

A Visit to Colvin Run Mill Historic Site

I am going to Colvin Run Mill Historic Site. At the site, there are three historical structures. By visiting these structures, I will learn about the milling process and the history of the families who owned and operated the Mill.

When I first arrive at the site, I will walk from the parking lot towards an archway. I will walk under the archway and follow the brick path towards the General Store.

The General Store is the first building I will see. If the door is locked, I will ring the doorbell. This will let the staff working in different parts of the park know that I want to go into the store. It might take a few minutes for someone to come let me in, but the wait will not be long.


I can use the walking tour brochure to decide what I want to see. If I prepared a checklist of things I want to see, I can use the walking tour brochure to find the things I wanted to see.
