SPACE SAVERS & BOUNTIFUL BERRIES \$17

2 New Jersey Tea (Ceanothus americanus) 3' tall. Full to part sun. Dry soils.

Clusters of white flowers May-Sept. and yellow to tan fall color. Does well in meadows and other dry open areas. Fixes nitrogen. 2 Spicebush (Lindera benzoin) 6.5-16' tall. Partial to full shade. Wet to moist soils.

Yellow flowers Mar-May, edible red berries Sep-Oct. Yellow fall foliage. High wildlife value for songbirds, small mammals, and butterflies. Performs well in loamy to sandy soil on shaded wooded slopes, and floodplain forests. 2 Aromatic Sumac (Rhus aromatica) 6' tall. Full to part sun. Dry soils.

Fuzzy edible wine-red berry clusters July-Mar. and aromatic leaves. Red fall foliage. High wildlife value for songbirds, small mammals, and beneficial insects. Performs well in rocky areas and slopes.

2 Beautyberry

(Callicarpa americana) 6' tall. Full to partial sun. Dry to moist soils.

Lavender-pink flowers June-Aug. and lavender berries Sept.-Mar. Can be easily pruned if overgrown to 18" and will regrow in a season. Found in woods and moist thickets.
