Successes and challenges faced in 2015 by your agency related to crime in your jurisdiction.

Challenges

The crime rate for FCPD decreased in 2015. Like most law enforcement agencies, the FCPD will continue to aggressively focus on crime reduction and quality service to the community. Crime in the community is not acceptable and efforts will continue to address those activities that can harm the community.

FCPD is committed to exceptional service delivery to the community and will continue to focus on doing that even with challenges involving staffing and personnel allocation throughout the county.

Successes

Over 400 FCPD officers have received 40 hours of crisis intervention training. These officers will collaborate with the Fairfax County-Falls Church Community Services Board at the Merrifield Crisis Response Center to provide valuable mental health needs and services. With the implementation of the Diversion First program, officers may divert individuals suffering from mental illness who commit low level and low risk offenses from the criminal justice system to Diversion First. The goal is to achieve 100% FCPD officers trained.

The Policy and Directives Change Team was created to assist with procedural implementation of Police Executive Research Forum (PERF) recommendations, Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA) mandated standards, and Ad Hoc Commission recommendations.

Throughout the year, policies and general orders have been updated and revised to improve the agency's operations, enhance service to the community, ensure accountability, and demonstrate continued transparency.

Response Time

Response Time indicates the length of time elapsed (in minutes) from the time a call was entered by DPSC to the arrival of the (first) officer on scene.

Priority 1: A life threatening event is occurring or has occurred.

Priority 2: An event of serious threat to property or public order or the possibility of escalating to life threatening exists.

Priority 3: An event presents a threat to public safety or convenience.

For Priority 1-3 calls for service, response times are filtered to exclude those responses with indicated values or times equal to or greater than 65 minutes. This exclusion accounts for outlier values created when the first responding officer's time of arrival on scene has not been captured in a given event.

NOTE: Priority 4-9 events are not included in provided data statistics because the call nature may be

How does your agency define/classify Human Trafficking Investigations? (E.g.what types of charges are included?)

Human Trafficking is defined as follows:

1. The act of compelling any person to work or to engage in a commercial sex act.
2. The act of inducing anyone under the age of 18 into engaging in any sexual act in exchange for anything of value (money, clothes, drugs, food, shelter, etc)

The federal definition is: To induce, recruit, harbor, transport, provide, or obtain a person through force, fraud, or coercion, for the purposes of forced labor or commercial sex.

The state definition (and the state charge 18.2-357.1) is: Any person who, with the intent to receive money or other valuable thing or to assist another in receiving money or other valuable thing from the earnings of a person from prostitution or unlawful sexual intercourse solicits, invites, recruits, encourages, or other causes or attempts to cause a person to engage in commercial sex.

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
