

# What's the story behind the sculpture?

Two lightning bolts turned the huge tree just outside the picture window into an imminent danger to the building. The evidence of the lightning strikes can be seen as cracks in the large owl and under the carved lightning bolt. The tree was the focal point of the



woodlands from the center, and a feeding station for flying squirrels and birds. Its loss was keenly felt by staff, park visitors, and the nature center's wildlife neighbors. But the lightning did not damage the tree's base. Staff, with the fundraising support of Friends of Hidden Oaks Nature Center, (FOHONC), arranged for a ten-foot stump to remain so that chainsaw artist Andrew Mallon could create a sculpture of critters that enjoyed the tree's gifts over its 128-year life. The carving will delight visitors for the next 20 years.

Because it is near the nature center, the artwork is easily accessible for all visitors.

Woodland Wildlife Tree Sculpture





### Did you know?

How was it made? Over a period of two weeks, chainsaw artist Andrew Mallon used a variety of chainsaws, handsaws, and wood routers to create the vision of the nature center staff. He also carved a bench out of portions of the tree's trunk, thanks to financial support from the Rotary Club of Bailey's Crossroads.

**What kind of tree was this?** The carving is the 10-foot stump of a 100-foot tulip poplar.

**Can you climb on it?** Please don't! Climbing would damage the artwork. Please touch the tree and sit only on the bench.

**Is it a real tree?** Yes, it was carved from a standing tulip poplar. It is coated with a protective spray that will preserve it for many years. Look for the roots radiating from the base.

What are those lines around the tiny rabbit at the front? A carving of tall grass growing from a rock mound. Dead trees (snags), grass and rocks provide shelter for wildlife.
