The \$40 million project includes the construction of a new levee and pumping station to protect the Huntington community from Cameron Run's floodwaters. Fairfax County citizens approved a bond to fund the project in November 2012, which allowed the county to continue the design of mitigation measures developed by the Army Corps of Engineers in a 2009 study. Completion is scheduled for spring 2019.



### Board of Supervisors Advertises Flat Real

### Estate Tax Rate for FY2018



On February 28, the Board of Supervisors advertised the County Executive's <u>proposed budget</u> for Fiscal Year 2018, which is based on a tax rate of \$1.13 per \$100 of assessed value. \$1.13 is Fairfax County's current FY2017 tax rate. When the Board adopts a final budget on May 2, it can set the tax rate lower, but not higher, than what was advertised.

Following this <u>timeline</u>, the Board of Supervisors will

now hold public hearings and meetings, make revisions to the proposed budget, and adopt the FY 2018 budget on May 2. The FY2018 budget then becomes effective on July 1, 2017 and will last through July 1, 2018. We now have video testimony capability.

### Tuesday, March 21, 8:30 pm - FY2018 Community Budget

Supervisor Storck hosted a Budget Community meeting with the South County Federation and South Fairfax Chamber of Commerce at the South County High School media center. Supervisor Storck was joined by OMB staff, who presented a summary of the advertised budget. Karen Corbett-Sanders, Mount Vernon School Board Member, also attended and answered questions. Community members were invited to attend to ask questions and share their thoughts and concerns about the County's FY2018 budget. The most commonly asked questions were related to Pensions.

### **Civilian Review Panel Members Selected**



On February 28, the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors appointed nine Fairfax County residents to serve on the newly established Police Civilian Review Panel. The creation of this Panel was recommended by the Ad Hoc Police Practices Review Commission in their October 2015 final report to the Board of Supervisors. The Police <u>Civilian Review Panel</u> will promote further transparency and openness in community policing. Panel members include, Hansel Aguilar, Kathleen Davis-Siudut, Steve Descano, Hollye Doane, Douglas Kay, Randy Sayles, Jean Senseman, Adrian L. Steel, Jr. (Chairman), and Rhonda VanLowe.

The Civilian Review Panel will serve as an independent "portal" for residents to submit complaints concerning allegations of abuse of authority or misconduct by a Fairfax County Police (FCPD) Officer. The Panel will also have the authority to request and review completed Police Department internal administrative investigations regarding a civilian complaint against an officer. The Panel may hold public meetings to review police administrative investigations and walk through with members of the community how the investigation was conducted, including findings of fact, evidence collected and witness statements. Examples of complaints and cases for the Civilian Review Panel to receive and review may include:

- The use of abusive, racial, ethnic or sexual language;
- Harassment or discrimination based on race, color, sex, religion, national origin, marital status, age, familial status, or disability;
- The reckless endangerment of a detainee or person in custody;
- Serious violations of Fairfax County or FCPD procedures.

The Board of Supervisors has appointed Adrian Steel to serve as the first chairman of the Civilian Review Panel, with subsequent chairmen selected by members of the Civilian Review Panel. Panel members will serve three year terms with a two term limit, although some inaugural members will serve for less time to allow for staggered terms. The first orders of business for the Civilian Review Panel include writing bylaws detailing how the Panel will function and training Panel members on current police practices and policies in Fairfax County. Once those items are complete, which may take a number of months, the Civilian Review Panel will begin their work of requesting and reviewing cases.

Committee meetings serve as work sessions for the Board and County staff to share information and strategize on how the County should tackle important issues involving transportation, public safety, human services, housing, land use, the environment and legislation. Committee meeting work sessions tee up important decisions that the Board ultimately votes on at Board of Supervisors meetings.

#### DMV AT SHERWOOD REGIONAL LIBRARY ADJUSTS DATES

The Department of Motor Vehicles and Sherwood Regional Library have agreed to change the regular dates for the DMV Connect and

Mobile DMV, citing an abundance of caution for potential parking issues with the regular Wednesday Farmers Market that begins in May.

Sherwood Regional Library will now host the DMV **on the third Monday of every month**. This is a change in date. No other aspects of the DMV's operations were changed.

The two programs, DMV Connect and DMV 2 GO, began providing full DMV service to the Route 1 area on February 22. ### **Environmental Initiatives**

Fairfax County has an <u>Environmental Vision</u> that guides the County's sustainability initiatives and programs. The Vision was adopted by the Board in 2004 and was last updated in 2007. Currently, the Vision is going through an update that will be adopted later this summer. A <u>draft of the update</u> is available online.

In addition to the Environmental Vision update, the County proceeds to update its energy webpages. The <u>Cool Counties</u> webpage now includes information on the initiative, the most recent Council of Government's (COG) <u>Fairfax County regional inventory</u>, and the County's progress on reducing greenhouse gas emissions. **The County has reduced its per capita emissions by 10% from 2005 to 2012!** 

The County's <u>energy data pages</u> have also been updated as well. The pages display the amount of electricity and natural gas consumed by County facilities from 2006-2015. Graphic representations feature the levels of carbon emissions released, which are equivalent to the County's energy usage. Fairfax County has actually **decreased** its greenhouse gas emissions from its buildings by **21%** from 2006 to 2015, even though County properties have actually increased in square footage! The County continues to move forward in reducing its energy usage, and in fact, has saved up to \$1 million in utility bills from 2012-2014.

Stay tuned for more <u>fresh information</u> to be released later this year! Shortly, the energy data pages will be updated to include 2016 data, as well as energy narratives about specific County Government buildings. COG's next inventory, containing 2015 data for the Fairfax County's region's carbon emissions, will be released later this year too.

To advise the Board and the Office for Children on programs and policies related to child care.


#### • Human Services


