
At FCPD, our unwavering commitment is to deliver top-tier service to our community through a suite of pioneering programs.

PUBLIC SAFETY WELLNESS CENTER



MENTAL HEALTH AWARENESS CONFERENCE

In 2024, The Wellness Center hosted a department-wide event focused on suicide prevention. A significant 68.3% of the attendees were from FCPD. This highlights FCPD's commitment to mental health awareness, where the risk of suicide can be higher. It also emphasizes the importance of creating a supportive environment for individuals to address mental health challenges and seek help.




SUICIDE PREVENTION CONFERENCE

The Fairfax County Public Safety Wellness Center hosted a Public Safety Suicide Prevention Conference, drawing over 130 first responders from across the National Capital area. Held on World Suicide Prevention Day, the event highlighted the importance of mental health support for those on the front lines of public safety.

The conference featured two powerful keynote speakers. Dr. Tamika Lett shared her personal story as the widow of a Newport News officer who died by suicide in 2022, highlighting the need for proactive mental health support for first responders and their families. Lieutenant Tommy Bolin, a 28-year fire service veteran, spoke on the impact of unresolved trauma and sleep deprivation, stressing the urgency of mental health resources for first responders.

OPERATION PRESS CHECK

Operation Press Check



The Fairfax County Police Department's (FCPD) Operation Press Check (OPC) initiative continues to achieve success in its mission to combat illegal firearm possession and ensure the safety of Fairfax County. Established in partnership with the Office of the Commonwealth's Attorney, OPC focuses on strengthening investigations and prosecutions of convicted felons found with firearms.

Key Takeaways:

- Enhanced Felon in Possession Prosecutions:** Operation Press Check strengthens FIP cases by fostering close collaboration between detectives and prosecutors, leading to more successful prosecutions.

- Internal Partnerships:** Our CIU provides investigative support, CAU utilizes data-informed strategies to measure impact, and the Fairfax County Criminal Justice Academy equips officers with essential knowledge.
- External Partnerships:** FCPD collaborates with ATF to enhance FIP investigations and leverages NIBIN to identify, apprehend, and prosecute firearm-related offenders.
- Training & Collaboration:** Officers receive specialized training, and Operation Press Check ensures coordination with federal and state agencies for a more effective response.



REAL TIME CRIME CENTER

Captain Hudson Bull

From leading Fairfax County Police Department's state-of-the-art crime center to reuniting missing persons with their families, Captain Hudson Bull's impact on Fairfax County earned him international recognition as one of IACP's 40 Under 40 in 2024.

Known for his visionary leadership, Captain Bull has been instrumental in transforming FCPD's technological capabilities, notably by creating and developing the FCPD's Real Time Crime Center (RTCC). The RTCC, under Captain Bull's leadership, serves as a critical hub for integrating cutting-edge technology and operational intelligence to support proactive policing strategies, helping officers respond swiftly and effectively.



FLOCK SAFETY LPR



The Fairfax County Police Department (FCPD) marks two years since implementing License Plate Reader (LPR) technology, a vital tool in enhancing community safety. Since launching in November 2022, LPRs have helped prevent crime, solve cases, and locate missing persons. Using advanced technology from Flock Safety and Axon, both fixed and mobile LPRs have played a key role in numerous investigations.

NORTHERN VIRGINIA REGIONAL INTELLIGENCE CENTER (NVRIC)

NVRIC NAMED FUSION CENTER OF THE YEAR




The Northern Virginia Regional Intelligence Center (NVRIC) was honored as the **Fusion Center of the Year** by the National Fusion Center Association. Selected from more than 80 fusion centers across the country, this recognition highlights NVRIC's outstanding contributions to intelligence-led policing and public safety.

Jointly operated by **FCPD, Virginia State Police, and 20 local, state, and federal agencies**, NVRIC plays a critical role in enhancing regional security. By leveraging shared resources, expertise, and intelligence, the center strengthens the ability to identify, detect, prevent, and respond to criminal and terrorist threats across Northern Virginia.

Over the past year, NVRIC processed **772 requests for information and 1,130 tips and leads**, a significant increase from previous years.

A key achievement was the 2023 launch of the **Threat Assessment and Management (TAM) Unit**, which takes a proactive, multidisciplinary approach to preventing targeted violence. The unit has reviewed **over 400 cases**, successfully resolving many without incident and providing intervention for individuals at risk of engaging in violence.





RECRUITING AND RETENTION INNOVATIONS: BUILDING OFFICERS TO THEIR BEST



In 2024, the Fairfax County Police Department remained committed to attracting and retaining top talent to serve our community. Nearly 130 police officers proudly graduated from the Fairfax County Criminal Justice Academy, joining the ranks of our dedicated force.

We leveraged social media like never before, using “Day in the Life” Instagram Reels to provide an inside look at the academy experience—following a recruit from training to graduation. Additionally, we continued to offer our competitive \$15,000 hiring bonus, reinforcing our commitment to recruiting the best and brightest to keep Fairfax County safe.

PARIS OLYMPICS 2024

FCPD SUPPORTS SECURITY AT THE 2024 PARIS OLYMPICS

The Fairfax County Police Department (FCPD) was one of only four U.S. agencies selected to assist with security at the 2024 Paris Olympic Games, highlighting its professionalism and commitment to public safety.

A team of 12 FCPD officers and an explosive detection canine worked alongside the French National Police to secure venues, patrol high-traffic areas, and support transportation security. Their extensive training in first aid, explosive ordinance detection, and international policing ensured they were well-prepared.



While off-duty, FCPD officers intervened in an attempted stabbing at a café, swiftly apprehending the suspect and preventing further harm. Their actions demonstrated FCPD's dedication to safety, regardless of location.

This collaboration strengthened ties between U.S. and French law enforcement, fostering knowledge exchange and enhanced security measures. The FCPD officers' service in Paris exemplifies their commitment to public safety at home and abroad.

OPTION 5 LATERAL ACADEMY

After 6-weeks of training, 21 experienced officers from 10 different agencies graduated from the Option 5 Lateral Academy and began their assignments with FCPD. Coming from departments in New York, Tennessee, Florida, and several federal agencies, these officers bring a diverse range of skills and experience that will strengthen our department.



The Option 5 program streamlines their transition, ensuring they are equipped with the latest training to serve Fairfax County effectively. Their addition enhances our capabilities and reinforces our commitment to keeping the community safe.

With advanced **Bell 429 helicopters** and **drones**, the division aids in **investigations**, pursuit **tracking**, and **lifesaving** medevacs, ensuring **rapid response** and **precision**.



Unmanned Innovation

The Fairfax County Police Department's drone program is a **vital** asset that **supports operations in conjunction with the helicopter**, enhancing search and rescue missions, tactical operations, and crime scene mapping.



Drones are integrated with **DroneSense software**, which sends a **live feed** to the FCPD Real-Time Crime Center. **Future goals** include **advanced drone detection** and the ability to **fly beyond the visual line of sight**.

The National Integrated Ballistic Information Network (NIBIN) program at FCPD has revolutionized our approach to solving crimes. Through cutting-edge technology, NIBIN facilitates the linkage and analysis of ballistic evidence, offering vital insights into firearm-related offenses.



By compiling a comprehensive database of ballistic images and shell casings, NIBIN empowers investigators to uncover connections between seemingly disparate cases, expediting the resolution of complex criminal investigations.





OPERATIONS SUPPORT BUREAU



The Operations Support Bureau (OSB) of the Fairfax County Police Department is instrumental in ensuring the safety and security of our community through its specialized expertise and resources in unique law enforcement situations.

With a variety of highly skilled units, OSB safeguards Fairfax County's air, land, and water, maintaining safety across all domains.



In addition to its primary mission of safeguarding the community through specialized expertise, the Special Operations Division (SOD) of the Fairfax County Police Department also plays a crucial role in emergency response and disaster management. Equipped with advanced training and specialized equipment, SOD units are prepared to swiftly respond to natural disasters, terrorist threats, and other critical incidents. Whether providing support during search and rescue operations or coordinating response efforts in times of crisis, the SOD exemplifies the department's commitment to ensuring the well-being and resilience of Fairfax County residents.

TRAFFIC SAFETY DIVISION




The Fairfax County Police Department is steadfast in its mission to enhance road safety and reduce traffic fatalities.

Central to this goal is the Traffic Safety Section, actively involved in prevention and education initiatives.

The Crash Reconstruction Unit investigates serious collisions, providing vital insights for targeted interventions.

Additionally, the DWI Enforcement Squad combats impaired driving, while the Motor Unit tackles traffic issues in congested areas.

The Motor Carrier Section oversees commercial vehicle safety, and the Parking Enforcement Team ensures compliance, collectively improving road safety for our community.






ROAD SHARK INITIATIVE

The Fairfax County Police Department issued nearly **35,000 citations** and warnings to dangerous drivers over **five waves** of the Road Shark campaign. During the final wave (Oct. 14–20), officers issued **7,000 citations** and warnings, including **over 800** for speeding.

Since March, FCPD officers and Virginia State Troopers focused on educating drivers and enforcing traffic laws, leading to hundreds of arrests for DWI and citations for reckless driving and cellphone use.

Road Shark will continue in 2025, with officers committed to keeping Fairfax County's roadways safe by enforcing traffic laws and educating the community.





The Major Crimes Bureau of the Fairfax County Police Department is a specialized unit responsible for investigating serious offenses within the county. Its focus includes homicide, sexual assault, robbery, and other major criminal incidents.



The bureau utilizes advanced investigative techniques, forensic analysis, and collaboration with various law enforcement agencies to solve cases efficiently. Through proactive measures and community engagement, it aims to enhance public safety and uphold justice in Fairfax County.

SUMMER CRIME PREVENTION INITIATIVE


From June through August 2024, FCPD aligned patrol officers and selective enforcement group efforts to address specific, data-informed crime trends across Fairfax County. The department's efforts were affected using a

three-prong approach:

Proactive Patrol & Enforcements to Combat Reckless Street Takeovers

Increased Foot Patrols & Presence at Late-Night Establishments

Connecting with Businesses to Create Long-Term Solutions



Officers involved in the 2024 Summer Crime Prevention Initiative demonstrated proactive enforcement that resulted in over **90 criminal charges** and over **330 vehicle and pedestrian contacts** to educate and enforce laws.



As organized retail crime affects local businesses in the National Capital Region, the FCPD is staying at the forefront of the crime fight with proactive measures to safeguard the community, businesses, and shoppers during the holiday season and year-round.

Shopping Center Units: Protecting Our Malls



FCPD's Shopping Center Units (SCUs) combat organized retail crime by maintaining a constant presence in high-traffic areas like Springfield Mall, Fair Oaks Mall, and Tysons Corner Mall. Officers collaborate with businesses, monitor trends, and receive ongoing training to swiftly identify and disrupt criminal activity, ensuring safer shopping environments.

Data-Informed Decision Making: Smarter Policing



FCPD analyzes crime data weekly to identify trends in organized retail crime and adjust resources accordingly. This strategic approach ensures officers are deployed effectively to maximize crime prevention.

Sharing Our Successes: Building Partnerships in the Region



FCPD actively shares best practices with neighboring law enforcement agencies to promote regional collaboration against organized retail crime. By training with other departments in data-informed tactics and specialized unit deployment, FCPD enhances overall community protection.




ORGANIZED CRIME AND INTELLIGENCE BUREAU

MS-13 MEMBER SENTENCED TO LIFE IN PRISON FOR MURDERS IN VIRGINIA AND MASSACHUSETTS




The Fairfax County Police Department's (FCPD) Organized Crime and Intelligence Bureau (OCIB) plays a critical role in safeguarding the community through intelligence-driven investigations targeting violent criminal enterprises. Focused on dismantling organized crime networks, including gang activity, drug trafficking, and complex financial crimes, OCIB works diligently to prevent violence and collaborates closely with law enforcement partners to bring dangerous offenders to justice.

Through meticulous investigative efforts, OCIB was instrumental in the arrest and prosecution of Elmer De Jesus Alas Candray, a member of the MS-13 gang's Uniones Locos Salvatrucha clique. Alas Candray was convicted of multiple murders, murder conspiracies, and other violent crimes committed in Fairfax County and beyond, leading to his sentencing of six concurrent life terms. His crimes, which included brutal killings and coordinated attacks against perceived rivals, highlight the severity of gang violence that OCIB actively combats. This case underscores the relentless commitment of FCPD's OCIB to dismantling criminal enterprises and ensuring justice for victims.

It's a nationwide effort to enhance relationships between neighbors and police officers, promoting a united front against crime. Our officers enjoyed attending these events, engaging with residents, and building lasting connections.

The Fairfax County Police Department proudly celebrated the graduation of the 45th and 46th sessions of the Community Police Academy in 2024. This program, formerly known as the Citizens Police Academy, provides participants with a behind-the-scenes look at modern policing, offering insights into department training, policies, and specialized units. Through interactive sessions on topics like use of force, crime scene investigation, traffic stops, SWAT operations, and the police helicopter, participants gain a deeper understanding of law enforcement's role in public safety. By fostering open dialogue and hands-on learning, the academy helps strengthen trust and collaboration between officers and the communities they serve.



The Future Women Leaders in Law Enforcement program, hosted by our Community Engagement and Equity Bureau, took place from July 29 to August 2, 2024, at the Fairfax County Public Safety Headquarters. This free program gave Northern Virginia high school girls hands-on experience in policing, including patrol, crime scene investigation, and the helicopter division. Participants connected with women leaders in law enforcement, learned about the police academy, and developed leadership skills to explore a future in public safety.

With only 30 spots available, the program provided a personalized and engaging experience for students entering 10th-12th grade. It emphasized leadership, confidence-building, and career exploration in a supportive environment. The program continues to inspire the next generation of women in law enforcement.



AUXILIARY PROGRAM

PUBLIC SAFETY CADET PROGRAM

Laying the Foundation for Success

The FCPD is proud to provide an abundance of opportunities to support and guide our youth on the pathway to success in Fairfax County. The Public Safety Cadet program provides leadership, ethics, and career preparation training to young women and men with an interest in a career in law enforcement. Participating in the cadet program provides invaluable experience, mentorship, and a strong foundation for a rewarding and prosperous future.





SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER PROGRAM



Since 1995, SROs have been instrumental in maintaining a safe and secure learning environment for students. They offer critical law enforcement support to school administrators while also fostering trust and positive relationships within the school community.



Officers selected for the SRO program receive specialized training from the department, to include:

- Mental Health Specific Training and Crisis Intervention Training in accordance with established and certified state standards,
- Disability awareness training,
- Implicit bias/racial bias training outlining attitudes and stereotypes that affect our understanding, actions, and decisions in an unconscious manner,
- And the Cultural Competency Training that is provided to FCPS staff.

FCPD has **51 SROs** throughout the county who are assigned to high, secondary, and middle schools. Although a SRO's primary function is for law enforcement, they also focus on mentoring, educating, and promoting a safe learning atmosphere for all students.



Throughout 2024, the FCPD's Animal Protection Police (APP) unit has prioritized the welfare of animals and promoted responsible ownership.

Dedicated officers enforce animal control laws, respond to incidents, and offer educational resources to the community. Through partnerships with shelters and rescue organizations, they advocate for the well-being of abandoned or mistreated animals, emphasizing collaboration for the greater good.

The Internal Affairs Bureau (IAB) of the Fairfax County Police Department is pivotal in preserving accountability and upholding the utmost integrity within the department.
