It was wonderful to **return to the Board room** with my colleagues yesterday! We held our first Board meeting **in-person** and complete with **presentations and performances** for the first time in over a year. Our first presentation was to recognize **LGBTQ+ Pride Month**, in recognition of the importance of **inclusion for all in our very diverse Fairfax County**.

As we started the meeting, I recognized **three individuals who's lives were lost** in recent weeks. **Col. Edward McDaniel Jr. and Col. Brenda McDaniel** were killed in a double homicide in front of



their home in **Newington Forest**, a normally very quiet suburban neighborhood not far from last month's unrelated and targeted double homicide. The husband and wife were **both distinguished military veterans**, Edward a physician and Brenda a retired former physician, both in the **U.S. Army**. These recent incidents prompted me to bring a Board Matter directing an education awareness campaign of the County's Lock & Talk Program to provide **free gun trigger locks and locking devices for medicines**.

I also recognized **Paul Kalland of Fairfax Station** who was killed in a car accident on Route 123 in Lorton. Paul **retired two years ago as an American Airlines pilot.** He and his **wife Kathy** have been **very active in the South County community.** I know these three individuals will be **greatly missed by their family, friends and communities.**

The Board approved a new, targeted \$25 million grant program for small businesses most impacted by COVID-19. PIVOT will be targeted based on the results of the Economic Recovery Framework report funded by the County. The report illustrated that of the estimated 48,200 jobs lost through December 2020, most were concentrated in the retail, hospitality and food service sectors. Businesses who are able to apply for funding include: food service; retail, services and amusements; arts organizations and historical sites; and lodging, all of whom are critical core businesses on the Richmond Highway corridor. This is the third recovery program we have offered to help our small business community which is vital to our future economic success. The application portal is expected to open on June 23 and be available through July 7.

We also held public hearings and approved the **demolition of two blight abatement properties** in the District at **7821 Belvedere Drive** and **7704 Schelhorn Road**. A third public hearing for **2506 Fleming Street** was **deferred to July 13** to allow time for additional notification to the property owners. All three properties are in **Mount Vernon area**.

Additional Meeting Highlights:

- On the advice of legal council, we approved amendments to the County Code, Motor Vehicles and Traffic regarding operation of vehicles with excessively loud exhaust systems and the inability of law enforcement to stop and enforce this violation. However, the Board agreed changes need to be made at the state level.
- 2. Approved a proposed schedule for the 2021 redistricting and reapportionment of the Board of Supervisors' election districts.
- 3. Approved a Fairfax County Public Schools bond referendum totaling \$360,000,000 to be included on the next election ballot in November 2021.

I was proud to also bring a Board Matter announcing aJuneteenth recognition and

historic marker unveiling for Ona Judge. Read more about Ona, the event (YES! You're invited!) and the students who petitioned the Governor to get the historic marker placed at Mount Vernon below. We also have several special guest speakers, including Virginia Secretary of Education Atif Qarni and Dr. Erica Armstrong Dunbar, author of the book "Never Caught" about Ona Judge's life.

Administrative Items

Item 5 & 6: Approved the Fairfax-Falls Church CSB to apply for and accept \$924,000 in grant funding to:

- Support expansion of the **Crisis Intervention Team** assessment site.
- Enhance forensic discharge planning services.

Item 7: Approved the Health Department to accept \$3,674,745 in grant funding for COVID-19 response activities.

Action Items

Item 1: Approved the licensing agreements for the "Made in Fairfax" logo, and authorized the County to pursue trademark protection of the logo. Made in Fairfax is an initiative by the County and participating partners to support small-scale production businesses and "makers" throughout the County. Item 2: Approved a **Fairfax County Public Schools bond referendum totaling** \$360,000,000 to be included on the next election **ballot in November 2021.** I am proud that we have **consistently increased this amount** to meet **capacity and renovation needs** at our schools, these bonds historically have been strongly **supported by voters throughout the County.** These bond funds will be used for **renovations at 14 schools** across the County and for the **land acquisition for a western county high school**. Item 4: Approved a Capital Funding Agreement with the **Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority (WMATA)** for FY 2022 – FY 2027. The full item can be read on pages 87 - 246 of the Board Package.

Item 5: Approved a proposed schedule for the **2021 redistricting and reapportionment of the Board of Supervisors' election districts**. The full item can be read on pages 247 - 260 of the Board Package.

Board Matters

Lock and Talk - Gun Safety and Suicide Prevention

Recently in the Mount Vernon community, we've had **multiple tragedies** that have resulted in the **loss of lives as a result of gun violence**. Coincidentally, two weeks ago, my staff participated in **Mental Health Awareness Training** provided by the County. Based on my staff's positive experience, I encourage other Board offices to take this training. As part of the training, our team became aware of a **County program to provide free gun trigger locks**.

The Lock & Talk campaign started in 2019 through a collaborative initiative between our Community Services Board (CSB) and the Suicide Prevention Alliance of Northern Virginia to provide free locking devices for medications and trigger locks that fit a wide variety of firearms. These items can be picked up for free from a variety of locations around the County, including the Pennino Building, the Gerry Hyland Center, Merrifield Center, Chantilly Office, Reston Office – Northwest Center and Gartlan Center.

I strongly believe that this **initiative can make a difference** and was surprised our office was generally unaware of the program. While this measure would not have changed the outcome in these recent tragedies, it highlighted the **need for more awareness and prevention** in situations where trigger locks may change the outcome.

Action

Directed the Office of Public Affairs to advertise the Lock and Talk Campaign.

Proclamation Recognizing Ona Judge and the Installment of Her Historic Marker at Mount Vernon Estate

Ona (or Oney) Judge was born into slavery at Mount Vernon and at ayoung age became Martha Washington's personal attendant. After George Washington was elected president in 1789, Judge was brought to New York City and later to Philadelphia to serve his household. Washington periodically sent her back to Virginia to skirt a Pennsylvania law that might have granted her freedom based on long-term residency. In 1796, after learning that she was to become a gift for Martha Washington's granddaughter, Judge escaped from Philadelphia to New Hampshire. There she married, had three children, taught herself how to read and write, and lived for more than 50 years, having resisted Washington's attempts to recover her.

Ona Judge's quest for freedom represents a **brave moment in history**. It is also a rarity that **historic records include the accounts** of her escape and subsequent life.

In recognition of her bravery, I will be **hosting the unveiling ceremony** for the Ona Judge Historic Marker at **Mount Vernon Estate on Juneteenth**, **June 19 at 10 a.m.** The event will **honor Ona Judge**, as well as the **5th graders at Laurel Ridge Elementary School** and their **teacher Ms. Maura Keaney** who wrote nomination letters to Governor Northam as part of the **Black History Month Historical Marker Contest** to have Ona Judge's story selected for this commemoration as a **Virginia Historic Marker**.

Action

Directed:

- The Board give special recognition to Ona Judge by supporting the unveiling of her marker on Juneteenth, 2021.
- A resolution be prepared recognizing the Laurel Ridge students and teacher Ms. Maura Keaney, to be signed by the Chairman and myself, to be presented at the event.

OPA to advertise the Juneteenth unveiling ceremony.

Recognition of Pam Michell - Joint with Chairman Jeff McKay and Supervisors Rodney Lusk and Penny Gross

On October 1, 2021, Pam Michell, the Executive Director of New Hope Housing, will be retiring from her position. Pam has been with NHH since November 1990 and has dedicated her career to assisting people in need of housing solutions.

During her tenure, Pam has grown NHH from a program of three shelters serving roughly 100 people a day to a variety of services that include three year-round shelters, three hypothermia shelters, seven permanent supportive housing programs and a host of support services serving approximately 450 people a day across the region.

Pam has also been an **ever-present force along the Route One Corridor**, working to **protect our most vulnerable residents** and connect them with County and nonprofit resources. Particularly during the last year, the work of New Hope Housing was **critical in keeping all of our residents safe**.

Action

Directed:

- Recognition of Pam Michell for her retirement and to thank her for her work.
- OPA to prepare a proclamation for future presentation, either out of the Board Room or at a future Board meeting, when appropriate to do so.

Recognition of Jennifer Siciliano - Joint with Chairman Jeff McKay and all nine Supervisors

On August 11, Jennifer Siciliano will begin a new appointment with UVA Health, following 14 years with Inova. Among her many accomplishments at Inova, she built a high performing government and community relations team and initiated a system wide strategy for employee engagement in key legislative and regulatory priorities including Medicaid expansion in the Commonwealth.

In addition to her work at Inova, Jennifer has been a dependable and appreciated partner of Fairfax County on many regional and statewide Boards and Commissions. She has served on the Virginia Chamber of Commerce Board as well as its Health Care Industry Council, the Virginia Business Council, the Northern Virginia Technology Council and LEAD Virginia. She is also a founding member of the Community Foundation of Northern Virginia's Business Women's Giving Circle. She has also chaired the Northern Virginia Chamber, and she served as a member of the Fairfax County Economic Development Commission and as a member of the Board of Directors for the George Mason Honors College Board. Most recently, Jennifer was also a member of the Task Force for Equity and Opportunity.

Personally, Jennifer has been a **great friend and resource for myself** and I know many others on this and previous Boards of Supervisors. She's dedicated her career to **bettering our community** and has no doubt succeed in those efforts.

Public Survey: The Resilient Fairfax public survey is now live, and open through**July 2.** The Fairfax County Office of Environmental and Energy Coordination (OEEC) has announced the opening of an online public survey to **assess climate vulnerabilities and risks** within the community. This survey, which will **remain open until 11:59 PM on July 2, 2021**, is part of the **Resilient Fairfax initiative**, a county-wide effort to increase the community's overall resilience to climate impacts.

The survey **asks respondents to share their personal experiences** with climate impacts such as flooding and preparedness for **extreme weather and temperature events**. Additionally, the survey seeks **input from respondents** on potentially vulnerable segments of the population and types of infrastructure within the county.

New TOPS Transportation Program Provides Debit Card, More Options for Older Adults, People with Disabilities, and Income-Eligible Residents

Fairfax County is offering a new program called **TOPS** (**Transportation Options**, **Programs & Services**) that replaces the **previous taxi voucher programs** (Seniors On-The-Go!, TaxiAccess, and Dial-A-Ride). The streamlined program provides a **transportation debit card** in lieu of paper vouchers and offers more transportation options in addition to taxi services. To be eligible for TOPS, you must be a **resident of Fairfax County** or the City of Fairfax, plus **meet one of the following criteria**:

- Fifty years of age or older, with an annual income of \$50,000 or less per household.
- Registered user of MetroAccess.
- Recipient of Supplemental Security Income (SSI) or Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI).
- Annual income that meets the 225% federal poverty levels by household size.

Program participants are eligible for **two subsidies per year** (one every six months). Each subsidy will provide **\$100** in benefits at a cost to the participant of **\$20**. These subsidies may be used for an **expanded menu of transportation options** that includes taxicabs, rideshare services (Uber and Lyft), public transportation via SmarTrip card (bus and rail), and Capital BikeShare rentals. To apply to TOPS, visit.

- If you are already registered for at least one of the three previous taxi programs
 and you have purchased vouchers in the last two years, you will be automatically
 transitioned to TOPS and instructions will be provided on how to purchase and add
 funds to the debit card.
- If you **currently have taxi vouchers** in hand with the expiration date of 12/31/20 or 3/31/21, you have **until June 30, 2021 to return** for an adjustment and credit to your TOPS card.
