Additional Information

Fairfax County has six emergency shelters for individuals and families who are homeless. These shelters are operated by community nonprofit organizations under contract with the county. The shelters have additional capacity during winter months to take in people overnight who are at risk of hypothermia.

In addition, a hypothermia prevention program operates throughout the county during the winter to provide additional safe, warm space for homeless individuals at night.

Project Information

Bailey's Crossroads Community Shelter and Supportive Housing for adults will be an innovative approach for housing our homeless residents and helping them transition into permanent housing. Scheduled to open in late 2019, the new facility will be located at 5914 Seminary Road. It will replace the existing Bailey's Crossroads Community Shelter located at 3525 Moncure Avenue.

Project funding was approved as part of the 2016 Bond Referendum.

Facility Features

- Approximately 23,000 square feet
- 52 emergency shelter beds to serve single adults including four medical respite beds
- 18 permanent supportive housing units
- Outdoor picnic and activity area
- Surface parking as required
- 24-hour staffing, including guidance and counseling
- Hypothermia prevention program

Project Timeline

- Design: Fall 2016 Fall 2017
- Construction: Spring 2018 Fall 2019
- Shelter Opening: Late Fall 2019

Demographics of Current Shelter Residents

- 74 percent of the current Bailey's shelter residents are male; 26 percent are female
- One-third of the residents are age 51+
- 8 percent are U.S. military veterans
- 11 percent are survivors of domestic violence
- Many have chronic health problems and disabilities
- Average stay in the shelter is less than two months
