

Fairfax County is participating in the annual National Bicycling and Pedestrian Documentation Project and is looking for volunteers to help out with counting bicycles and pedestrians on Thursday, September 15 from 5-7pm and on Saturday, September 17 from 12-2pm.

- Corner of Heritage Dr and Ossian Hall Park Entrance, Annandale
- Ravenworth Rd north of McWorther PI, Annandale
- Trail Entrance, Fountain Head Regional Park
- Corner of Magarity Rd and Peabody Dr, Pimmit Hills
- Corner of Park Run Dr and Westpark Dr, Tysons
- Corner of Richmond Highway and Huntington Ave, Huntington
- Corner of Frontier Dr and Springfield Mall entrance (near Bertucci's Pizzaria), Springfield
- Corner of Beulah St and Telegraph Rd, Kingstowne
- Corner of Town Center Parkway and New Dominion Parkway, Reston
- Corner of W&OD Trail and Fairfax Co Pkwy, Reston
- Corner of George Mason Blvd and Univ. Blvd, Fairfax
- Corner of Rt 50 and Metrotech Dr, Chantilly
- Corner of W&OD Trail and Gallows Rd, Dunn Loring

These counts are essential in advancing active transportation because they inform planning and engineering professionals on the diversity of our transportation and recreation habits. There are plenty of methods used to count motorized vehicles, but there is little knowledge about the number of people that walk and bike in Fairfax County. Volunteers for the National Bicycle and Pedestrian Documentation Project play a critical role in:

- Building a robust and public database of pedestrian and bicycle use
- Identifying trends in biking and walking
- Establishing a national model for predicting pedestrian and bicycle travel.

Fire & Rescue Academy Classes Open

The Citizens Fire & Rescue Academy (CFRA) is open to persons 18 and older who live in Fairfax County. Classes meet Thursday evenings for nine consecutive weeks, from 6:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. beginning September 22, 2016 and ending November 17, 2016. Each session, participants learn about a different aspect of the fire department, ranging from fire suppression, emergency medical services, hiring and training firefighters to special rescue operations. Participants will also spend time at fire stations, training academy, Public Safety Headquarters, and at the 911 dispatch center. Election Officers Needed

Fairfax County is the largest jurisdiction in Virginia with 243 precincts countywide. It takes thousands of enthusiastic and trained election officers to help ensure that we have efficient and well-run elections. We need your help – please consider applying today!Who Can Be an Election Officer?

- A registered Virginia voter, who isn't an elected official or an employee of an elected official.
- On Election Day, you must be available to serve from approximately 5 a.m. to 9 p.m. or later (polls are open 6 a.m. to 7 p.m.).

• Helpful traits to have include good communications skills, high energy level, enjoy being with people, detail oriented and patience. Computer and bilingual skills are also valuable!

What Will I Do as an Election Officer?

- Prior to Election Day you will attend election officer training, so you will be prepared to:
 - Set up voting equipment.
 - Check photo IDs and check names on the electronic poll book.
 - Provide assistance and instructions in using the voting machines.
 - Tabulate the results at the close of the polls.

Will I Be Paid?

- Election officers are paid \$175 for working a full Election Day. Election officers must work at least one general election before being considered for an assistant chief election officer (\$200) or chief election officer (\$250).
- You can also volunteer your time instead of being paid!

Where Will I Be Working?

Whenever possible, you will be assigned to your closest or "home" precinct. However, if there are no vacancies at your polling place, you may be assigned to a nearby precinct or asked to work in the <u>Central Absentee Precinct</u> at the <u>Government Center</u>. Unassigned officers are asked to serve as standbys to fill in for scheduled officers who cannot serve.

You Mentioned Training?

- New election officers must attend training (3 hours) prior to serving at the polls.
- Other supplemental training classes will also be available.

How Do I Apply to Be an Election Officer?

• Visit the application portal at <u>www.vote4fairfax.com/serve</u>. Sign up and submit the application online.

- You may be contacted by the local political party to confirm your political party affiliation.
- Once your eligibility has been verified, we will contact you with additional instructions, including visiting our offices to fill out forms such as the Federal Employment Eligibility Verification form (I9), and your election officer oath and appointment form.

Changes to the Residential Conservation District

The Planning Commission voted last month to recommend that the Board of Supervisors amend the zoning ordinance to read as follows: (1) Allow a lot to be created in the R-C District that complies with the R-C District regulations and other applicable regulations, and such lot may be used for any use permitted in the R-C District pursuant to a Building Permit, provided that all such lots, except for lots designated as open space or lots developed under the cluster provisions requiring special exception approval from the Board of Supervisors (Board), shall have a shape factor of less than or equal to 35, or lots with a shape factor greater than 35 but less than 50 may be permitted with special exception approval by the Board of Supervisors. (2) When a lot is subject to a lot width waiver special exception approved by the Board, exclude the pipestem portion of such lot from the shape factor requirement. (3) Allow a minor adjustment of lot lines between corner lots and contiguous lots when such lots do not meet the current minimum district size, lot area, lot width and/or shape factor requirements of the zoning district in which located, but such lots met the requirements of the Zoning Ordinance in effect at the time of recordation, provided that the reconfigured lots contain either the same lot area as existed prior to the adjustment of the lot lines or a greater area than existed prior to the adjustment of lot lines which results in a reduced number of lots. Such minor adjustment of lot line between corner lots and contiguous lots may change the road frontage or orientation of the lot, provided that there shall be no additional lots or outlots created, the number of lots that does not comply with the current minimum lot width requirement shall not be increased, and the amount of lot width noncompliance shall not be aggravated. In addition, such adjustment of lot lines shall not create or aggravate any existing noncompliance with regard to minimum lot area, shape factor or minimum yard requirements. (4) Allow the maximum building height for single family detached dwellings to be increased [ranging from the current 35 feet up to a maximum of 45 feet] in the R-C, R-E and R-1 Districts, provided a minimum required yard of [ranging from 40 to 60 feet] is maintained from all lot lines for any dwelling with a height greater than 35 feet.
