<u>Sully Historic Site – Mastenbrook Volunteer Matching Fund Grant Program Request – The Sully Foundation (Sully District)</u>

ISSUE:

Approval of a Mastenbrook Volunteer Matching Fund Grant Program request from the Sully Foundation in the amount of \$18,350 to replace the sidewalk and edging in the gardens at Sully Historic Site.

RECOMMENDATION:

The Park Authority Director recommends approval of the Mastenbrook Volunteer Matching Fund Grant Program request from the Sully Foundation in the amount of \$18,350 to replace the sidewalk and edging in the gardens at Sully Historic Site.

TIMING:

Board action is requested on January 25, 2017, in order to award the grant.

BACKGROUND:

The Sully Foundation (TSF) is requesting to replace the existing pathways and edging in the garden at Sully Historic Site (Attachment 1). The garden at Sully Historic Site is an example of a garden that might have been in existence at Sully during the period the family of Richard Bland Lee resided there. All of the plant material has been documented as being available and in use during that time. The edges of the flower beds are finished with historically appropriate bricks that have broken and shifted over time. In addition, the existing oyster shell garden pathways are deteriorated and non-compliant with ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) requirements. The project if approved, with restore all of the edging and bring the pathways into ADA compliance.

TSF is requesting \$18,350 from the Mastenbrook Volunteer Matching Fund Grants Program to help fund the completion of the project (Attachment 2). If approved, the \$18,350 from the Mastenbrook Volunteer Matching Fund Grants Program, along with a \$18,350 contribution from the TSF, will provide the funds sufficient to complete the project. The total project budget is \$36,700.

TSF is a private support group for Sully that was established in 1970. They have supported numerous specialized projects and have given tremendous financial support over the last 40 plus years.

The Park Authority Board Member for the Sully District supports approval of the Grant request. Staff from Sully Historic Site will manage the project, which is scheduled for completion by the spring of 2017. Matching funds are available to complete this project.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The estimated total project cost is \$36,700. Funds are currently available in the amount of \$18,350 in WBS PR-000009, Community Parks/New Facilities-2012, in Fund 300-C30400, Park Authority Bond Construction; and \$18,350 from TSF, resulting in the total available funding of \$36,700.

Contingent on the approval of this project, the remaining balance in the Mastenbrook Volunteer Matching Fund Grant Program will be \$126,562.61.


