Gretchen Snyder Named Mount Vernon's 2017 History Teacher of the Year



Congratulations to Gretchen Snyder! She has been named the 2017 History Teacher of the Year by George Washington's Mount Vernon.

Snyder has 15 years' experience as a history teacher and currently serves as the social studies department chair and National History Day coordinator at Westfield High School. She served on the Review Committee for the Virginia Department of Education's Standards of Learning for U.S. History from 2013-2015.

One colleague praised Snyder's work in a nomination letter, saying, "Gretchen is overwhelmingly successful at producing students who can look at history as more than simply facts, but as living information that needs to be analyzed and connected to understand the modern world." Snyder says one of her goals as a teacher is to inspire life-long learning and passion for history in her students while meeting the educational needs of a wide variety of students.

Snyder will receive a \$5,000 prize and an all-expense paid trip to George Washington's Mount Vernon for up to 200 students.

Survey for Short-Term Property Rentals



Fairfax County is considering the development of new zoning regulations for Short-Term Rentals that may address such factors as:

- Where these rentals would be allowed in the County
- How often they could be rented out
- What types of properties could be rented out
- How many people would be allowed to stay in a property at any one time

Why changes are being proposed?

This year, the Virginia General Assembly passed <u>Senate Bill 1578</u>, which gives localities the authority to require registration of Short-Term Rentals. As a result, the Board of Supervisors directed the creation of a working group to draft zoning regulations for Short-Term Rentals in the County and to establish a registry of Short-Term Rentals. In proposing Short-Term Rental regulations to the Board, the working group seeks to balance residents' interests to protect the character of their neighborhood with the interests of persons wanting to operate Short-Term Rentals within their residence.

Virginia Board of Education Public Meeting



The Virginia Board of Education will hold a series of **public hearings** in June, July, and August to gather feedback from families, educators, and community members on student expectations, how schools are accredited, and the conditions and needs of public schools.

Public comment will be accepted at each of the meetings. While the Board welcomes all comments from the public, they are specifically looking for feedback on the Board's work related to the following:

- The Standards of Accreditation including changes to high school graduation requirements and changes to how schools will be accredited in the future
- The Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) State Plan
- Identifying conditions and needs of public education, for updating the Board's comprehensive plan and annual report to the Governor and General Assembly

meetings (RSVPs are appreciated, but not required). If you know of others who would like to join, feel free to share this information with them.

To ensure Board members are able to hear from as many people as possible, each speaker is asked to limit their comments to 3 minutes. If individuals wish to submit a written copy of their remarks, or additional materials for the Board to consider, those will be accepted at the hearing. Comment cards will also be available.

Who to Contact About Downed Trees and Wires



If a tree falls, then who do you call? Here's a list of who to contact if you see a downed tree or wires:

1.) Life-Threatening

- If there's an immediate life-safety issue, call or text 9-1-1.
- If a tree falls into your home:

- 1. Get everyone safely out of your house. **Use your cellphone or go to** a neighbor's house and call 9-1-1.
- Stay away from the home until public safety employees can access your home for structural safety (as well as ensuring your utilities are OK or should be turned off.)
- Only after all of these safety measures should you then call your insurance company.

2.) Power Lines

- Of course, NEVER touch a downed wire.
- Dominion Power: 1-866-366-4357 or online at www.dom.com/outage-center.
- NOVEC: 1-888-335-0500 or online at www.novec.com/stormcenter.

3.) Roads

 Call the Virginia Department of Transportation at 1-800-367-7623, TTY 711, or use <u>VDOT's online reporting form</u>.

4.) Sidewalks

 Check out our <u>online map of who maintains sidewalks</u> to find out who's responsible to remove trees/tree limbs. Most sidewalks are VDOT's responsibility, so call 1-800-367-7623, TTY 711, or use <u>VDOT's online</u> <u>reporting form</u>.

5.) Fairfax County Government/Schools

- County Government buildings: 703-324-2055, TTY 711.
- Fairfax County Park Authority property: 703-324-8594, TTY 711
- Fairfax County Public Schools property: 703-764-2429, TTY 711

6.) Private Property

 Removal is the property owner's responsibility. We suggest direct communication with your neighbor, then we recommend contacting a professional, licensed arborist to inspect the tree. The county has no authority in civil issues like downed trees.

7.) Posing Hazard to Public Areas



Affordable Housing in Fairfax County: We Want Your Input



Over the last decade, our county has experienced unprecedented increases in the cost of for-sale housing and a significant decrease in affordable rental housing. In addition, according to data from George Mason University's Center for Regional Analysis, to meet the demand associated with projected job growth over the next 20 years, the county will need thousands of additional homes that are affordable to new workers – earning a range of incomes.

Buying or Renting – It's Expensive:

These are the affordable housing challenges facing the county:

- Between 2010 and 2015, Fairfax County saw a significant increase in the cost of rental and for-sale homes by as much as 27 percent. The average household income increased by 10 percent during this time period.
- The average monthly rent in the county was \$1,764 in 2015. You need an income of at least \$70,560 to afford a typical rent.

- About 45 percent of all jobs in the county pay less than \$50,000 per year. That includes nearly 300,000 jobs in business services, retail, hospitality, construction, health care, and education.
- Thousands of residents and their families spend more than half of their income each month on housing costs. As a result, families spend less on other necessities such as food, health care, transportation, child care, and education. They also spend less on other goods and services in the local economy.

The results from the online survey will help shape the <u>Communitywide Housing</u>
<u>Strategic Plan</u> to:

- Create a shared community vision of how housing supports local economic growth and community sustainability.
- Quantify the housing needed to sensibly accommodate future growth.
- Develop specific, measurable and actionable strategies for meeting countywide housing goals.
- Identify the programs and policies, and specific funding sources, that will be required to address housing needs in 5, 10, and 15 years.

Stay Safe Around Water!



Please take a moment to review the helpful water safety tips below from our friends at the <u>American Red Cross</u>.

Make Water Safety Your Priority

- Swim in designated areas supervised by lifeguards.
- Always swim with a buddy; do not allow anyone to swim alone. Even at a
 public pool or a lifeguarded beach, use the buddy system!

- Ensure that everyone in the family learns to swim well. Enroll in ageappropriate Red Cross water orientation and Learn-to-Swim courses.
- Never leave a young child unattended near water and do not trust a child's life to another child; teach children to always ask permission to go near water.
- Have young children or inexperienced swimmers wear U.S. Coast Guardapproved <u>life jackets</u> around water, but do not rely on life jackets alone.
- Establish rules for your family and enforce them without fail. For example, set limits based on each person's ability, do not let anyone play around drains and suction fittings, and do not allow swimmers to hyperventilate before swimming under water or have breath-holding contests.
- Even if you do not plan on swimming, be cautious around <u>natural bodies of</u>
 water including ocean shoreline, rivers and lakes. Cold temperatures,
 currents and underwater hazards can make a fall into these bodies of water
 dangerous.
- If you go boating, wear a life jacket! Most boating fatalities occur from drowning.
- Avoid alcohol use. Alcohol impairs judgment, balance and coordination;
 affects swimming and diving skills; and reduces the body's ability to stay warm.

Prevent Unsupervised Access to the Water

- Install and use barriers around your <u>home pool or hot tub</u>. Safety covers and pool alarms should be added as additional layers of protection.
- Ensure that pool barriers enclose the entire pool area, are at least 4-feet high with gates that are self-closing, self-latching and open outward, and away from the pool. The latch should be high enough to be out of a small child's reach.
- If you have an above-ground or inflatable pool, remove access ladders and secure the safety cover whenever the pool is not in use.
- Remove any structures that provide access to the pool, such as outdoor furniture, climbable trees, decorative walls and playground equipment.

 Keep toys that are not in use away from the pool and out of sight. Toys can attract young children to the pool.

Maintain Constant Supervision

- Actively supervise kids whenever around the water—even if lifeguards are
 present. Do not just drop your kids off at the public pool or leave them at the
 beach—designate a responsible adult to supervise.
- Always stay within arm's reach of young children and avoid distractions when supervising children around water.
