As we enter day 35 of the federal government shutdown, Fairfax County will continue to provide assistance to individuals and families to get them through this difficult time. Western Fairfax Christian Ministries (WFCM) will be open to all Fairfax County residents from 5:00 to 7:00 p.m. on the following two Wednesdays, January 30 and February 6, 2019 for any employee or contractor affected by the government shutdown. They will distribute pre-bagged food for families which include shelf-stable items. If possible, and while supplies last, they will also include fresh meat, milk, cheese, and produce. A limited amount of gas gift cards will be available. Proof of Fairfax County residency and financial impact is required. For more information, call WFCM at 703-988-9656. Update: Assistance for Individuals & Families Affected by the Federal Government Shutdown

Federal Government Shutdown 2019

*Updated information is highlighted in yellow.

Thousands of federal workers, contractors, vendors, and service providers in our county are being impacted by the partial federal shutdown. It can be frightening and stressful to be without a paycheck and unsure of when you will go back to work. Whether it is food, financial assistance, or other needs, we can provide you with the resources to get you and your family through this difficult time.

How to Get Help:

 We invite those in need to please contact <u>Coordinated Services Planning</u> at 703-222-0880, TTY 711, for assistance. Staff will help connect you to resources that can aid you during this time.

Assistance with Child Care:

- Child Care Assistance and Referral Program (CCAR) Families participating in the CCAR program have signed on with a 12-month eligibility. During this period, if you find yourself without income you can request that your child care co-payment be lowered. CCAR staff are available to speak with families to discuss their ongoing child care needs. Call 703-449-8484 or email DFSccarinfo@fairfaxcounty.gov to seek information and help.
- School Age Child Care (SACC) Families impacted by the federal government shutdown may continue to use services and apply for a reduced fee and/or develop a payment plan as needed. Alternatively, families may request to be placed in a temporary inactive status, which allows the family to discontinue services temporarily while maintain their child's enrollment space in SACC. Call 703-449-8989 or email saccregistration@fairfaxcounty.gov to discuss ongoing needs for before and after school child care with SACC staff.
- Free Connector Bus Rides: Beginning Thursday, January 17, 2019,
 Fairfax Connector will provide free rides <u>system-wide</u> for federal government employees affected by the government shutdown who are still required to report for work.
 - You must show your federal photo ID to the bus operator when boarding to ride free.
 - By showing your federal photo ID, trips taken on <u>all Fairfax</u>
 <u>Connector bus routes</u> are free, including express routes to and from the Pentagon and Downtown D.C.
- Pet Supplies: The Fairfax County <u>Animal Shelter</u> has pet food and limited other pet supplies available for furloughed federal employees. The supplies are available during shelter business hours and no appointment is needed. For more information, call 703-830-1100 or email animalshelter@fairfaxcounty.gov.

- Support from Fairfax County Public Schools (FCPS): Breakfast and lunch will be provided to all students regardless of ability to pay or temporary financial circumstances. Unpaid balances will be allowed to accrue during this time.
- Unemployment Benefits: Federal government employees who have been separated from their job due to the shutdown and have questions about unemployment benefits should contact the <u>Virginia Employment</u>
 Commission at 866-832-2263.
- Northern Virginia Community College: NOVA's Workforce and Economic Development Office is offering a free (non-credit) class to furloughed federal employees and contractors. Employees can choose from select Business & Management, IT & Computer Skills, and Professional Development classes. Some of the classes have prerequisites and proof of federal employment is required. Call 703-878-5770 for more information.
- SNAP (food stamps): Recipients will receive their February food benefits in January. No benefits will be issued in February. SNAP recipients are encouraged to carefully plan their shopping accordingly. Contact the Fairfax County Department of Family Services at 703-324-7500 with questions.



Be a Mentor

January is National Mentoring Month, and Fairfax County Public Schools (FCPS) needs adult mentors for students at all levels. FCPS provides training and guidance.

MentorWorks is the school-based mentoring program in FCPS with a mission to connect every student to a caring, responsible adult.

Mentoring occurs at the students' school site during the school day. Typically, mentors meet with students every week for 30 minutes. MentorWorks asks that mentors make a one-year commitment to mentoring a student.

Make Bath Time a Safe Time for Your Child!



January is National Bath Safety Awareness Month. After pools, bathtubs are the second leading location where young children drown according to the Consumer Product Safety Commission. Drowning is the second leading cause of unintentional injury death in children ages 1-14 in the United States according to the World Health Organization.

Here are some drowning prevention safety tips from the Consumer Product Safety Commission:

- Never leave young children alone near any water, tub, or basin with fluid.
 Young children can drown in even small amounts of liquid.
- Always keeps a young child within arm's reach in a bathtub. If you must leave, take the child with you.
- Don't leave a baby or young child in a bathtub under the care of another child.

- Never leave a bucket containing even a small amount of liquid unattended.
 Toddlers are top heavy and they can fall headfirst into buckets and drown.
 After using a bucket, always empty and store it where young children cannot reach it. Don't leave buckets outside where they can collect rainwater.
- Consider placing locks on toilet seat covers in case a young child wanders into the bathroom.
- Learn CPR. It can be a lifesaver when seconds count.

Signs & Symptoms of Hypothermia and Frostbite



It is COLD out there! Please dress appropriately and avoid prolonged exposure to the cold. Not dressing appropriately and staying outside too long in cold temperatures could lead to serious cold related illness and injury such as Hypothermia or Frostbite.

Signs and Symptoms of Hypothermia:

- Early symptoms: shivering, fatigue, loss of coordination, confusion, and disorientation
- Late symptoms: no shivering, blue skin, dilated pupils, slowed pulse and breathing, and loss of consciousness

First Aid:

- Request immediate medical assistance.
- Move the victim into a warm room or shelter.
- Remove wet clothing.
- Warm the center of their body first.
- o If conscious, warm beverages may help increase body temperature.
- Once temperature has increased keep them dry and wrapped in a warm blanket, including the head and neck.
- o If no pulse, begin CPR.

Signs and Symptoms of Frostbite:

- Symptoms: reduced blood flow to hands and feet, numbness, aching, tingling or stinging, and bluish or pale, waxy skin.
- First Aid:
 - Get into a warm room as soon as possible.
 - Unless necessary, do not walk on frostbitten feet or toes. Immerse the affected area in warm (not hot) water, or warm the affected are using body heat.
 - Do not massage the frostbitten area.

LED Bulbs Now Accepted at Household Hazardous Waste Disposal Sites

Light-emitting diode (LED) bulbs are not accepted in curbside recycling bins; however, Fairfax County residents may bring LEDs to the county's two household hazardous waste drop-off areas for recycling. The drop-off areas are located at the L-66 transfer station in Fairfax and the L-95 landfill complex in Lorton. LEDs are accepted free of charge.

LEDs have become the bulb of choice because they are more efficient than incandescent bulbs, but they often contain hazardous substances such as lead, nickel, silver, copper, and arsenic. Unlike compact fluorescent bulbs which contain

mercury, LEDs may be discarded as municipal solid waste, or regular trash. This new recycling option exceeds current federal and state regulatory statutes for the disposal of LEDs.
