

Our History

Since 1969, Fairfax County has recognized historically significant buildings, sites, and objects.

Changing architectural styles, building materials, and construction methods are represented in log houses built by colonial settlers, Georgian and Federal mansions of our Founding Fathers, Reconstruction-era schools and churches built by African Americans, post-World War II mid-century modern housing, and more.

Grist mills and bridges highlight engineering principles used in historic industrial buildings and transportation infrastructure.

Inventory sites connect us with the past, providing a sense of place that enriches our community.




One of the Commission's first responsibilities was to establish the Inventory of Historic Sites.


