Recognizing Exceptional Board Authority and Commission Appointees



I believe that residents who put forth great effort into serving their communities deserve special recognition. This month I would like to thank and recognize two of the most active members of our community who have been steadily working to make our county a better



been steadily working to make our county a better place.

Deborah Hammer, who serves on the Fairfax Area Disability Services board, has been working in the field of special education for 26 years, and works with people with a wide range of disabilities. The board's main goal is to represent residents with physical and sensory disabilities and include them in mainstream

community life. Through her work with the board, she has addressed various issues that could affect Fairfax County citizens with disabilities, such as accessible housing, employment opportunities and coordinating with first-responders and communication companies for people with disabilities in the event of an emergency. She is currently employed at Arlington Public Schools as an autism specialist, and spends some of her free time serving as co-chair of the Northern Virginia Transition Coalition and running a club for young adults with autism.

Andrew Painter, an attorney as well as a member of the Agricultural and Forestal District Advisory Board, was nominated to serve on the committee in 2009 after he did a report of Fairfax County's last remaining rural landscapes. The board aims to protect and preserve the county's open spaces, as well as its forested and agricultural lands, in turn helping to preserve the county's proud agrarian history. The program Painter is a part of allows certain property to apply for a reduced land use tax rate as long as the property is not developed any further and remains in its rural state. This has helped the county to preserve the beautiful countryside of its youth.

The Drug Enforcement Administration is hosting its 14th National Prescription Drug Take-Back Day on October 28, running from 10am to 2pm. Head to the Mount Vernon District Police Station, located at **2511 Parkers Lane, Alexandria, VA**, where you can learn about various prescription medications, as well as their potential for abuse. In addition, you will be able to anonymously and responsibly dispose of any prescription drugs you no longer need or want.

Flushing or throwing away drugs can cause contamination in our ground, waterways, and future drinking water as waste treatment plants are not equipped to handle the disposal prescription drugs. Please do the right thing for the environment and community and dispose of them properly!

Mount Vernon Rabies Clinic



If you own a dog or cat, it's important to be a responsible owner and get them their shots and vaccinations. Rabies doesn't just affect our furry friends- it can affect us and our neighbors too, and that's why it is very important that we keep our pets vaccinated against this deadly disease. I was thrilled to see nearly 80 pet owners attending the Mt. Vernon rabies clinic on September 10, where dog licenses were also available.

Fairfax County Well Water Clinic

While the public water supplies in our district are tested frequently for contaminants like bacteria and nitrates, private water sources like wells and springs are only tested rarely. This is a great opportunity for owners of private water supplies to have the quality of their water tested and learn important information about how to care for their water.

You can attend the informative kick-off on October 16, from 7:00pm to 8:30pm at the Virginia Cooperative Extension Pennino Building (12011 Government Center Pkwy, Fairfax VA, 22035) in the Virginia Room on the 10th floor.

Drop off your water samples at the same location on October 18, from 6:30am to 10:00am.

Return to the Pennino Building (2nd floor, Room 206) to pick up your samples and have the results interpreted on November 15, from 7:00pm to 9:00pm.



What's In Your Water?



Do you know what's in your drinking water? While public water supplies are tested daily for contaminants, most private water supplies, like wells and springs, are rarely tested. It is recommended that well owners test their water at least annually for bacteria and nitrates.
