

Don't get sick from the bite of a tick

Fairfax County is home to at least four species of ticks. The Deer Tick, Lone Star Tick, Dog Tick and the Gulf Coast Tick.

- Each tick species can transmit a disease to humans
- Lyme Disease is the most commonly reported tick-borne disease in this area
 No, You Fool!
 Deer ticks transmit Lyme
- Deer ticks transmit Lyme Disease
- Deer ticks are very small and can be hard to identify.
- This dot represents the size of a tick nymph
- The Deer tick is also known as the Black Legged tick

Prevent Tick-Bites

1. Dress Properly

- Wear light, long, loose clothing
- Tuck pant legs into socks
- Tuck in your shirt
- Pre-treat clothes with .5% permethrin
- Do not apply permethrin to skin
- Always follow label instructions

Don't dress like this!

2. Use Tick Repellent

• Apply 30% DEET (or other approved repellent) to exposed skin

Tick Removal



To remove attached ticks, use the following procedure:

- 1. Use fine-tipped tweezers or shield your fingers with a tissue, paper towel, or rubber gloves.
- Grasp the tick as close to the skin surface as possible and pull upward with steady, even pressure.
- **3. DO NOT** twist or jerk the tick; this may cause the mouthparts to break off and remain in the skin. (If this happens, remove mouthparts with tweezers. Consult your healthcare provider if infection occurs.)
- 4. DO NOT squeeze, crush, or puncture the body of the tick because its fluids may contain infectious organisms.

Basic Symptoms of Lyme Disease

- Red rash may appear at the site of the bite.
- May become a bull's eye rash.
- Many people experience fatigue, chills, fever, headache, muscle and joint pains.
