

Dear Neighbors,

At this week's Board of Supervisor's meeting we began the County's FY 2023 Budget process, with the presentation of the **County Executive's Proposed FY 2023 Advertised Budget Plan**.

Highlights of the County Executive's proposed budget include:

- Recommends no change in the Real Estate Tax rate of \$1.14 per \$100 of assessed value.
- Recommends fully funding County schools.
- Recommends a 4.01% Market Rate Adjustment for County employees and makes changes to step increases.
- Funds **modest investments in Board priorities**, including Public Safety staffing, Diversion First, Opioid Use Prevention Efforts, Environmental Initiatives, Affordable Housing and Health Department positions.
- Recommends 2 positions for the South County Animal Shelter.
- Funds programming for **Original Mount Vernon High School** (OMVHS) and the **Lorton Community Center**.
- Recommends **no County Bond issuance** for 2022.

The County Executive also noted that **real estate assessments** and **personal property tax values** significantly increased this year. I and other Board members are committed to looking for ways to **minimize this impact on our residents** during the budget process. More details on the proposed budget can be found below and in the **Citizen's Guide to the proposed budget**. Additionally, the County also released **2022 real estate assessment information**. I will be hosting my **Budget Town Meeting** with School Board Member **Karen Corbett Sanders** and the **Mount Vernon Council of Citizen's Associations** on **Wednesday**, **March 23 at 6 p.m.** via zoom. More information...

Other meeting highlights:

- Approved rezoning application for **Alexandria Crossing development** and its eligibility for application into the **Economic Incentive Program**.
- Deferred a decision on adopting a running bamboo ordinance.
- The Board of Supervisors appointed Thomas G. Arnold as Deputy County Executive for Safety and Security.
- The Board of Supervisors appointed Steven Richardson as Executive Director of the Police Civilian Review Panel.

I also recognized two Mount Vernon residents who have recently passed, Colonel Elwyn J. "Stub" Warfle, US Air Force (Ret.) and Bruce Malkin. Colonel Elwyn J. "Stub" Warfle was 98 years old and he and his devoted wife, Josephine, had just celebrated their 78th wedding anniversary this past fall. Colonel Warfle was a World War II Veteran and stalwart founder and steward of Little Hunting Creek's Harbour Pointe community. Bruce Malkin was a long time Mount Vernon resident in the Riverside Estates Neighborhood. Mr. Malkin was awarded United Community's Gerry Hyland Humanitarian Award in 2018, was a leader in the Mount Vernon Kiwanis Club and supported United Community's many programs. Both of these men will missed, but certainly not forgotten.

Proposed FY 2022 Advertised Budget Plan

The County Executive presented his proposal for the FY 2023 Budget. This is the first step in a public process that extends through April as we work to refine and further balance our budget. The County Executive's proposal, in what we all recognize is still a challenging time due to COVID-19, is a mixed bag. Prices are rising, real estate assessments continue to rise and this has real impacts on those with fixed incomes, especially our seniors. I worked hard for several years to expand tax relief and because of this we have new eligibility for our needlest residents. Our expanded tax relief program for qualifying seniors and disabled persons is now in effect and I encourage those who are eligible to apply.

As cost of living rises, we must also address compensation for our hard working County employees who have helped us get through these past two challenging and difficult years without raises. I along with other Board members will be carefully balancing these issues and proposing changes important to reduce the financial impact on all of our residents before the final budget is adopted.

Highlights of the County Executive's Proposed Budget


- Tax rate: The County Executive has proposed a flat tax rate of \$1.14 per \$100 of assessed value. The County Executive's proposed budget also provides flexibility for our Board to consider a lower tax rate.
- FCPS: Over 50% of our budget goes to FCPS, which currently totals over \$2.28 billion. The County Executive has proposed for the twelfth straight year that we increase our transfer, this year by \$112.6 million. This would fully fund the budget proposal we received from FCPS, and allow schools to also address employee compensation.
- Affordable Housing: The proposal commits more baseline dollars to affordable
 housing with close to a \$20 million increase in this funding over two years. This is
 a continued priority because of its benefits to economic development, and the
 tremendous housing need that exists countywide.
- County Employee Pay: Our County employees have been there for us since the pandemic began. Alongside nationwide challenges in retaining and recruiting, we know employee compensation is a critical need. This proposal includes a 4.01% market rate adjustment for County employees, as well as performance, merit, and longevity increases.

Board Matters

Equal Rights Amendment Ratification - Joint with Chairman Jeff McKay and Supervisors Penny Gross, Dalia Palchik, Kathy Smith, Walter Alcorn, John Foust, Rodney Lusk and James Walkinshaw

Virginia became the **38th state to ratify the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA)** in 2020 following bipartisan approval by the General Assembly. This was a **major victory for women** who, for nearly a century, have been working to ensure a constitutional guarantee of **legal rights regardless of gender**. This historic vote also paved the way for the ERA to become recognized as the **28th amendment to the U.S. Constitution**. As you'll recall, Constitutional amendments must be ratified by **three-quarters of the states**, **or 38**.

Though the U.S. Congress set a **ratification deadline of 1982**, a group of Attorneys General, including former Virginia Attorney General Mark Herring, sued to **ensure the ERA would be recognized as an amendment**. Disappointingly, **Virginia's current Attorney General, Jason Miyares**, withdrew the Commonwealth from the legal effort last week, citing **potential undermining of the Constitution** and its amendment process.

Despite the Attorney General's withdrawal, the **legal effort to certify the ERA** as the 28th amendment **will continue**. Still, Virginia's absence from this effort undermines the work of **so many in the Commonwealth who fought** and continue to fight for equality regardless of gender.

Action

Directed staff to:

- Draft a letter of support of the ERA and the need to certify it as the 28th Amendment.
- Send the letter to Attorney General Miyares, under the Chairman's signature no later than this Friday.

Public Hearings

Alexandria Crossing

Approved rezoning and proffers for the **Alexandria Crossing development** to construct **466 total units** consisting of 385 multi family apartments, 23 Stacked Townhomes (46 units total) and 45 single family attached homes. Developer proffers include:

- Undergrounding of existing overhead utilities on Richmond Highway frontage.
- Additional \$250,000 off-site contribution to FCPA for a future Fairchild/Quander Park
- EarthCraft and National Green Building Standards Energy Star certifications
- 10% of units will be **Workforce Dwelling Units** (WDUs).

Regulations on Running Bamboo

The Board held a public hearing on **adopting a running bamboo ordinance**. We heard from many residents who were **generally supportive of regulating this invasive species**. While we all recognize that running bamboo, and indeed other invasive species,

are harmful to our environment, the regulation of invasive species presents many challenges, including who owns the bamboo, where did it start, how long should homeowners have to remediate the problem and can it be controlled instead of eliminated. The ordinance, as proposed, would provide a complaint based system for homeowners who have running bamboo encroaching on their property to report it to County Code Compliance. Staff would then investigate the situation and work with the "bamboo owner" on steps to remediate the growth onto other properties. If compliance is not achieved, the County would have the authority to fine the "bamboo owner". Additional discussion at the Board meeting included when to enact the ordinance and when to start charging fines. County staff will bring additional information to the Board and we will consider this ordinance again at the March 8 Board of Supervisors meeting.

Zoning Ordinance Amendment

Approved a proposed **zoning ordinance amendment** to Chapter 112.1 regarding minor and editorial revisions.

COVID-19

Masks in FCPS

I have heard from many of you about the recent state decision to require schools to remove mask mandates. While I don't like masks any more than many of you and hope they are gone soon, I do not believe the state government should be mandating decisions that should be made by local school boards who know their unique, local circumstances. This state decision not only goes against federal guidelines and recommendations, but also now gives the state health authority over local school districts' operations in perpetuity. Do any of us think the state government will be able to act as fast as the next COVID wave, if and when it arrives?

This issue is **larger than masks**. It is about who is in the best position to make **decisions about our local community** and I don't believe those decisions are best made by the federal government, nor do I feel the state has earned this right either. **The state has chronically underfunded our schools for decades, currently directly funding less than 20 percent our local FCPS budget**. Fairfax County taxpayers fund 64 percent. We

must continue to advocate for the General Assembly to change their funding formulas that are unfair to Fairfax County and provide appropriate funding levels for our students.

As a former School Board member, I deeply respect the responsibility that school board members have to our schools, students and staff to keep them healthy, supported and learning. I will continue to work with the School Board and ourSchool Board Member Karen Corbett Sanders, as partners to ensure that our school system continues to excel and meet the needs of each student. We have been through a lot together and I ask that you continue to spread kindness, respect and civility and not COVID-19!

Vaccine Recommendation Updated

The **Centers for Disease and Control (CDC)** updated its vaccine recommendations on February 17 for people who are **moderately or severely immunocompromised** and have completed a three-dose primary series of an mRNA vaccine (Pfizer-BioNTech or Moderna). It is **now recommended that they receive an mRNA booster dose (fourth dose)** at least three months (instead of five months) after the last primary dose.

New Online Tool to Help Calculate Isolation and Quarantine Period

People who have been **exposed to COVID-19** or **tested positive** now have an easy way to determine how long to **stay home and away from others**: the Virginia Department of Health's new **online isolation and quarantine calculators**.

Texts/Calls Remind Residents to get Boosters

If you were vaccinated against COVID-19 more than five months ago and have not yet received a booster, the Virginia Department of Health (VDH) may send you a voice or text message reminding you to make an appointment. The message will read, "Virginia Department of Health records indicate you are eligible for a Booster COVID-19 vaccine. To schedule an appointment visit www.vaccines.gov or call (877) 829-4682. Please disregard this message if you have already received your Booster." The message will also be sent in Spanish.

District Information & Upcoming Events

Infill Development Task Force Meeting

The Infill Development Task Force will meet tonight, February 24 at 6:30 p.m. The Task Force Task Force (IDTF) includes many neighborhood representatives, my office, our state elected representatives, and developers to review and evaluate County and state options for better addressing the impacts on neighbors and neighborhoods of "by-right" residential infill redevelopment projects. "By-right" development means it is a permitted use in a zoning district and, as long as the planned development meets County/state standards, the County does not have the legal right to stop or restrict that property's development.

The public is welcome to listen and observe all Task Force meetings and may have an opportunity to ask questions, if time allows, at the end of meetings.




