Public Safety Bond on the Ballot on Nov. 6, 2018



Fairfax County voters can vote yes or no on the question that asks if the county should be allowed to sell bonds to pay for needed improvements for public safety facilities.

If approved by voters, the county plans to use the money for specific projects, including:

Fire Stations (\$73 million):

Replacing, renovation, or expanding four aging fire stations that are 37 years old or older:

- Mount Vernon (\$16 million).
- Fairview (\$16 million).
- Gunston (\$13 million).
- Seven Corners (\$13 million).

Additionally, \$15 million will be used to transfer to the county one of the eight remaining volunteer fire stations. The transferred station will require extensive upgrades because the volunteer stations are all 40 years old or older.

Police Facilities (\$59 million):

Bond money will be used to renovate or expand:


- Mason District Police Station (\$23 million).
- Criminal Justice Academy (\$18 million).

Courts (\$5 million):

Since its construction in the early 1980s, the courtrooms in the original Jennings Judicial Center have been in continuous use. These courtrooms require improvements, including better lighting, ductwork, ADA upgrades, and technology upgrades.

This Sunday: Change Your Clock - Check Your Smoke Alarm





Check Your Smoke Alarm!

Remember, we move our clocks back one hour early Sunday morning! You also need to remember that when you change your clock, our firefighters and paramedics want you to check your smoke alarms to ensure they are working.

Our friends at the U.S. Fire Administration recommend the following regarding the different types of smoke alarms out there:

Smoke alarm powered by a nine-volt battery -

- Test the alarm monthly.
- Replace the batteries at least once a year.
- Replace the entire smoke alarm every 10 years.

Smoke alarm powered by a 10-year lithium (or "long-life") battery -

- Test the alarm monthly.
- Since you cannot (and should not) replace the lithium battery, replace the entire smoke alarm according to the manufacturer's instructions.

Smoke alarm that is hardwired into your home's electrical system -

- Test the alarm monthly.
- · Replace the backup battery at least once a year.
- Replace the entire smoke alarm every 10 years.

Documentary Screenings Focus Attention on Opioid Crisis



The documentary *Written Off* is challenging conventional thinking about addiction. The hour-long film tells the true story of a young man named Matt whose journals chronicle his 10-year struggle to escape dependency on prescription painkillers. By taking the viewer inside an individual's fight against opioids, *Written Off* combats stigma and humanizes the victim like the movie *Philadelphia* did for HIV/AIDS.

Fairfax County is using the film to initiate community conversations about stigma to create an environment where talking about mental health and substance use disorder is no different than talking about cancer or diabetes. Each of us can change the way we think about addiction, and together we can break down stigma and save lives.



Flatlick Stream Valley Park Cleanup Blitz

Join volunteers and Park Authority staff on **Saturday, November 3, 2018 from 9:00 a.m. to 11:30 a.m.** to help clean up Flatlick Stream Valley Park! Efforts will address general maintenance needs at the park, especially collecting and bagging litter.

The Park Authority will provide materials necessary for the park cleanup. Please wear close-toed shoes, long pants, and long socks (recommended).

It is also recommended to wear sunscreen and bug spray. If you have work gloves, please bring them, but if not, gloves will be provided.

Duties:

May include: Collect and bag trash; consolidate the bags at various locations along the nearest trail. Work activities and methods will be determined by Park Authority staff who will be on site the day of the cleanup.

Minimum Age to Volunteer: 12; Under age 16 must be supervised by a parent or guardian.

Location:

Stream valley area between Route 50, Walney Road, and Fulmar Drive. Meet at 13551 Lee Jackson Highway in Chantilly off of Route 50 (Next to the Burger Shack). Park along the service road that is parallel to Route 50/Lee Highway.

Safeguarding Houses of Worship:

Houses of Worship are typically seen as a sanctuary or safe haven, but places of worship can be just as vulnerable to natural hazards, hostile acts, and threats as schools and businesses. Below is list of resources for houses of worship to use in collaboration with community leaders and first responders.

Crime Prevention Officer (CPO):

Each Fairfax County Police Station has a CPO. The CPO can conduct a security assessment at your house of worship, help out with Worship Watch, and answer general questions you may have. Captain Gregory R. Fried, is the Crime Prevention Officer Commander for the Fairfax County Police Department. If you have questions, you can reach him at 703-691-2131.

Worship Watch:

This is a program similar to Neighborhood Watch, but catered towards houses of worship and keeping them safe. The seminars open a line of communication between congregants and officers, and attendees receive crime prevention tips and training specific to protecting their place of worship.



New App Helps Track Criminal and Terrorist Activity



We are joining forces with law enforcement agencies from around Northern Virginia to launch iWatchNOVA; a portal that allows residents in the area to report suspicious activities and behaviors that may indicate terrorist or significant criminal activity.

iWatchNOVA facilitates reporting of suspicious activities like possible surveillance or casing operations, people photographing or videotaping critical infrastructure or security checkpoints. The Northern Virginia Regional Intelligence (NVRIC), which covers 18 jurisdictions, then collects, evaluates, analyzes, and disseminates this information. Reports through iWatchNOVA are examined to determine if there is a

viable threat to the community.

The iWatchNOVA app is free and easy to use on your IOS or Android device, with the ability to remain anonymous. The portal is also accessible through their website (https://iwatchnova.org). It givers you the option to upload photos and provide specific details. The state-of-the-art technology from Trapwire then provides robust analytical capabilities that allow NVRIC to detect patterns indicative of terrorist and criminal preparations. This allows law enforcement to use the eyes and ears of the community to prevent terrorism, fight crime, and keep Northern Virginia safe for all.

Drug Court Offers Alternative to Jail for Defendants with Substance Use Disorders



When the Drug Court program was launched in September, it signaled a new and important journey to reduce substance use recidivism in our county, which ultimately can save lives — and money.

What is a Drug Court?:

Drug courts are specific court sessions, or dockets, for criminal defendants who have alcohol and/or substance use disorders. In Fairfax County's new program, eligible participants have been convicted of a non-violent crime, are on probation and have come back into the court for a felony probation violation related to substance use dependency disorders.

How are Drug Courts Effective?:

Drug courts have been shown to improve lives and reduce substance use among participants, in addition to the rate of those arrested for a similar offense.

According to U.S. Department of Justice drug court evaluations, the recidivism of offenders who have been diverted to drug courts is reduced between 50 percent to 60 percent. Studies also have shown that, even with treatment costs included, drug courts saved localities an overall average of \$5,600 to \$6,200 per offender compared to incarceration.
