved
- Require behavioral health services and supports that are inaccessible or unavailable.



Overview of CSA

- The Children's Services Act is law unique to Virginia enacted in 1993
- Exemplifies SAMHSA's System of Care model to integrate services across agency silos to **better** serve at-risk youth and families
- CSA balances two key components for a "Better" service delivery system:
 - Shared Standards of Practice
 - Fiscal Stewardship/Outcomes
- Uses funding as leverage to ensure collaborative, child-centered practice that is trauma-informed, evidence-based and family-focused

Purpose and Intent of CSA System of Care

- Shared Standards of Practice across Child-Serving Agencies
 - Child-centered, family focused
 - Family Engagement, Family Voice
 - Trauma-informed, Evidence-based
- Community-based "At Home, In School, Out of Trouble"
- Multi-disciplinary teams (MDTs) or Family Assessment and Planning Teams (FAPTs) meet with the youth and family to develop a service plan
- Pooled Funding, Sum Sufficiency, Shared Accountability
- Cross-agency Leadership (CPMT) and Management

CSA Eligibility Types

Mandates or Types of Eligibility

- Foster Care
- Foster Care Prevention "In-Home" Services by DFS CYF/Child Welfare
- Special Education IEP services for Private Day and Residential
- Child in Need of Service (CHINS)
 Foster Care Prevention
- Special Education "Wraparound" funding capped at \$2.2 mil statewide
- Protected funds "Non-mandated" capped at \$1.6 mil annually for our locality







Who are the Youth Served?



- Children with histories of abuse and neglect who are in foster care
- Youth with developmental disabilities such as Autism
- Youth with high-risk behavioral health care needs – anxiety, depression, suicidal ideation, self-harm, and other risk behaviors
- Teens with conduct disorder, school refusal, substance abuse
- Families who have adopted children privately who have severe trauma histories and behavioral issues

A youth success story: How all the parts work together

- A youth had a non-fatal overdose of fentanyl (opioid)
- Parents had gone to REVIVE training at the schools and obtained Narcan which helped their child until EMTs arrived
- The youth was hospitalized for the non-fatal overdose and recommended for further treatment
- Youth referred to the CSB for an intake for follow up treatment services
- Case Manager assigned on the CSB Youth and Family Resource Team
- Case Manager opens the 'case' to CSA, refers the youth to our Family Assessment and Planning Team (FAPT) for possible residential treatment services
- Services are approved to include a Family Peer Support Partner, transportation and treatment services using CSA funding
- Using our shared contracts, the CSB Case Manager arranges for the residential services and ensures the youth and family are connected to a provider
- Monitoring and ongoing service planning in coordination with other partners like the school or courts continues throughout the youth's episode of care
- The youth returns to the community and is linked with CSB treatment services and ongoing case management
