Crime Prevention Tips

Summer Safety

As more people are able to get out and to travel this summer, here are a few tips to help keep you safe.

VEHICLES

- Do not leave your vehicle unattended with it's windows down or doors unlocked. Secure your vehicle AT ALL TIMES, EVEN AT HOME!
 - AT HOME!
- If your vehicle is parked outside overnight, try to keep it in a lighted area as a deterrent to thieves.
- Make sure all valuables are out of sight or removed from your vehicle.
- Do not leave children or pets left unattended in vehicles. Please note temperatures inside of a vehicle can be considerably hotter than the temperature outside. Excessive heat can cause serious injury or death.

VACATION WATCH

If you are going out of town, notify neighbors and family/friends and ask

- that they keep an eye on your home.
- Make sure your home is locked up and secure.
- Stop your mail or have someone retrieve it for you.
- Set a light on a timer inside of your home to create the appearance of activity inside.
- Exterior motion sensor lighting can aide in deterring crime.
- Keep valuables away from public view such as through a window. Place valuables in a safe if possible.
- Do not post your vacation plans on social media.

BIKE RIDING

- Check your bike to make sure the tires are inflated and the brakes are working. Put reflectors on the front and back of your bike.
- · Wear a safety helmet and pads for protection.
- If you ride on the street, keep to the right and follow all traffic signs.
- Be on the lookout for traffic, yield to vehicles and signal when turning.
- Use the crosswalks and yield to pedestrians. If you have to cross at an intersection, look both ways and walk your bike to the other side.
- Stay alert and watch out for hazards.
- When you park your bike, make sure you lock it up.

WARRANT SERVICE/NARCOTICS POSSESSION/WEAPONS POSSESION: 6800 block of Springfield Blvd, 5/24/21, 10:43 p.m. Neighborhood Patrol Units located a wanted man and took him into custody. **Marco Rosasco**, 23, of Lorton, was also in possession of marijuana, cocaine, and two firearms. He was subsequently charged with the outstanding warrant, possession of a schedule I

or II drug, carrying a concealed weapon, two counts of possession of a schedule I or II drug while in possession of a firearm, possession of a schedule I or II narcotic and felony possession of marijuana.

COMMERCIAL BURGLARY: 6869 Springfield Boulevard (Mint Tobacco and Vape), 5/18/21, 2:04 a.m. Someone forced entry into the business and took property.

STABBING: 6000 block of Springfield Mall, 5/15/21, 7:31 p.m. The victim was waiting in line when a fight involving several juveniles occurred close to him. The victim attempted to push the fighting juveniles away when he was stabbed in the upper body. The victim was taken to the hospital with injuries that are not considered life threatening.

COMMERCIAL BURGLARY: 7601 Brookfield Plaza (Shri Krissna Grocery), 5/10/21, 11:15 a.m. Someone forced entry into the business and took property.

COMMERCIAL BURGLARY: 7016 Commerce Street (Metro PCS), 5/4/21, 12:51 a.m. Someone forced entry into the business. Nothing appeared to be taken.

ATTEMPTED ROBBERY: 7700 block of Gunston Plaza, 5/1/21, 5:13 p.m. The victim was walking when a black car stopped next to him, a man exited the car and tried to take the victim's property. The victim was able to retain his property and the suspect drove away.

SEXUAL ASSAULT - ARREST: Detectives from our Major Crimes Bureau arrested a 34-year-old man after he sexually assaulted a teenager in Springfield. On 5/13/21 just before 4 p.m., officers responded to the Town Center after a teenager was followed and sexually assaulted by an unknown man inside a bathroom. The 17-year-old victim contacted his mother who called police and provided a description of the suspect. Officers assigned to patrol the Town Center quickly located and detained the man. After an hourslong investigation, detectives charged **Corey Venable** of Washington D.C. with forcible sodomy, abduction with the intent to defile and providing false information to law enforcement. He was also served with an outstanding warrant from another agency. Venable is held at the Adult Detention Center without bond.

The report contains selected crimes. This report is not a comprehensive list of every police event in the district in the month. Information contained in the Info Sheet is generally based on initial reports made to the police department. Follow-up investigations may reveal different or additional information.

SERVICE - CIVIL DISPUTE (Anti-Black), Tuesday - 05/04, 6200 block

of Backlick Rd: The complainant reported having an argument with a cab driver about the fare. The cab driver then called him a racial epithet and left the scene.

SERVICE - CIVIL DISPUTE (UNK/Offender Motivation not known), Wednesday - 05/12, 6700 block of Blanche Dr.: The reporting party advised one of his neighbors tried to instigate a fight, then called him racial slurs.

SERVICE - CIVIL DISPUTE (Anti-Hispanic), Saturday - 05/01, 7900 block of Timarand Ct.: A dispute between neighbors over loud music led to one of them telling the other to "go back to your county."

SUSPICIOUS EVENT (Anti-Male/Homosexual/Gay), Sunday - 05/16, **6500 Springfield Mall:** The complainants reported that an employee of a kiosk was rude and made discriminatory statements to them.

WEAPONS - BRANDISHING (Anti-Asian/Pacific Islander), Friday -05/07, Beulah St. and Manchester Blvd.: The caller stated that a black male pulled out an assault gun at him due to a road rage incident. The male also made comments regarding the race of the involved party.



Each month the Franconia District Station Traffic Enforcement Officer selects areas of the traffic code for special enforcement emphasis. The areas chosen are based on county-wide traffic safety focus areas, seasonal variables, public safety concerns, and other factors. For the month of June, the enforcement areas below have been selected. You can view the detailed information for each area by clicking on the section heading.

June 1st – 30th Move Over Enforcement

 46.2-861.1 Drivers to yield right-of-way or reduce speed when approaching stationary emergency vehicles on highways; penalties.

June 1st - 30th Bicycle Safety

- 46.2-800. Riding bicycles, electric personal assistive mobility devices, electric power-assisted bicycles, or mopeds; riding or driving animals.
- 46.2-839. Passing bicycle, electric personal assistive mobility device,

electric power-assisted bicycle, moped, animal, or animal-drawn vehicle.

• 82-6-38.1. - Use of a protective helmet while operating a bicycle.

Officers of the Year 2020

PFCs Shea Keaveny, Ryan Kelley and Adam Moya were recognized as Officers of the Year 2020. The three were previously recognized as Officers of the Quarter for the 3rd Quarter 2020.

The three officers were cited for their actions when they responded to a 9-1-1 call and were met by a woman whose ex-boyfriend was in the bathtub with a knife cutting himself after making suicidal statements and taking prescription medication.

They entered the bathroom and began negotiating with the knife-armed subject. When he was distracted, PFC Kelley struck his wrist in an unsuccessful attempt to dislodge the knife. The subject, delusional from the medication, climbed out of the bathtub with the knife in his hand. PFC Keaveny deployed his pepper spray. When the subject dropped the knife and covered his face, PFCs Kelley, Moya, and Keaveny moved in and handcuffed him. They began first aid by applying a tourniquet for deep lacerations on the arm and treating other lacerations.

These officers needed to put their lives on the line to save an individual in mental crisis. They did their job to the fullest and without hesitation.
