

- Commits the county and FCPS to intentionally consider equity when making policies, planning and delivering programs and services
- Involves community engagement, data analysis, collective action planning, and shared accountability
- The key questions:
 - Who benefits and who is burdened by the past and current actions?
 - How can burden be mitigated?



Why One Fairfax? The Tale of Two Counties




- Reports from Community Foundation of Northern Virginia, Northern Virginia Health Foundation, PolicyLink, and Urban Institute document variances in opportunity and vulnerability within Fairfax County and across the Northern Virginia and Metropolitan Washington region.
- Places where people face multiple challenges are interspersed among some of the county's wealthiest communities.
- The most impactful solutions for creating communities of opportunity for all must focus on building and/or ensuring access to economic, education, housing and health opportunity.



Abandoning the one-size-fits-all formula commonly used in the development of policy in favor of an approach that is more inclusive and outcome-oriented

Universal Goal with Targeted Solutions

Structural Inequity produces consistently different outcomes for different communities. Opportunity Structures respond with necessary resources and multiple paths needed for different communities & individuals to thrive.






Understanding Opportunity & Vulnerability

Using analytical tools to better understand and represent the dynamics of opportunity and vulnerability within the county

- Mapping opportunity and vulnerability to measure comprehensively and comparatively
- Examining structural drivers of disparities
 - O Who has access to opportunity?
 - o Who does not?
 - O What needs to be remedied in opportunity-poor communities?
- Proactively identifying where policy interventions and practice changes are needed






Targeting Interventions to Build Opportunity

Facilitate the development of targeted, strategic interventions in lowopportunity areas to cultivate critical opportunity structures for residents

- Engaging businesses and anchor institutions, such as schools, universities and hospitals as partners
- Supporting equitable investment in public infrastructure for lowopportunity neighborhoods
- Leveraging public investment to attract private investment to areas of low opportunity
- Ensuring that existing residents have fair access to emerging opportunities and are not displaced





Targeting Interventions to Connect to Opportunity

Affirmatively connect low-income and otherwise marginalized individuals and families to existing opportunity

- Promoting development in areas of high opportunity and in historically racially and economically segregated areas
- Fostering mobility through a multi-modal transportation network
- Connecting low-income families to existing areas of opportunity through tools such as inclusionary zoning mandates and aiding housing voucher holders looking for affordable housing in higher-opportunity communities
- Providing services and supports to vulnerable children and youth through the Opportunity Neighborhoods organizing framework

Fostering Inclusive Prosperity

Support wealth creation and asset building for residents in low-opportunity areas and for low-income residents

- Promoting broad-based local ownership models such as worker cooperatives and social enterprises
- Keeping dollars spent by the county and other anchor institutions circulating locally
- Closing the loop in traditional workforce development by linking training to actual employers





Putting One Fairfax into Practice

- **The Proposal:** What is the policy, program, practice or decision under consideration?
- **Desired Results:** What are the community-level conditions we aim to impact? What are the outcomes we want to achieve?
- **Assumptions:** What are our beliefs and ideas about the issue, situation, and people involved? How can we counter implicit bias?
- Analysis of Data: What data do we have? What data do we need? What does it tell us?
- **Community Engagement:** How have the people affected by the proposal been engaged? Are there opportunities to expand engagement?
- Strategies for Equity: Who will benefit from or be burdened by this action? What strategies will address vulnerability or build opportunity? How can we mitigate unintended consequences?
- Implementation: Is the plan feasible? Is it adequately resourced? How can we think and act creatively to make "it" happen?
- Accountability: How will impacts be documented and evaluated? Are anticipated outcomes being achieved? How can we course correct?
- Contextual Factors: What factors might influence the proposal? What factors might the proposal influence? What factors are in and/or out of our control?
