

Holmes Run Acres House Types

- All frame construction sheathed in wood and brick
- Often contain massive brick chimneys
- Windows dominate the façade
- Roof is either shed or gable
- Modular quality and the post and beam construction allows additions to be made as necessary

One-story Luria, 1951-1952

- Common-bond, brick chimney
- Has one bay porch with square wood posts
- Broad low-pitch, gable roof with wide eave overhangs
- May have an attached or separate carport
- The enclosing of the garage or carport is a common alteration to a one-story dwelling
- Often built on a flat or gently sloping lot



One-story Luria
examples

Two-story Luria, 1951-1952

- Sheathed in vertical board and brick veneer
- Rectangular-shaped
- Wood windows on the second floor are fixed and the one over one light windows on first and second floor are double-hung sash
- Porch stoop is concrete with no roof
- Low-pitch gable roof has wide eave overhangs
- May have a garage on the first floor, no garage or detached garage
- May be built into the land or stand independently depending on the characteristics of the lot
- The enclosing of the garage or carport is most common alteration to a two-story dwelling



Two-story Luria
examples

Gaddy House, 1954-1955

- Two-story, frame dwelling, covered in vertical board and brick veneer
- Essentially a larger version of the two-story Luria
- Carport was originally attached to side of the house
- Enclosure of the carport is a common modification



Gaddy Examples

Bodor House, 1957-1958

- Two-story, with shallow-pitched, gable roofs
- Contrasting material of brick, wood and glass
- The entry has large windows immediately adjacent to and above the first floor door
- Has a larger carport than previous designs, with a screened-in porch at the rear of the carport
- Frequently sited on sloping lots
