The Fairfax County History Commission conducted a wholly electronic meeting on May 3, 2023.

**Call to Order**

**1. Audibility of Members' Voices**

At this point, the Chair passed the virtual gavel over to David Meyer that she might be heard to make the following motions:

*I move that the History Commission certify for the record that each member's voice may be adequately heard by each other member of this Board.*

The motion was seconded by Jordan Tannenbaum and Jene Lindner, and passed unanimously.

**Welcome and Announcements**

Chair Announcements, Lynne Garvey-Hodge:

- Lynne Garvey-Hodge opened by honoring Asian and Pacific Islander Heritage Month and Jewish Heritage Month, in the spirit of OneFairfax.
- Lynne announced that Carole Herrick has made the decision to step down from the Commission due to family matters. Lynne discussed Carole's steadfast involvement with the History Commission over the years and stated that Carole has offered to continue serving in an advisory capacity with the History Commission.

**Cheryl Repetti made the following motion.**

*I move that Carole Herrick be considered for an advisory position for the History Commission for the upcoming year.*

**Anne Barnes seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.**

- Lynne announced that the staff will be organizing new History Commission binders to provide new (and tenured) Commissioners with up-to-date guidance and information.
- Lynne also reminded Commissioners of protocol and attending events.

## Minutes

### Approval of the April 5, 2023 Minutes

**A motion was made by Elise Murray regarding the History Commission Meeting Minutes:**

**Jordan Tannenbaum seconded the motion and the motion passed unanimously.**

## Treasurer's Report

- Sue Kovach Shuman reviewed the Treasurer's report for the period ending April 26, 2023. See [Attachment 1](#) for the May report.
  - Sue clarified a subscription charge for Ancestry.com and the W-9 process for new vendors.

## Staff Reports

### Archaeology and Collections Branch (ACB), Aimee Wells:

- Aimee Wells, Fairfax County Park Authority, provided ACB program and project updates to the Commission. See [Attachment 2](#) for the staff report.

### Heritage Conservation Branch, David Buchta:

- David Buchta, Fairfax County Park Authority, gave project, program, and event updates regarding the Heritage Conservation Branch. See [Attachment 3](#) for the staff report.
  - David emphasized that the Resident Curator Program will be holding two open houses for the Stempson and Clark Enyedi properties on Saturday, May 20, 2023.

### Virginia Room, Christopher Barbuschak:

- Christopher Barbuschak, Fairfax County Public Library gave program, collection, and staff updates regarding the Virginia Room. See [Attachment 4](#) for the staff report.

### Heritage Resources, Laura Kviklys:

- Laura Kviklys, Fairfax County Department of Planning and Development, gave projects, program, and staff updates. See [Attachment 5](#) for the staff report.
  - Specifically, Laura underscored the public meeting for the Judicial Complex Plan Amendment and requested History Commissioners consider participating or encourage other public voices to participate. See [Attachment 5](#) for the event flyer.
  - Laura also recommended that the Commission consider finding a replacement for the chair of the Cemetery Committee. Cheryl-Ann and Lynne discussed this process further.

## **New Business**

### **Joint Facilities Update Team Proposal, David Meyer:**

- First, David Meyer proposed the name of the working group to be “Work Group on Guidelines and Criteria for Commission Input to County Board and Agencies Regarding Historic Properties.”
- David reviewed the first work group meeting that reviewed the existing staff process for proposed changes to historic properties in the County.
  - There are two separate processes, depending on whether or not the property is within a historic overlay district. Additionally, developers will use external firms to conduct historic assessments of the properties and as a result, there is a lot of variation in the applications that are submitted to the County.
- Given this was the first meeting of the working group, the purpose was to gain a fuller understanding of all the different permutations of changes to historic properties.
- David concluded his remarks by stating that the working group will identify core objectives that will narrow the focus towards proposed changes that ensure the Commission is adequately involved in the review of historic properties, particularly those on the County’s inventory.
  - Jordan Tannenbaum asked if this is only related to the County’s inventory or would this also relate to Section-106. David noted that Section-106 is a core question and explained that if this scope is expanded to the procedures beyond the County inventory, then this could have the potential to significantly impact the process of how the County staff conducts its assessments.
    - Jordan Tannenbaum recommended the work group connect with the National Alliance of Preservation Commissions for advice and guidance from other public bodies across the country.
    - In the discussion, David added that there is a spectrum of solutions ranging from doing nothing to a really robust model where Fairfax County has an office or department of historic resources with planners and architectural historians that would assess each historic asset.
  - Anne Stuntz noted looking at neighboring jurisdictions and commends the workgroup’s efforts to develop historic preservation tools.

## **Unfinished Business**

### **I-495 SEL Project Section 106, Cheryl-Ann Repetti:**

- Cheryl Repetti stated that there are no updates regarding the project and that the environmental impact assessment is underway.

#### Renaming of Fort Belvoir, Tammy Mannarino:

- Tammy explained that two issues arose from a previous Board matter. The first is the renaming of several streets with Confederate namesakes. Tammy Mannarino and Russell Brooks are going to develop 10-20 street name recommendations that will be considered by Fort Belvoir, along with three additional community members.
- Second, the History Commission sought a meeting with the U.S. Army Center for Military History regarding the renaming of Fort Belvoir. However, the Center believed this meeting (which would be required to be public) was premature until senior leadership had made a formal decision.
- Tammy expressed her concern that the opportunity for the Commission to provide constructive input will be missed if they wait until after the leadership has made a decision. That being said, Tammy emphasized that the Army is under no obligation to listen to or address the Fairfax County History Commission's concerns.
  - The Commission will submit a document with information and research. Tammy and Lynne agreed that there should be reciprocity in a formal response from the Army upfront.
    - Tammy added that it is important to understand what the Army's criteria is on this issue to help the History Commission provide the best information.
- Tammy asked Commissioners to send her confirmation for participating in the Commission's ad-hoc committee.
- A discussion regarding the exchange of information with the U.S. Army Center for Military History ensued.
  - Tom Shoop noted that, although it is important to ensure reciprocity, it is important for the Commission to get the information to the senior leadership before they make the decision. Tammy and others further discussed the criteria and experience up to this point.
  - Jordan Tannenbaum questioned the lack of public input in the process and if the Commission has all the regulations and protocols. Jordan will be meeting with Mr. Richard Kidd, Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense for Environment and Energy Resilience, and will request any protocols about this matter.
    - Jordan requested an email from Tammy that specifies the needed information.
  - Further discussion continued regarding communication and reciprocity of information.

#### African-American History Inventory (AAHI) Database Project, Lynne Garvey-Hodge:

- Lynne Garvey-Hodge gave updates regarding the AAHI database that Mary Lipsey had communicated to Lynne prior to the meeting. See [Attachment 6](#) for the AAHI updates and the draft of the website's contact page.

#### 2024 Budget Updates and Financial Operations, Cheryl Repetti and Elise Murray:

- Elise Murray stated that the Board of Supervisors is engaged in their normal budget process and that there will be more updates at the end.

- Anne Stuntz asked if the amount in the annual budget request is set. Elise explained that for an increase, the Commission would need to submit a schedule, which doesn't make sense given how much money the Commission currently has in reserve.

## **Committee Reports**

### History Conference and Awards Committees, Lynne Garvey-Hodge:

- Lynne Garvey-Hodge reviewed confirmed details for the 2023 History Conference. The next Committee meeting will be on May 22 at 7:30 PM at the Fairfax City Library.
- Lynne reminded the Commission that award nominations are due by June 1.

### Budget and Inventory Committees, Elise Murray:

- Elise Murray requested volunteers to serve on the Budget Committee. Regarding the Inventory Committee, Elise provided updates regarding nominations, building plaques, and procedural refining.
  - Tammy Mannarino gave a brief update about the William H. Randall Estates Historic District with a likely date for unveiling in late summer. See [Attachment 7](#) for the formal letter of inclusion to the County's inventory.
  - Anne Stuntz asked about the Bowman Distillery. Elise explained that the letter is still on her to-do list, but the County did inspect and secure the building.

### Advocacy Committee, Anne Stuntz:

- The Advocacy Committee did not have a quorum, but did hold a brainstorming session with the members that were present. The next meeting is May 18. See [Attachment 8](#) for the Committee Report.
  - Anne Stuntz encouraged Commissioners to assist in compiling a list of historic events taking place in their districts.
    - Russell Brooks suggested the collection of historical events be shared with the general public, in addition to being used as an internal resource.
    - Cheryl recommended reaching out to the County's public information office to disseminate this information.

### Annual Report, Tammy Mannarino:

- Tammy Mannarino updated the Commission that Subhi Mehdi has worked incredibly hard on the Annual Report, sent a draft to Cheryl Repetti for review, and Cheryl sent back comments today. The full draft will be distributed to the entire Commission for their review soon. The Annual Report goes before the Board of Supervisors for June 6 and Tammy encouraged Commissioners to attend the meeting, if possible.

### Markers Committee, Cheryl Repetti:

- Cheryl Repetti did not have anything new to report because the Committee did not meet in April. Cheryl will coordinate a meeting for the upcoming month. See [Attachment 9](#) for the Committee Report.
  - Anne Stuntz asked if any of the markers from the African American Marker Project will be announced or revealed soon.
    - Stephanie Newman noted that the Markers Committee is coordinating the unveiling with the County staff. The Markers are submitted to the Board of Supervisors and the approvals will be announced to the Commission.

Ethnic and Oral History Committee, Esther McCullough:

- Esther McCullough noted that there are a few interviewees that they are working with to potentially also be participants in the upcoming History Conference. Esther specifically withheld their names for now.
- The next interviews are scheduled for June 8-9.
- The Ethnic and Oral History Committee's next meeting will be May 9 at 5:00 PM at the Freeman Store (131 Church Street, Vienna, VA 22180).

Architecture Review Board Liaison, Elise Murray:

- Elise Murray provided the ARB report in the shared drive. See [Attachment 10](#) for the report.
  - Specifically, Elise noted that the roof on the house at the Mount Gilead Historic Site will be replaced with something that most-closely resembles traditional cedar shakes.

City of Fairfax, David Meyer:

- David Meyer noted that there is one more neighborhood that is undergoing a renaming in the City, which is Old Lee Hills. The final renaming will be announced in the upcoming month.

Website Coordination, Cheryl Repetti:

- Cheryl Repetti updated the About Us, the Markers, and History Conference pages.
  - Anne Barnes and Sue Shuman will email Cheryl with updated contact information. See [Attachment 8](#) for more details.

Resident Curator Program, Bob Beach:

- Bob Beach did not have anything further to add to the Resident Curator Program staff updates.
- See Announcement Section for announcement made during the RCP section of the meeting.

Bylaws Committee, Anne Barnes:

- Anne Barnes connected with the Bylaws Committee regarding the changes of Section 13 of the Bylaws in 2019. Otherwise, there were no further updates.

### **Announcements**

- Bob Beach announced that he is stepping down from the History Commission after serving over 22 years. Bob expressed his gratitude to the Commission, as well as his pride to see the Resident Curator Program mature into its current iteration and the direction its headed.
  - Lynne Garvey-Hodge expressed her gratitude to Bob Beach for his unwavering leadership and wisdom to the Commission.
  - Many Commissioners expressed their appreciation and well-wishes to Bob.
- Jordan Tannenbaum suggested the History Commission incorporate a land acknowledgement at the beginning of each meeting. A land acknowledgement is a brief expression to honor the sacredness of the lands we currently live on and the indigenous communities that cared for the land before us.
  - Lynne Garvey-Hodge requested Jordan research 2-3 sentences that the History Commission can include at the beginning of each meeting.
- Lynne Garvey-Hodge noted that she is a descendant of Benjamin Utterbach, who was a former owner of the Merrybrook Property.

*Lynne Garvey-Hodge adjourned the meeting at 9:42 p.m.*

**Subject:** May History Commission Archaeology & Collections Update

April was a busy month for the Archaeology and Collections team.

Staff have begun the revision of our Cultural Resource Management Plan with our colleagues at the Heritage Conservation Branch. This document provides the broad framework for the Park Authority's cultural resources work. Our revision should be finalized later this summer.



Background research has been completed for over 1/3 of the cemeteries in the county's cemetery survey. This background includes scanning relevant information from the Virginia Room (thank you Chris B. and team!), the ACB files, Virginia Department of Historic Resources sites files, and in some cases full chain of title research. The team has been out surveying cemeteries each week as well. Work continues to create a platform to get the information back to the public in an accessible way.

ACB staff met with the community at several events in April, beginning with a staff favorite- Bluebells at the Bend. Staff took families through an activity putting together puzzles and talking about the archaeology of the park.

At Take Your Child to Work Day (top photo) Kelsey Atwood and Aimee Wells spoke to children of Park Authority staff about what can be learned about the past in cemeteries and the importance of stewardship of our shared history.



Elizabeth Crowell spoke with the Northern Virginia Chapter of the Archaeological Society of Virginia about "Post-Pandemic Archaeology."

The CART Team, led by Kelsey Atwood had a table at a rainy Earth Day celebration. Before the rain came, the team spoke with adults and kids about archaeology in Fairfax County and how erosion can impact archaeological sites.

Finally, to follow up with Commissioner Mannarino's request from last month: Union Farm was studied archaeologically by Dennis Pogue from Mount Vernon in 1993 and Parsons Engineering Science in 2001. The 1993 work included over 500 shovel tests and 10 5x5 units, while the 2001 work included extensive mapping as well as 168 shovel tests and two units. Material from both surveys was extensive and dated from the 18<sup>th</sup> to the 20<sup>th</sup> century including wine bottle glass, pipe stems, creamware, and hand molded bricks. Mount Vernon hopes to synthesize the work done by both projects.

**May 2023**

**Part-Time Librarian I Updates**

- Interviews were completed on May 1<sup>st</sup> for the part-time Virginia Room Librarian I position.

**Programs**

- Staff gave a tour and presentation to the NSDAR Thomas Lee Chapter about genealogical and local history resources available in the Virginia Room on April 11<sup>th</sup>.
- Suzanne LaPierre and Chris Barbuschak gave presentations about the desegregation of public libraries in Northern Virginia to the Reston-Herndon AAUW on April 12<sup>th</sup>, and FCPL and Mary Riley Styles Public Library employees at Staff Day on April 21<sup>st</sup>.

**Donations**

- The Jewish Genealogy Society of Greater Washington is disbanding their library. Staff traveled to their library in Rockville, Maryland and will be adding select Jewish genealogy books to the Virginia Room's collection.

**Outreach**

- Staff had an outreach table at Fairfax HisTree Day on Saturday April 22<sup>nd</sup>. Attendees got free reproduction maps of Fairfax Courthouse and Falls Church from 1879 and were able to look up who owned their property in 1860.

**Collaboration**

- Heritage Resources staff at the Fairfax County Department of Planning and Development discovered some 35mm negatives of a survey staff did in the 1980s photographing historic sites in Fairfax County. Virginia Room staff are currently digitizing the negatives for DPD.

**Staff Report: L. Kviklys**

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**Ongoing Projects:**

- **Mid-Century Modern Countywide Survey-** Dovetail Consultants began pedestrian fieldwork in March 2023, and expect to have 25% of all resources surveyed and entered into VCRIS by June. DPD will host an informational website beginning this month.
- **African American Resources Outreach-** As part of DPD's continuing outreach initiatives, staff are developing an interactive StoryMap highlighting African American resources in the county. The Storymap will pull from multiple sources including the recently concluded historic resource survey, and will contain a historic context, maps, and photographs.

**Current Development Cases:**

- **Fairfax Hunt Club:** (1321 Lake Fairfax Drive) Background: Applicant seeks rezoning of the parcel to increase density for multiple single family dwelling units. Fairfax Hunt Club and a non-associated cemetery are located on the site. The core of the extant clubhouse is a ca. 1790, two-story, three bay, log house that was moved to its current location from Vienna in ca. 1951. The Fairfax Hunt Club is not listed in the Inventory of Historic Sites; however, the property has specific language in the Comprehensive Plan and DPD staff is recommending preservation in place. Staff recommended that the house remain on the site and be moved to a parcel located adjacent to the cemetery to meet the minimum acreage as outline in the Comprehensive Plan. A meeting with DPD, Zoning staff and the applicant is scheduled for May 2023.
- **William Goldsmith House:** (2754/2758 Chain Bridge Road) Background: Applicant seeks rezoning from R1 to R2 for two new dwelling units and one existing dwelling unit. The parcel includes the historic William H. Goldsmith House, which was constructed in 1918 and listed in the County Inventory of Historic Sites in 2021. Despite the modifications made to the resource, such as the rear addition, and integrity issues with the historic setting and landscape, the house does retain integrity of workmanship, design, and materials. The William H. Goldsmith House is one of the few surviving representative examples of vernacular architecture at the local level for Fairfax County. Staff recommended that the Goldsmith House be proffered to be preserved, rehabilitated, and reserved as a Workforce Dwelling Unit (WDU), as outlined in the Applicant's Statement of Justification (SOJ) and that the Applicant should adhere to the Secretary of Interior Standards for Rehabilitation when augmenting the building.

**Other Items**

- **Staff Positions-**

- The application period for the Planner III/ARB Coordinator has closed and interviews will begin in mid-May.
  - DPD will be hiring two Planner II positions. The application period is May 5-26.
- **Judicial Complex Plan Amendment-** DPD will host a public meeting regarding the proposed plan amendment for the Judicial Complex on May 17 at 7PM. The History Commission is invited to participate and DPD staff encourages Commissioners to recommend other interested parties. A Teams link will be available on the Fairfax County public meeting webpage, and by request.

At its April 5, 2023 meeting, the Fairfax County History Commission included the William H. Randall Estates residential district in its Inventory of Historic Sites. This is a listing of approximately 350 properties in Fairfax County which the History Commission has determined have historic, architectural, archaeological, or public significance. These resources range from the nationally known Mount Vernon to districts, buildings, structures, sites and objects of state and local significance. Equally significant are twentieth century sites such as Holmes Run Acres and Hollin Hills residential communities. The Fairfax County Comprehensive Plan recognizes these properties and encourages their preservation when possible.

The History Commission appreciates your recognition of the importance of good stewardship of Fairfax County's history. Recording, preserving, and studying cultural resources enriches the quality of life in Fairfax County by putting residents in touch with their heritage, providing a sense of continuity, and instilling loyalty and commitment to place and community. Placing this district on the Inventory of Historic Sites assists the Board of Supervisors in achieving their goal of identifying and preserving the County's cultural resources for the aesthetic, social, and educational benefits of present and future citizens. This goal recognizes that cultural resource preservation requires a commitment from both public and private sectors.

Inclusion in the Inventory is honorary and does not impose restrictions or limitations as to what an owner can do with the property. However, we request that you notify the History Commission prior to the contemplated demolition of any individual property within the district.
