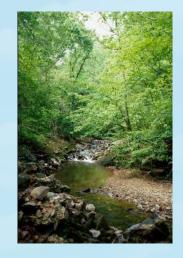

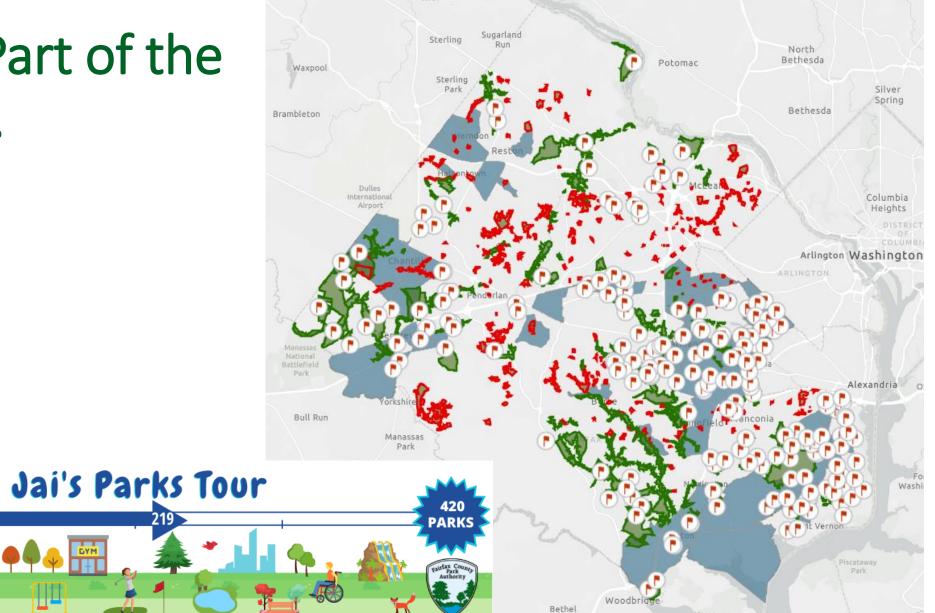
Parks: One of the Heroes of COVID

- During COVID closures/restrictions, park use increased dramatically:
 - Park Attendance was up 60% from pre-pandemic times
 - Over 31,000 participants took advantage of virtual programming
 - Pool reservations regularly reached capacity
 - Summer camps reached capacity for registrations
 - Summer entertainment series had record attendance
 - Golf Rounds increased over 50% from FY19
 - Audrey Moore was converted to a mask-making facility

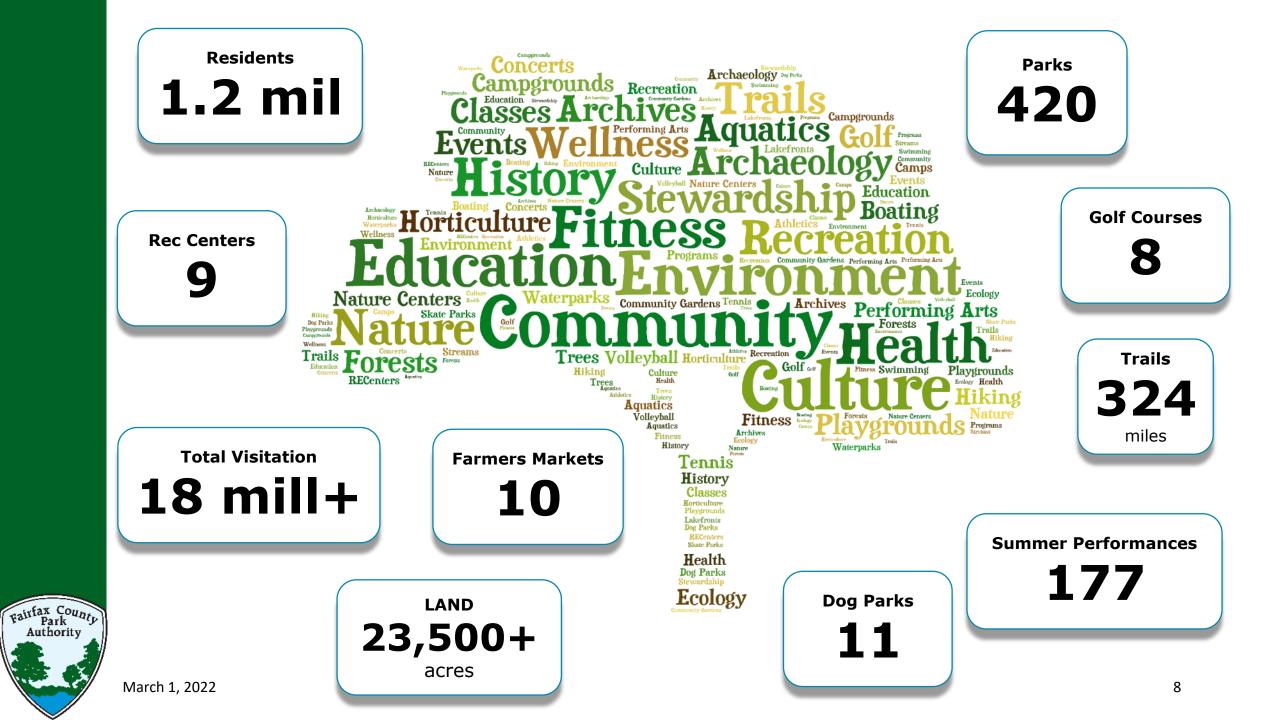

Capital Improvement Program Updates

- Recent changes to the Park Bond cycle no bond until 2026 will impact our Capital Improvement Program
 - Insufficient funding to improve our REC Centers or maintain facilities
 - Limited funding for new projects playgrounds, fields, trails, etc.
 - Limited funding for acquisition of parkland and open space
 - Limited funding for Mastenbrook matching grants
- Hard choices will have to be made on CIP implementation
- Restoration of bond cycle and increased ability to spend bond dollars annually is critical

 - \$4.57/\$100 Value

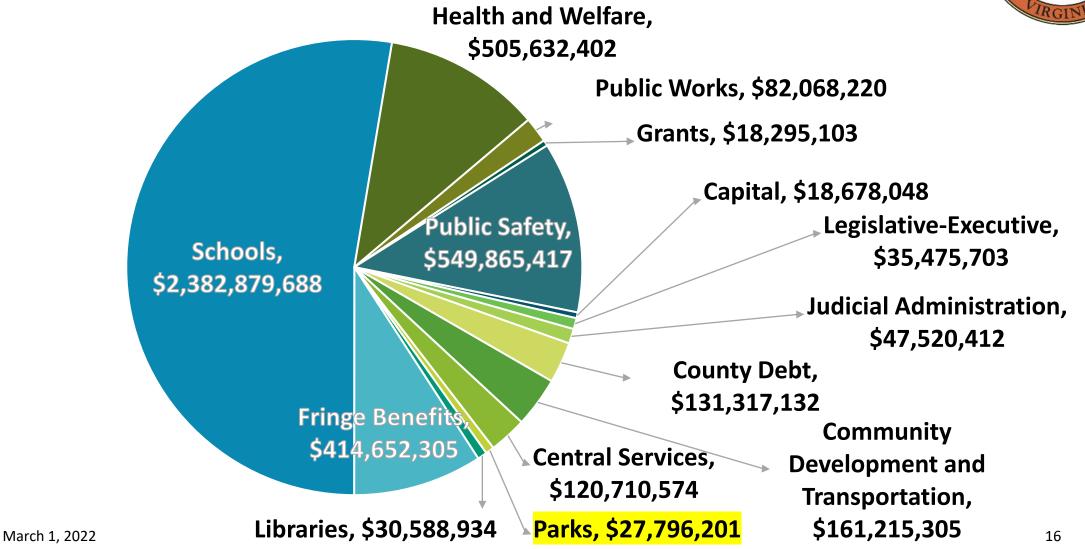

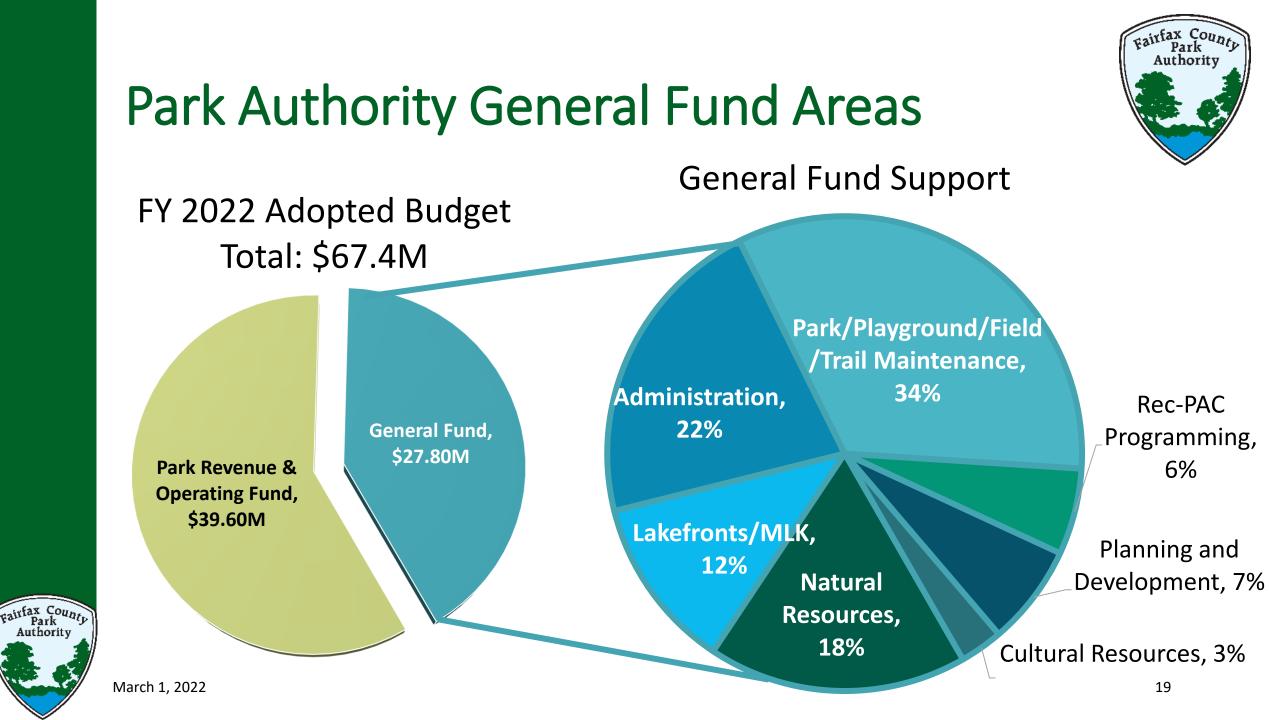






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Park Authority Operating Budget

Facts about Vacancy Rates in the County

- Countywide Challenges
 - Not funded by position
 - All county agencies hold vacancies to make budget
- Park Authority Challenges
 - Every year, move funding from personnel to operate facilities
 - Hiring difficulty
 - Retention difficulty in certain positions

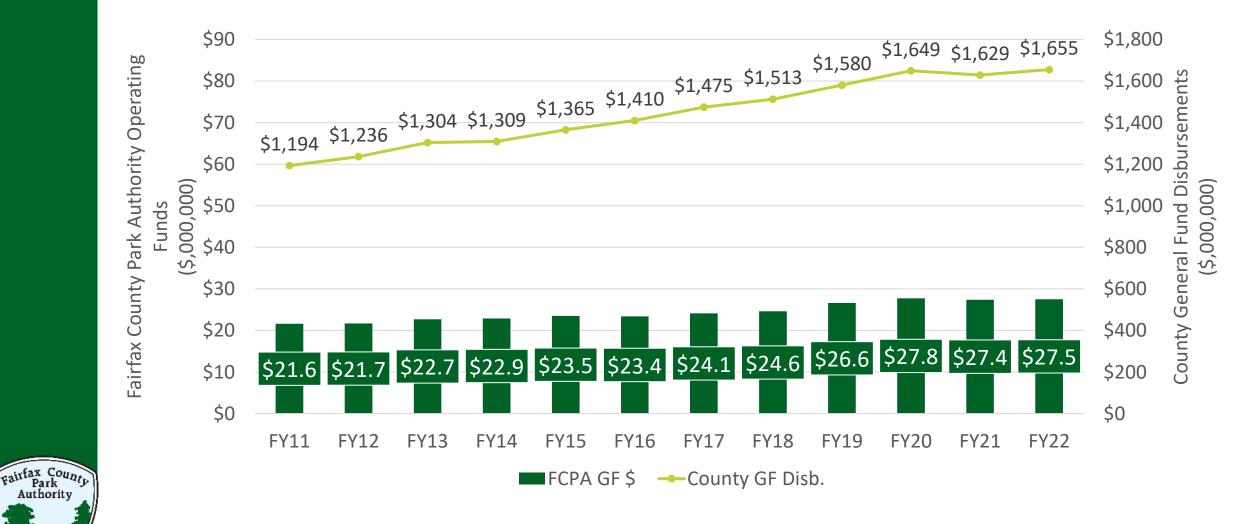

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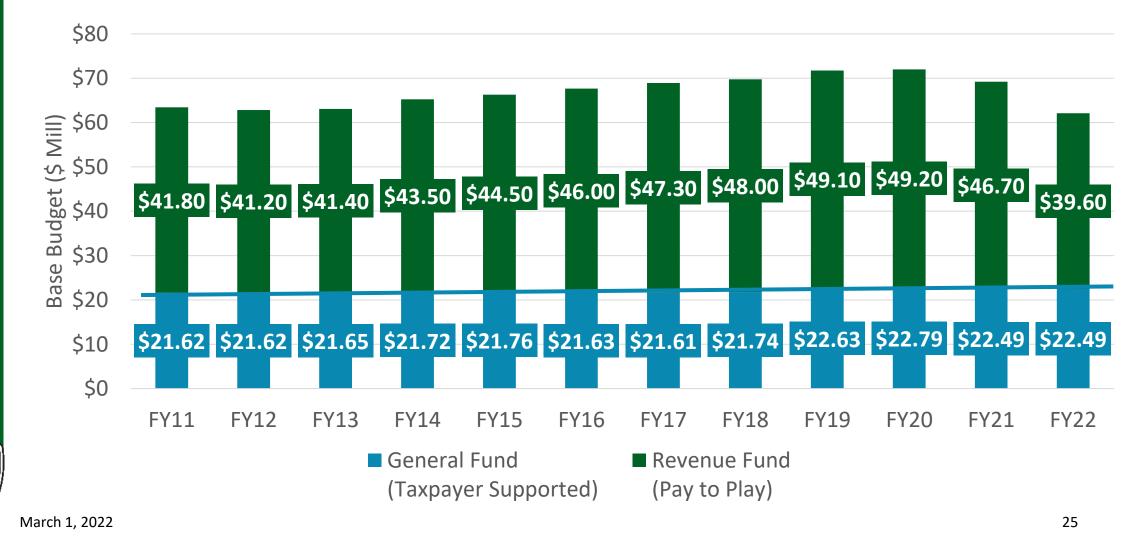
General Fund Investment in Park Authority



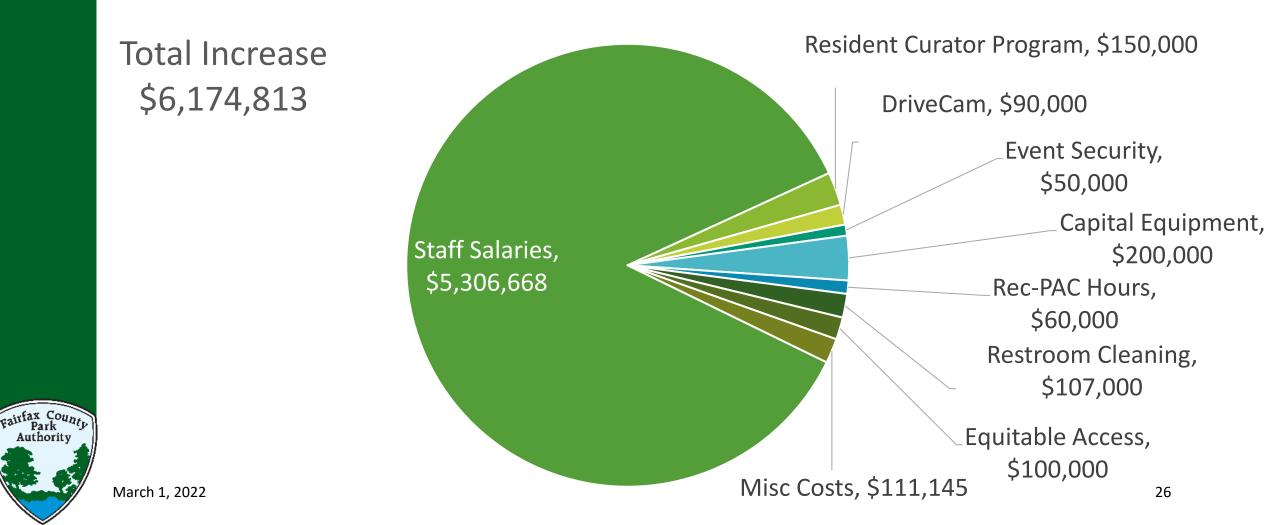

General and Revenue Fund Budgets (less Baseline Salary Adjustments)

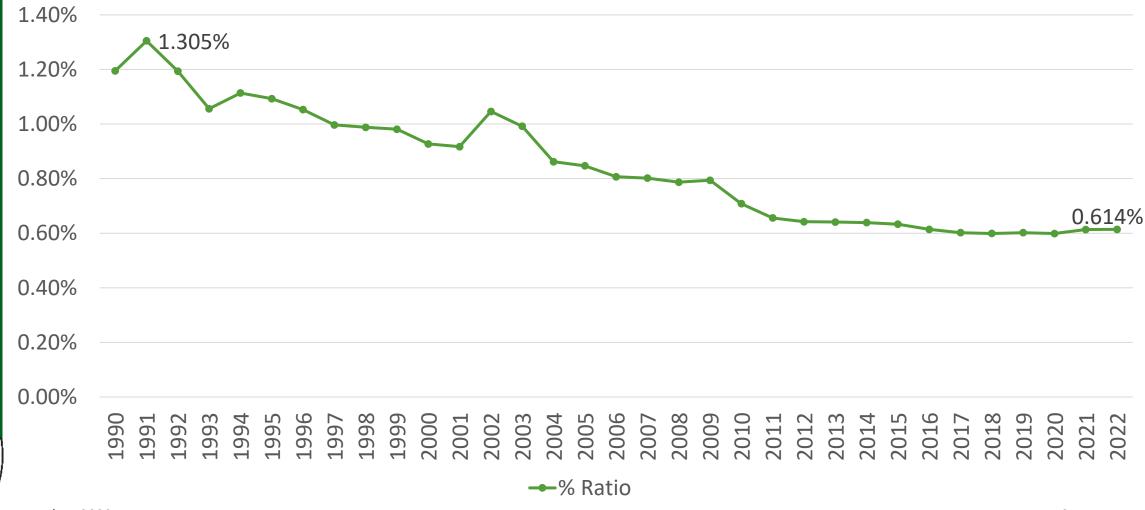

Facts to Share – General Fund

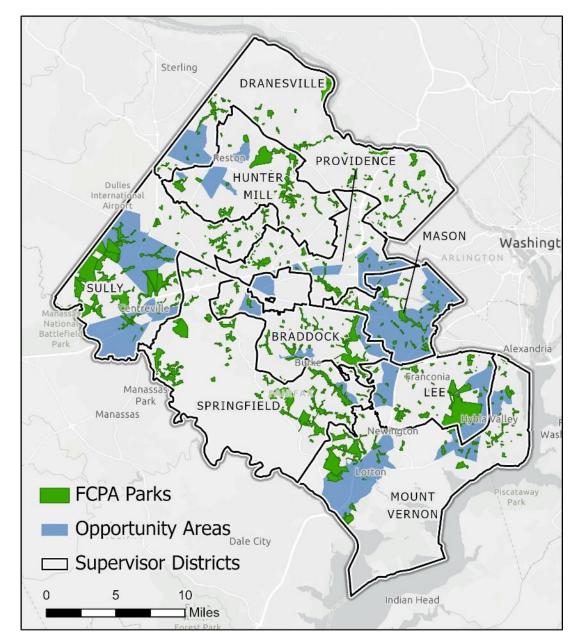
- A fee-based model does not create an equitable and accessible park system
- General Fund support has decreased over past ten years while the park system has grown, and visitation increased significantly
- Operating funds are not adequate for park system with 24,000 acres, 420 parks, serving 1.2 million residents with over 18,000,000 annual visits
- Parks have been one of the heroes of the pandemic, investment is needed just to keep up with the expanding demand and use

Facts to Share – Bond Program

- Recent changes to the Park Bond cycle no bond until 2026
- Four-year bond of \$100M now a six-year bond of \$100M
- Impacts our Capital Improvement Program
- Seeking a bond cycle that allows us to get to deferred maintenance, invest in all our facilities and provide an equitable park system is critical



Budget Process Timeline



- Board of Supervisors Advertises Maximum Tax Rate
- Mar \$.01 = About \$28m Between County and Schools
 - Public Hearings on Proposed Budget and Tax Rate
- Apr
 Board of Supervisors Amends Proposed Budget with Mark-Up

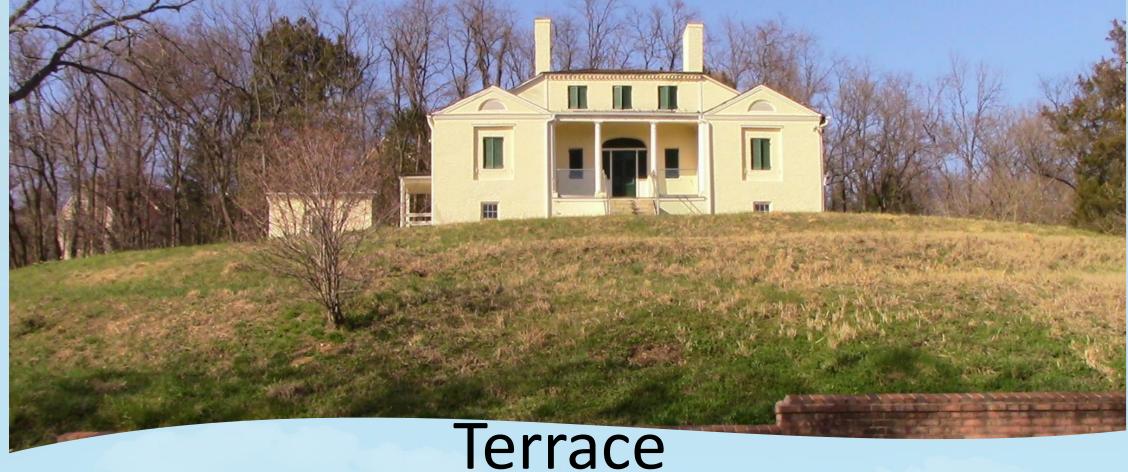
