A MESSAGE FROM SUPERVISOR STORCK

At Tuesday's **Board of Supervisor's (BOS) meeting** the Board approved the publication of the **County Executive's** proposed budget for FY 2019, which is based on a tax rate of \$1.155 per \$100 of assessed value. This is an increase of 2.5 cents over the current rate of \$1.13. Advertising the tax rate at a maximum increase of 2.5 cents means that when the Board adopts a final budget and a final tax rate on May 1, the tax rate can be the same as or lower than what was advertised, but not higher.



The County Executive's Advertised Budget provides a **revenue increase of \$192.32 million**, or 4.69%, over last year's budget. It recommends a **general fund transfer to our County Schools of \$2.26 billion**, which is a 4.38%, or \$95.10 million, increase over the current budget. The proposed operating transfer **meets the School Board's request**, after accounting for an anticipated increase in State revenues. The **top priority for the Schools' FY 2019 Budget** is **teacher salaries and benefits**. The Advertised Budget also begins to **address increased school capital needs**, with the an annual increase of \$25 million in School bonding **authority**. Other County priorities in the Advertised Budget include **South County police positions**, **Diversion First, gang and opioid prevention efforts, early childhood initiatives and employee compensation**.

I support the Board's advertisement of the proposed budget and advertised maximum tax rates, as they allow us to fully fund our schools, compensate our County employees and continue to provide the services our residents have come to expect. Over the coming months, the Board will review the County Executive's proposed budget. We will hear public comment and discuss together how to strike the right balance between keeping taxes affordable for our residents, while maintaining the high quality services for which our County is known.

I encourage you to get involved in the budget process by sharing feedback, ideas and suggestions regarding the tax rate and budget priorities. Please join me and Mount Vernon School Board Member Karen Corbett Sanders on Monday, March 19 at 7:00 p.m. at Walt Whitman Middle School for the Mount Vernon District Budget Town Hall. We will be joined by County Executive Bryan Hill and County Chief Financial Officer Joseph Mondoro to inform our community about the proposed budget, listen to your feedback and further explain the budget process.

Admin 4: The Board authorized the advertisement of the FY 2019 Budget and a real estate tax rate for FY 2019 of \$1.155 per \$100 of assessed value. The FY 2019 Advertised Budget Plan is balanced based on this Real Estate Tax rate, which is an increase of \$0.025 over the current rate for FY 2018. This gives the Board flexibility during our deliberations on the FY 2019 budget. While we can lower any advertised tax rate, we cannot be impose higher tax rate without advertising the higher rate. If approved as advertised, the average Fairfax County real estate tax bill would increase by \$268 annually. The balanced budget as advertised will fully fund County Schools and maintain the high quality services for which Fairfax County is known.

Action 2: The Board approved the Calendar Year 2018 Forest Pest Management Program. Program actions include monitoring, outreach programs, surveys, management plans and control programs for Gyspy Moths, Fall Cankerworms, Emerald Ash Borers, Thousand Canker Disease of Walnut Trees, Sudden Oak Death Disease, Hemlock Woolly Adelgid, Asian Longhorned Beetles, Spotted Lanternflies, Beech Bark Disease and Forest Health Initiatives.

Action 3: The Board approved the annual submission of the Disease Carrying Insects Program (DCIP). Program actions include surveillance programs, insect testing, community outreach and education programs to protect residents from mosquitoes, West Nile virus, Zika virus, other mosquitoborne diseases, ticks, Lyme disease, other tick-borne illnesses and other disease-transmitting insects of public health importance.

BOARD MATTERS

1. Board Matter: Expedited and Concurrent Processing of NRP Huntington, LLC RZ/FDP 2018-MV-006

The Zoning Evaluation Division recently accepted RZ/FDP 2018-MV-006 on behalf of **NRP Huntington**, **LLC**. The rezoning and final development plan applications propose the construction of approximately **62 multifamily units** known as **Huntington Crossing**, near the Huntington Metro Station. The rezoning application will implement the adopted Plan recommendations in a **key**, **transit-oriented location**.

Action

- Directed the Director of the Zoning Evaluation Division to **expeditiously process the pending applications** submitted by NRP Huntington, LLC.
- Directed the Director of the Department of Land Development Services to accept for concurrent and simultaneous processing any site plans, architectural drawings or other drawings as may be necessary in conjunction with applications filed on behalf of the NRP Huntington, LLC.

2. Board Matter: Mount Vernon District Pilot with Office of Public Private Partnerships (OP3) and the Volunteer Management System

The Volunteer Management System (VMS) has been a **very effective citizen recruiting tool** for many events in the District and countywide. As a result, my office has been working with Patti Stevens and the Office of Public Private Partnerships to find **new ways to reach District residents to engage them to participate in our Boards, Authorities and Commissions (BAC). We are preparing to be the first Board office to participate in the pilot of the VMS system to identify and post opportunities. District staff and any other BOS office that express interest in the pilot can be trained to use the tool to post their opportunities. The system also provides a process to log and track BAC volunteer hours. This is another positive step forward with improving our public engagement.**

Action

Directed OP3 to continue to coordinate this effort with the Department of Information Technology and other agencies to launch this pilot, train the appropriate staff and provide a status update to the Board by the end of the year to share the progress and efficacy of the pilot.

3. Board Matter: Comprehensive Plan Amendment: 8800 Richmond Highway

This **8.14** acre property located along the north side of Richmond Highway immediately west of the Woodlawn Community Business Center is largely within the 100-year floodplain of Dogue Creek. A substantial portion of the site has been disturbed with fill in the floodplain. Over the past five decades, the site has hosted a range of industrial and commercial uses. Today, a welding operation and several trailers remain on the site.

Currently, the Comprehensive Plan indicates that the site is planned for private open space. A request has been made for the **Comprehensive Plan to be amended to provide for the consideration of residential use on the properties**, including the disturbed portion. A rezoning application, RZ 2016-MV-018, and an associated Special Exception application, have been submitted for a **townhouse development**.

Action

Evaluate an amendment to the Comprehensive Plan for residential uses up to 8 dwelling units
per acre. Particular elements to be considered by the Plan amendment include evaluating the
proposed density for the ability to: achieve full parcel consolidation; conformance with Policy
Plan guidance that addresses disturbances to Environmental Quality Corridors (EQC), including
the demonstration of circumstances meriting disturbance to the EQC; and that
mitigation/compensation measures would be provided to result in a net environmental benefit to

- the parcels and net benefits relating to most, if not all, of the EQC policy that are applicable to the proposed disturbances. Furthermore, the proposed redevelopment of the property would need to be consistent with VDOT's proposed widening of Richmond Highway.
- Consistent with Board policy for concurrent processing of plan amendments and rezonings in revitalization districts, RZ 2016-MV-018 should be processed in an expedited manner with the Plan Amendment

Action

Directed the Office of Public Affairs to advertise BizEx to ensure community awareness of this resource.
