The 2017 Virginia elections saw citizens from

Huntington Club Condos to be Redeveloped

An exciting and dynamic new future is planned for the Huntington Club Condominiums that will yield a new mixeduse community in our district.

In an overwhelming 87.7% vote, the club's owner's association voted to terminate its current organizational structure to allow for redevelopment as a mixed-use community, including approximately 1,000 condominiums, 500 apartments, 65 townhomes and over 500,000 square feet of office and retail space in the city of Huntington. The redevelopment is projected to take place over 10 years.

This is the first time in the country a condominium association has voted to terminate itself and redevelop into a mixeduse community, and it is happening right

here in the Mount Vernon District! The Huntington Club Board spent a tremendous amount of time and made a huge commitment to moving this forward to help create a unique opportunity for their residents.

Covanta Fairfax Restoration Update



The I-95 Energy/Resource Recovery Facility,

operating as **Covanta Fairfax** is expected to reopen and be fully operational by mid-late December 2017, after a large fire forced the facility to shutdown earlier this year. The facility processes more than 3,000 tons per day of municipal solid waste for Fairfax County and

Washington, D.C.

Since February 2017, Covanta has been working with the Fairfax County Department of Public Works and Environmental Services, Fairfax County Fire and Rescue, and the community to develop improved systems, operating procedures, and a reopening plan. In the next few weeks, final tests and inspections will be conducted.



I was pleased to tour the facility this week with Springfield Supervisor Pat Herrity, Senator Scott Surovell, Delegate Mark Sickles, Delegate-Elect Kathy Tran and Chairman Bulova's Chief of Staff to see

firsthand the new interior and exterior safety features. I also met with Covanta CEO Stephen Jones to review their commitment to safety as they prepare to reopen.

In conjunction with the reopening, Covanta is implementing two commitments that I insisted be made to the community:

- 1. Improving air quality monitoring and transparency through online daily stack emissions data.
- 2. Deploying new technologies, materials, and procedures to enhance fire detection, prevention, and response performance.

This spring, Covanta will host a **Community Open House**, offering tours of the facility for visitors to see the improvements. A copy of their latest status update to the community can be found by clicking <u>here</u>.

Adequate Shelters for Pets

As winter arrives, please remember to provide your pets with adequate shelter! Outdoor shelters should be insulated in order to keep in warmth during these cold months. Insulation materials can include straw, cedar chips or other materials that do not hold water. Our pets depend on us to keep them warm, healthy and happy, so please make sure your shelter is up to par.

Adequate shelter means:

- Space should be suitable for each animal, considering species, age, condition, type and size of animal.
- It is safe and protects each animal from weather, injury and direct sunlight.
- Protects from heat and insulated from cold temperatures.
- Has proper lighting and is cleaned regularly.
- Allows for animal to be clean and dry, if appropriate for the animal.
- Easily maintained.

Affirmative Duty To Act (3.2-6566 E ach animal control officer, humane investigator or S tate Veterinarian's representative SHALL interfere to prevent the perpetration of any act of cruelty upon any animal in his presence.

Boards, Authorities and Commission Members Needed

Help serve your community by serving on a Fairfax County Board, Authority or Commission. Please ask your friends, neighbors and community members if they are willing to help serve Fairfax County. Supervisor Storck has vacancies on:

• Commission on Aging

To identify and promote better understanding of the problems of the aging and to plan and promote and where it is found necessary, conduct activities to contribute to their well-being. Meetings are at 12:00 p.m. on the third Wednesday of every month, except August.



• Trails and Sidewalks Committee

To report to the Board for the purpose of providing citizen input and oversight to planning and developing a countywide trails system. The Trails and Sidewalks Committee evaluates existing facilities for trails, sidewalks and bicycle routes and assists the county in producing maps of these facilities, and plans new facilities. Committee members also evaluate subdivision plans and site plans for trail facilities. Monthly meetings are held from 7-9 p.m. in conference room 8 at the Fairfax County Government Center, 12000 Government Center Parkway, Fairfax.

• Small Business Commission

The purpose of the Fairfax County Small Business Commission is to: (a) study, report and make recommendations on issues of concern to small businesses in Fairfax County; (b) advise and assist the Board of Supervisors, County Executive and County employees on any matter that will enhance the capability of small businesses to succeed in Fairfax County; and (c) promote and assist small businesses generally, but especially with respect to minority-owned and emerging businesses, to establish themselves, develop, and succeed in their pursuits of commercial opportunities and in their vendor relations with Fairfax County. Meetings are usually last Monday of every month @ 7:00 p.m. in Conference Room 9 or 10, Fairfax County Govt. Center.

• Wetlands Board

The board shall preserve and prevent the despoliation and destruction of wetlands within its jurisdiction while accommodating necessary economic development in a manner consistent with wetlands preservation. Members of the Board shall hold no other public office in the County except that they may be members of the local planning or zoning commission, directors of soil and water conservation boards, or local erosion commissions, the local Board of Zoning Appeals or the Chesapeake Bay Preservation Ordinance Exception Review Committee.
