## **REGIONAL RACIAL EQUITY ANALYSIS:**

Listening Sessions. There were listening sessions facilitated by C4 Innovations with a variety of populations and stakeholders across the 9 jurisdictions participating in the Metropolitan



Washington Council of Governments Regional Racial Equity Analysis. Each jurisdiction got to send representatives to participate. The questions that C4 Innovations asked were recently provided to the jurisdictions. There were multiple high-level highlights identified from the regional summary organized by C4 Innovations reviewed in the CoC Committee meeting.

As the work with C4 Innovations ends, it was suggested that it would be helpful for C4 Innovations to provide guidance on what to do next. It was also noted that collaborating with landlords to make housing options more accessible should also be an ongoing focus.

REAC (the Regional Equity Action Council) member shared the experience of participating in the listening sessions. The questions did require participants to share their experiences, which required a high degree of vulnerability. It was noted the questions could have been less repetitive and more trauma informed.

□ Stakeholder Surveys. The due date was pushed back to ensure there is a good sampling of responses. There were several highlights and common themes under organizational-level challenges section of the handout that were reviewed in the CoC Committee meeting.

If there are specific trainings (equity, customer-service tailored to the population, sensitivity training, self-care, etc.) that should be regularly provided, this can be shared with the Office to Prevent and End Homelessness for support in coordinating. It was noted that it is important to educate at all levels, including board leadership. For day-to-day staff, the connection between the training and the work needs to be developed. When developing training, the focus on the experience of those served (customers, not clients), needs to be at the forefront. It was noted that it is important to be intentional about when meetings are scheduled, the language used, etc.

## **GAPS ANALYSIS:**

- Gaps analysis purpose. Quantify and prioritize unmet needs (calculation between the estimated amount of need and the current capacity).
- □ Summary of gaps analysis discussion from March 4, 2022, meeting is included in the meeting materials.
- □ HOME-ARP Background: The <u>American Rescue Plan (ARP)</u> provides \$5 billion (nationally) to assist individuals or households who are:
  - ✓ Homeless,
  - ✓ At risk of homelessness,
  - ✓ Fleeing, attempting to flee, domestic violence, dating violence, sexual asst stalking, or human trafficking, or
  - ✓ Other populations where providing supportive services or assistance would prevent the family's homelessness or would serve those at greatest risk of housing stability.

by providing housing, rental assistance, supportive services, and non-congregate shelter, to reduce homelessness and increase housing stability across the country. These grant funds will be

administered through HUD's <u>HOME Investment Partnerships Program (HOME)</u>. \$7.9 million dollars of HOME-ARP funding was awarded to Fairfax County, which needs to be spent by 2030.

- □ Scope of Work for Gaps Analysis required to use <u>HOME-ARP</u> (Virginia Center for Housing Research (VCHR), Virginia Tech)
  - Data Compilation and Analysis: VCHR will use 2014-2018 Comprehensive Housing Affordability Data (CHAS), 2019 American Community Survey (ACS), 2021 Point in Time County (PIT Count) or other data provided by the county to assess the unmet needs of HOME-ARP qualifying populations. VCHR will provide the analytical basis for the needs assessment and gap analysis for HOME-ARP qualified populations.
  - Review: VCHR will present the methodology and findings to county staff and solicit feedback.
  - Consultation: VCHR will help facilitate communication with stakeholders as well as gather information to diagnose and improve programs.
  - Deliverables: VCHR will work with county staff to develop a HOME-ARP Allocation Plan document.
- □ The Office to Prevent and End Homelessness is going to prepare specific suggestions to bring to the CoC Committee and other stakeholders. There are a number of options that will be explored and presented.

## **STRATEGIC PLAN:**

- **Summary of strategic plan discussion** from March 4, 2022, meeting is included in the meeting materials.
- Board Matter. The "Review of Current Operational Performance of County and Nonprofit Service Providers in Preventing and Ending Homelessness" was reviewed in the CoC Committee meeting. The motion included in the Board Matter was reviewed. This is also tentatively scheduled to be discussed at the Affordable Housing Advisory Council (AHAC) meeting in May. The Office to Prevent and End Homelessness will coordinate with the CoC Committee and share the information that will be developed to present to the Housing Committee during one of the meetings in 2022.
- **Community Solutions.** Four changes that can help every community end homelessness graphic is included in the meeting materials.

## COC COMMITTEE MEMBERSHIP – NOMINATION WORKGROUP:

It was proposed by the Chair that a Nomination Workgroup be formed to develop a nomination process for new members to join the CoC Committee. This includes bringing ideas and suggestions to help outline what recruitment looks like, what the vetting looks like, what representation is needed, etc. Staff support would be provided by the Office to Prevent and End Homelessness.

## HUD CoC PROGRAM AWARDS AND OPERATIONS POLICY:

- □ <u>HUD CoC Program Awards</u>. The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) announced the awards from the HUD CoC Program Competition awards on March 14, 2022.
  - Fairfax County's Continuum of Care received a total of \$10,080,294 in project funding, which is a 9% (\$842,143) *increase* from the previous year.
  - All 19 existing projects, as well as the planning grant, were fully funded.
  - The increase is largely attributed to the award of Shelter House's Domestic Violence Bonus Project Expansion, which brings \$772,730 in new HUD CoC Program funding for victims of domestic violence.
