
Happy Holidays! December 2018

Diane Watson is one of Mount Vernon District's newest Boards, Authorities and Commissions Members, serving on the Fairfax Area Commission on Aging. The Commission is a body of 12 volunteers appointed by elected officials of Fairfax County, Falls Church and the City of Fairfax. The Federal Older Americans Act mandates that local agencies on aging have community advisory committees. The Commission on

Aging is the Fairfax Area on Aging's Community Advisory Committee. Commissioners advocate for the **needs of older adults** and tap their potential to **enrich the community**. The Commission advises the Agency on Aging on developing and **coordinating community services**, policies, programs and actions affecting older adults in the Fairfax Area.

The Commissioners **welcome community input** and invite all to attend their monthly meetings from 1-3 p.m. on the **3rd Wednesday of every month**, except August. Meeting locations are listed in the **Golden Gazette** each month.

Diane has been a Physical Therapist for 47 years, 33 of which were in the Home Care setting that allowed her to see and hear concerns aging adults have encountered over the years. Elly Doyle Park Service Awardee

Mount Vernon volunteer, **Michael Applegate**, was recognized, among others, for **outstanding volunteerism** by the Fairfax County Park Authority. During a ceremony on November 16, Mike received the "Elly Doyle Service Award" for his efforts in **maintaining and improving the grounds and mountain biking trails** in a large portion of Laurel Hill Park - in the Apple Orchard

and Equestrian Center areas. He works an average of 30 hours per week on the **five-mile trail network** - mowing, trimming trees, inspecting and fixing storm damage, improving trail surface and drainage, supervising contractors and scout projects, advising staff on improvements in processes and alterations to facilities to **improve the visitor experience**.

Regardless of the weather, Mike donates an **exceptional amount of time** to care of the park at all times of the year. Beyond the park itself, Mike presents an **excellent role model** for us all, **especially the children** who see him and know him in the park, teaching them, by example, the **difference volunteerism can**

Changing Lives Pawfectly Deliciously

New non-profit, Pawfectly Delicious Dog Treats, started in the Mount Vernon community to provide meaningful work and job training to disabled young adults in the local community. Bryan Tuccillo and his mother Anne began to bake dog treats in their home kitchen soon after Bryan aged-out of special education services in the County. Bryan is 26 years old and has Mitochondrial Disease, a degenerative neurological condition. After struggling to find meaningful employment after high school, Bryan and his mother teamed up to provide



employment opportunities for young adults who were yearning for purpose and to make a contribution in their community. The dough is prepared in partnership with the Culinary Arts Team at the Pulley Career Center, and each treat is baked and packed in the kitchen at St. Luke's Episcopal Church by a team of volunteers and young adults who are differently abled. The heart that is placed in each package represents the unconditional love between an owner and their dog and for the support of the group's mission through a purchase of "Pawfectly Delicious" Dog Treats. Know Someone Who Needs Shelter from the Cold this Winter?

The Hypothermia Prevention Program is an integral part of the County's programs to **prevent and end homelessness** that incorporates the collaborative work of



area faith communities, civic organizations, businesses and individual volunteers. The program represents a shining example of collaborative effectiveness in serving the critical needs of those experiencing homelessness when they are in most danger of exposure to cold weather.

Each year, all three County emergency shelters that serve single adults activate a "noturn-away" policy from December 1-March 31, known as the Winter Seasonal program. "No-turn-away" is also implemented outside of that timeframe based on temperature and weather conditions. Read more...

Are You Eligible for Medicaid? You Might Be Now

Good news! Virginia has **expanded the list** of those who are **eligible for Medicaid** and applications are now being accepted for coverage, which will **go into effect Jan. 1, 2019**. Even if you were not previously eligible for Medicaid, you may now be able to enroll if you meet the **revised program requirements**. According



to the Commonwealth Institute's latest projections as of January 2018, **an additional 28,000 individuals** in the County may be eligible for Medicaid. Read more in this NewsCenter story...



STEM Opportunities for Youth

STEM Opportunities for Youth is a new County sponsored website for **youth of all ages** to find programs offered by County parks, libraries, community centers, as well as nonprofit organizations and local universities.

Mason Observatory Open to the Public

Mason's astronomical observatory, located atop Research Hall on Mason's Fairfax Campus, houses one of the largest diameter telescopes among college campuses in the mid-Atlantic region. Night sky observing sessions led by faculty and graduate students are preceded by informative talks. Sessions open to

Important Safety Messages

Christmas Tree Care

Living Christmas trees are an option for those who want to enjoy their tree as a landscape feature throughout the year, not just for the holiday season. They, however, require **special** treatment. Living trees in containers or balled and burlaped should not be carried by the stem, even though they may be unwieldy. It is important also to allow the tree to adjust to being in a heated room

by leaving it in an unheated garage or shed for several days prior to bringing it inside and for several days before bringing it back outside. Your tree also needs **plenty of water** while indoors. Read more...
