ACTION-1

Park Authority Award Recipients for 2022

ISSUE:

Approval of the 2022 selectees for the Elly Doyle Park Service Awards, the Harold Strickland Collaboration and Partnership Award, and the inaugural Justice, Equity, Diversity and Inclusion Award.

RECOMMENDATION:

The Park Authority Executive Director recommends approval of the nominees for the awards outlined in this item to include the slate of nominees forwarded by Dr. Cynthia Carter, chairman of the Awards Committee. The slate was developed via individual discussion and collaboration with fellow Park Authority Board members.

TIMING:

Board action is requested on July 13, 2022 to proceed with preparations for the virtual awards program slated for November 2022. This year's nomination period was extended to provide more time for solicitation and preparation of nominations.

BACKGROUND:

The Park Authority Board provides a host of annual awards to recognize the contributions of individuals and organizations which benefit the park system and ultimately, the residents of Fairfax County. Elly Doyle Park Service Awards recognize volunteer service with the Elly Awards, Special Recognition Awards, and a Youth Award.

The Park Board has also established other award categories that exemplify the attributes and qualities of individuals and organizations that help the Fairfax County Park system thrive in more tangible or specific ways. Each award recognizes a distinct set of standards and characteristics vital to the health and well-being of the system and ultimately the residents who benefit from our park amenities and programs.

The Harold Strickland Collaboration and Partnership Award recognizes those who create and nurture partnerships and collaborative efforts that result in tangible improvements to the park system which minimize the need for taxpayer or park bond funding.

Committee Agenda Item July 13, 2022

The Mayo Stuntz Cultural Stewardship Award, created in 2013, honors the late, longtime historian, author and chairman of the Sully Foundation and celebrates outstanding service through the stewardship of historic resources. The award ultimately honors significant contributions toward the understanding, preservation, and education of history in Fairfax County.

The Sally Ormsby Environmental Stewardship Award recognizes those whose efforts make our community stronger through environmental stewardship. The Ormsby Award honors citizen stewards and those who spread the ethos of resource conservation and protection.

The Chairman's Choice Awards are nominated by the Park Board Chairman, but subject to Board approval. These newly established awards are reflective of significant multi-year contributions of service, support, and advocacy on behalf of the Park Authority.

This year, the Park Authority Board has introduced the Justice, Equity, Diversity and Inclusion Award. This award, recognizes significant, tangible, contributions made by individuals, organizations, or businesses who help accomplish the Park Authority's strategic priority to enhance diversity system-wide and foster a culture of inclusion in parks and/or within the surrounding community.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The cost of the Elly Doyle Park Services Award program is split equally between the Park Authority and Fairfax County Park Foundation. Expenses will be equal to that of years in which a live awards program was presented. Although the November virtual program will be held as in the recent past, a live Volunteer Recognition Day was held this spring boosting expenses. Similarly, we are experiencing increases in the cost of awards. Total expenditures generally run between \$9,000 and \$13,000 per annum. Videography is provided at no cost by Channel 16.



Elly Doyle Award

About

Established in 1988 by the Park Board

Recognizes Ellamae Doyle's years of service and accomplishments as a member and chairman of the Park Authority Board

Eligibility

Open to individuals/groups that have made outstanding service contributions to Fairfax County parks, including Fairfax County Park Authority volunteers

A service contribution is the giving of time or expertise for the advancement of recreational and/or educational opportunities or the protection of natural, cultural and historic resources

The contribution must have occurred within the prior year but may also include accomplishments accumulated over time

Currently serving members of the BOS, the PAB, FCPA paid staff, and the Park Foundation Board of Directors and their paid staff are not eligible

Nominate

Anyone may submit a nomination for the Elly Doyle Park Service Award. Widespread participation in the award process is encouraged

Elly Awards: up to three awards

Youth: One award

Special Recognition: up to

five awards

Harold L. Strickland Award

About

PAB established Harold L. Strickland Partnership and Collaboration Award in 2015

Honors past Park Board member's long service and significant contributions to the parks

This award recognizes the value and of teamwork and cooperation necessary to provide varied constituencies with stateof-the-art park facilities, often at limited, reduced or no capital expense

Eligibility

Harold L. Strickland Partnership and Collaboration Award nominees must demonstrate significant long-term accomplishments that provide residents with tangible examples of the benefits of partnerships and collaborations that help to sustain or grow service while reducing the need for FCPA financial resources to accomplish the service delivery

This award shall be given periodically as deemed appropriate by the Park Authority Board

Nominate

Anyone may submit a nomination for the Harold L. Strickland Partnership and Collaboration Award

Justice, Equity, Diversity and Inclusion

About

The Justice, Equity, Diversity and Inclusion Award is a new award approved by the Park Authority Board on March 23, 2022. This award recognizes significant, tangible contributions made by individuals, organizations or businesses that help accomplish the Park Authority's strategic priority to enhance diversity systemwide and foster a culture of inclusion in parks and/or within the surrounding community.

Eligibility

This award shall be given periodically as deemed appropriate by the Park Authority Board to deserving individuals, businesses, entities, or organizations which demonstrate accomplishments that foster inclusion diversity, equity and justice during the reporting period. Projects, initiatives, and programs must comport with the goals of One Fairfax.

Nominate

The nominations will be reviewed by the Park Authority Board Committee of the Whole. Awards are given only when a qualifying nomination is received

One award is given per annum.

Outstanding Volunteer

About

The Park Authority recognizes that volunteers strengthen Fairfax County, that volunteering makes a positive impact on the environment, on the quality of life and on the health and well-being of our community; and that volunteering is an essential part of living in a thriving society adding enormous benefits and opportunities to our park system

Eligibility

Active volunteer at one of the FCPA sites

Nominate

Peers and site managers nominate the Outstanding Volunteers at each site.



ADMINISTRATIVE

Resolution Honoring the Fairfax County Park Authority's Outstanding Volunteers of 2022.

ISSUE:

Seeking approval of the resolution to honor the Fairfax County Park Authority's Outstanding Volunteers of 2022 for their service to the Park Authority and the residents of Fairfax County.

RECOMMENDATION:

The Park Authority Director recommends approval of the resolution honoring the Fairfax County Park Authority's Outstanding Volunteers of 2022.

TIMING:

Board action is requested on July 13, 2022.

BACKGROUND:

The Park Authority is once again benefitting from the work of volunteers who despite the ongoing threat of exposure to COVID-19 have returned to duty at sites throughout the park system. They were the last to leave their posts at the height of the pandemic and the first to return as vaccines and safety protocols made it possible to reopen our parks. For their service to the residents of Fairfax County and the park system we are forever grateful.

Recent statistics indicate that commitment to public service remains and continues to return to more normal numbers. In 2020, volunteers faced many challenges to their service, but they continued to show up. In fact, they logged nearly 69,000 hours of service and we had 4,301 volunteers. In 2021, as the pandemic restrictions eased further and facilities and programs took on new approaches to service, volunteers were eager to return and demonstrate their dedication to supporting the park system. In 2021, the Park Authority tracked 112,236 hours of volunteer service from 4,275 volunteers. There are early indications of the continuing resurgence in volunteer service with first quarter tallies in 2022 indicating nearly 27,000 hours of service and 4,065 volunteers in action.

Volunteer service with the Park Authority clearly offers unique experiences, the chance to see tangible change, provides the opportunity to learn new skills and the satisfaction of teaching new skills, educated families about the environment and in many cases, digging in and getting your hands dirty. Our volunteers bring passion, action and dedication regardless of where they work: digging in the group, pulling weeds, helping at a Rec Center or golf course or leading programs at a nature center. These essential, good-hearted, hard-working, and resilient volunteers enhance the visitor experience for all those who visit our parks and collectively represent a fiscally-sound approach to the provision of services in support of our mission. Without their help, our park system would be challenged to meet the mandate of community expectations, CAPRA accreditation, and of regional and national leadership in the field of recreation and parks.

Recent statistics indicate that across America the values and spirit of volunteers continues to rise to the needs. Approximately 63 million Americans — 25% of the adult population — volunteer their time, talents, and energy to making a difference. Volunteer time in the United States is currently valued at \$28.54 per hour. This calculation is based on hourly earnings released by the US Bureau of Labor Statistics and AmeriCorps data on volunteer hours. It's estimated that volunteers contribute nearly \$200 billion in value to US communities. In Virginia that value is estimated to be \$30.80 per hour (2021), a 5.7% increase from 2020.

The Fairfax County Park Authority Board recognizes that volunteers strengthen Fairfax County; that volunteering makes a positive impact on the environment, on the quality of life, and on the health and well-being of our community.

WHEREAS, local volunteers are a big part of the national and state volunteer movement that attracts millions of individuals annually to the call for service and offers not just personal and community benefit but a tangible fiscal impact that allows park systems across America to thrive despite limits to government support; and

WHEREAS, the Fairfax County Park Authority Board recognizes that volunteers strengthen Fairfax County, that volunteering makes a positive impact on the environment, on the quality of life and on the health and well-being of our community, and that volunteering is an essential part of living in a thriving society, adding enormous benefits and opportunities to our park system;
