- Phase 2 of commercial development at Liberty, with the adaptive reuse of the Lorton Prison
- Lorton and Silverbrook Road intersection study to find solutions to improve traffic flow
- Complete planning for the South County Police Station and Animal Shelter and the Lorton Community Center
- Demolition and start of construction on new Lorton Volunteer Fire Station
- Planning for the CSX/Route 1 replacement bridge
- Design trail connections from Laurel Hill to the Lorton VRE Station and for the Mount Vernon Memorial Highway trail
- Working with **Strategic Economic Development Team** to secure new developments for Richmond Highway Corridor

An additional focus of our office in 2019 will include the **proposal of a strong environmental package** aimed at protecting and enhancing our valuable ecological resources and heritage sites. With **numerous rivers and streams** in the District, as well as **abundant parks and wildlife**, the **care and preservation of our environment** is particularly important to our communities. I will be advocating for the County to take a more **aggressive position on these issues**, including **litter control efforts** such as a plastic bag fee, calling for a **Community Climate Action Plan** and beginning **resiliency planning**, particularly for our shorelines. Look for more on this in the coming weeks.

As always, my office continues to look for **new ways to engage with you**. Our goal remains to **ensure each and every Mount Vernon neighbor** has the opportunity to **reach their full potential**, and that **Mount Vernon businesses continue to thrive**. TEAM MVD is committed to working with you to address your individual concerns, while working proactively to **deliver a better quality of life** for all District residents. We look forward to hearing from you and seeing you out and about in 2019!

Urban Design Guidelines Workshop

On December 8, the County hosted a very successful workshop to kick-off the **creation of urban design guidelines** for the **Richmond Highway Corridor**. The urban design guidelines will elaborate on design guidance described in the **Embark Comprehensive Plan** to include the overall design, appearance, character and function of streets and **streetscapes, parks, and plazas**; the form of buildings and their relationship to streets and public spaces; and, specific information related to street furnishings and other streetscape details.



Approximately **60 people attended** the workshop and **provided ideas** about the character and appearance of the Richmond Highway Corridor's Community Business Centers (CBCs). The results of this input will be used to better **define the design character** and specific design elements of the CBCs. **Additional opportunities for providing input** on the guidelines will be forthcoming in 2019. Information on the workshop results and community outreach is available on the project's website.

Silverbrook and Lorton Road Intersection Study

The County is conducting a study to identify **intersection improvements** to enhance the intersection operations and increase capacity, specifically through **Silverbrook Road's southbound left-turn movement and Lorton Road's westbound right-turn movement**. In addition, the goal of the study is to address **any safety or operational deficiencies** found through the existing conditions analysis, and address any transportation needs.

FCDOT held a **public meeting** on December 12, to inform residents and invite public feedback. **Public comment can still be provided** through **Wednesday, Jan. 9, 2019**. **View the proposed options** in the presentation below and **take the survey today**!

The two entities are asking for **cultural**, **educational**, **residential**, **commercial** or other uses that complement the Workhouse Arts Center's existing studio, gallery and museum spaces. This could include **food halls**, **restaurants**, **craft breweries**, **craft manufacturing**, **housing**, **arts and entertainment venues**, **business incubators** and possibly other uses. Saving the Environment

Let Your Voice Be Heard at EQAC's Annual Public Hearing

The County Environmental Quality Advisory Council (EQAC) is an advisory group that has been appointed by the County Board of Supervisors to advise the Board on environmental matters. EQAC provides this advice through its Annual Report on the Environment and through resolutions and positions. EOAC recommendations typically



focus on improvement of the County's efforts in environmental protection and enhancement; they also can address legislative issues as well as state, regional, and federal matters. **Environmental issues** considered by EQAC include water quality, air quality, noise, hazardous materials, solid waste, stream valley protection, deer management, light pollution, visual pollution, and the use and preservation of ecological resources.

Each year EQAC holds a public hearing to obtain input on issues of environmental **concern**. The public is encouraged to attend and share views on the state of the environment and to identify any environmental issues applicable to the County. The public also is invited to attend any EQAC meeting and to submit correspondence for EQAC's consideration at any time.

The annual EQAC public hearing will be held on Wednesday, January 9, 2019, at 7:30 p.m. at the County Government Center. Testimony can be in person, written or by video submission. For more information visit.

How the County is Reducing Electricity Costs in County Buildings

Did you know utilities costs for the Government Center, Herrity and Pennino buildings exceed **\$2 million annually**? That's over \$100,000 a month for the Government Center and more than \$35,000 a month each for the Herrity and Pennino buildings. Becoming a more energy-efficient organization is a priority for the Facilities Management Department and the County in general. Not only are costs and carbon emissions considerations, but also the responsibility to be a good corporate citizen. This summer, the County adopted a new, broader operational energy strategy to significantly lower utility bills and carbon emissions. The strategy makes reducing electricity consumption a top priority. Electricity accounted for 51 percent of the county's total energy use in 2016 — and it produced 65 percent of carbon emissions. West Springfield Station Neighborhood Watch







The West Springfield District Station Officers routinely conduct **community outreach presentations** to educate community members about **crime prevention techniques**, impressing upon the them the importance of a continual liaison with the police department. A core component of crime prevention is the **Neighborhood Watch Program**. Training sessions are **conducted several times** throughout the year. In the West Springfield District, there are over **205 neighborhoods** with a Neighborhood Watch in place. In 2018, over **60 newly trained community members** were added to the program in West Springfield. Record Rainfall Challenges Construction Sites; Hotline Available to Report Problems

As you may know, **2018 set record annual rain totals** for the Washington metro area – breaking the record set in 1889. All this rain **wreaks havoc on the many construction sites** in the area.



As a result, the County received more than **twice as many complaints** about erosion and sediment control problems on construction sites in the first ten months of 2018 than were received in all of 2017.

Currently, more than **1,500 construction sites are active** in the County, each of them **monitored by inspectors** from the Site Development and Inspections Division (SDID) of Land Development Services (LDS). When construction disturbs the ground, it is **much more susceptible to eroding**. Rainfall events can loosen soil and carry it with the rainfall **runoff to adjacent properties or streams**.
