Important Information for Parents about how to prepare for a merit badge program at Frying Pan Farm Park

Make sure you are aware of the requirements and activities for the merit badge that you are registering for. The full requirements for all badges can be found online. Some merit badges involve a sizable time commitment as well as long term planning and in the case of Farm Mechanics, the scouts will be working with machinery that will require them to listen attentively to the instructor and follow every single safety rule. This therefore may not be appropriate for younger scouts.

Merit badges also require a certain amount of work completed independently by the scout. This will often times involve planning ahead and possibly visiting other sites. This work is called "pre-work" because if it is completed when the scout comes in to do the program then they will have fulfilled all the requirements for the merit badge and the counselor will be able to sign their merit badge card. If that work is not completed, we will work with the scout and the scout's family to schedule times for the scout to come in when the work is completed, have it reviewed by a qualified counselor and then signed.

Note you will have to contact and schedule an appointment with an appropriate staff member to do this. Not all staff members are qualified for all badges.

We do not have blue cards here at Frying Pan. Please bring your authorized blue card to the program in order to get it signed and officially meet the requirements of the badge.

Please *prepare for the possibility that you may have to stay for the program and not just drop off your scout.* We encourage that one or more adults remain. There is no a fee for adults and you are sure to learn something. This will allow the instructor to concentrate more fully on the difficult task of imparting all the required information and assisting the boys individually if necessary, while other adults keep the atmosphere calm and productive. It is also in keeping with the scouting guidelines for youth protection.

Be sure your scout is dressed appropriately for being outdoors for some or all of the program time.

Packing water and snacks is wise for long programs and programs scheduled in hot weather months.

Lastly, obtaining copies of the scout resource booklet for the merit badge can help prepare your scout working with his counselor and for completing any independent study. Books for the badges can be ordered at your local scouting store or at www.scoutstuff.org .

Below are the specific pre-work requirements for this merit badge:

- 1b. Draw a plan showing a well-equipped farm shop. Point out the shop's mandatory safety devices and features. This will require the scout to research how farm shops are typically laid out and what the main safety features in a shop are. They are encouraged to visit one to help them draw their layout.
- 1c. Find all the universal warning and safety symbols on a piece of equipment and explain what they mean. Essentially the scout needs to pick one piece of equipment that would be found in a typical farm mechanics shop and explain all the warnings, symbols, and safety instructions. The scout will be asked in class about the equipment they chose.
- 5. Visit an implement dealer. Interview the dealer, technician, or service manager for hints on good preventive maintenance. Ask why it is important, the costs, and what causes wear or damage. Report what you learn. The scout will be best served planning this out ahead of time! Many dealers, technicians or service managers are busy but if given enough heads up will be happy to talk about what they know (it's not often they get asked).
- 7. Find out about three career opportunities in farm mechanics. Pick one and find out about the education, training, and experience required for this profession. Discuss this with your counselor, and explain why this profession might interest you. As with requirement 7, the scout will be asked in class to explain the career they chose to research and whether it interests them.
