Community Meeting on Route 28 Widening



The Fairfax County Department of Transportation will hold a <u>public meeting</u> on the <u>Route 28 widening project</u>, Tuesday, April 3, 2018, at 6:30 p.m., in the cafeteria of Union Mill Elementary School, (13611 Springstone Drive, Clifton, VA).

The Route 28 corridor has experienced increased congestion for many years. The proposed project calls for widening Route 28 in Fairfax County for a distance of approximately 2.3 miles from the bridge over Bull Run to the interchange at Route 29, including:

Adding additional lanes on side streets to improve intersections

- Upgrading traffic signals
- Improving bicycle and pedestrian connections and crossings, including new 10-foot shared-use paths on both sides of Route 28

The meeting will begin at 6:30 p.m., with an Open House, a formal presentation at 7:00 p.m., followed by time for questions and answers.

Save the Date! Operation Medicine Cabinet Cleanout: Saturday, April 28



Take advantage of a free, convenient, confidential, and safe disposal of unused or expired medications during Operation Medicine Cabinet Cleanout on Saturday, April 28, 2018. Drop off medications at any of the eight Fairfax County District Police Stations (pills or liquids only, no pressurized canisters or needles) between 10:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m.

Operation Medicine Cabinet Cleanout is a partnership with local businesses in collaboration with the following Fairfax County government departments: Police, Health, Public and Private Partnerships, Neighborhood and Community Services, Public Works and Environmental Services, and the Fairfax-Falls Church Community Services Board.

Drug take back programs are important because they are a safe method for disposing of prescription drugs and are organized and closely monitored by local, state, and federal government agencies.

<u>Safe disposal</u> of unused or expired medications prevents drug abuse and misuse, accidental poisoning, and protects the environment. Learn more about the prescription

Economic Indicators: County Unemployment 2.6%; Lowest Since 2008



The latest economic indicators report is out so you can see what's up and what's down in our economy. This new report shows positive news on jobs and home sales prices in Fairfax County.

These monthly <u>economic indicators</u> serve as one of the tools used by the Board of Supervisors, county executive and budget staff to make decisions on the county's budget. The county executive presented his <u>proposed FY 2019 budget</u> on Feb. 20 and residents are encouraged to <u>provide input to the Board of Supervisors</u> through mid-April.

What's Up in Economic News:

- ▲ **Jobs:** December's unemployment rate in the county decreased 0.4 percentage point to 2.6 percent, the lowest level since 2008. The number of unemployed residents decreased over the month from 18,780 to 16,677.
- ▲ Home Prices: The average sales price of all homes that sold in January in our county was \$560,919, an increase of 2.8 percent over the January 2017 average sales price of \$545,772.
- ▲ Tax Receipts: Sales tax receipts distributed to Fairfax County in February for retail purchases made in December were \$18.6 million, an increase of 0.9 percent over February 2017. Through the first seven months of FY 2018 (July 2017 January 2018), sales tax receipts are up 3 percent over FY 2017.

What's Down:

- **▼ Inventory of Homes for Sale:** The number of active listings in the county in January was 1,515, a decrease of 23.4 percent from the 1,977 listings in January 2017.
- ▼ Home Sales Volume: In January, 786 homes were sold in the county, a decrease of 1 percent from the 794 homes sold in January 2017.

Someone better hurry up and adopt Louis because the staff and volunteers at the Fairfax County Animal Shelter are falling hard for this big boy and may just have to


