

#### Challenges & Emerging Issues in the Coordinated Community Response

Continue to see high number of immigrant clients, especially those from Central and South America. Many require language assistance.	Financial and affordable housing issues.	Uptick in women in partner abuse intervention programs (BIPS).
Dearth of mental health professionals for adults, teens, and children, especially for those who are non-English speaking	Similar trends seen in the sexual violence and human trafficking spheres.	Concerns around the handling of strangulation cases by the Commonwealth Attorney's Office



#### **Coordinated Community Response Updates**


LAP implementation expanded as of November 1st to include dating or sexual partners and to be used in cases where no arrest is made.

The first Sexual Violence Tier One training to be launched in February 2024.

GDC PO Packet approved by Judges and will be in use soon.

The final "map" of the JDRDC protective order process will be placed on the Council's website early 2024. Community Conversations launched in Culmore in partnership with DSVS, Northern Virginia Family Services and Second Story. The DV Network Training committee recently expanded its focus beyond DV and will cover training on DV & SV, human trafficking and stalking with additional focus on prevention.

sexual and/or domestic violence




Participants took part in programs for people who have used violence towards a family member or intimate partner

#### Challenges

- Current and historic impact of government on communities can lead to lack of trust and limit access
- Community trauma due to systemic violence and increased hate-based violence towards BIPOC and immigrants
- Diverse population in Fairfax County have barriers to accessing culturally and linguistically relevant services

#### Achievements

- Council to End Domestic Violence
  - Equity Workgroup
  - Equity Retreat
  - Data project to assess populations underserved by DV/SV services in the county
- Services moving away from "onesize-fits-all" approach
- Agencies assessing and updating practices to address the needs of clients in more equitable ways

- Elevating coordinated community response to sexual violence
- **Equity focused** practices to reduce barriers to accessing services for all
- Comprehensive data on children and adolescents including teen dating violence
- Partnering to improve mental health services for **children impacted by domestic violence**
