Sales Tax Holiday, August 4-6: Save on School Supplies, Clothes & Emergency Items



It is almost back-to-school time, and this weekend is the best opportunity to save some money while you shop.

From August 4-6, you will not pay state sales tax on many items,

including a portable generator (under \$1,000), a dishwasher with an Energy Star label (under \$2,500) or a long list of school supplies, clothing and footwear.

This annual three-day sales tax holiday is for qualifying items in these categories:

- School supplies, clothing and footwear
- Hurricane and emergency preparedness supplies
- Items with Energy Star and WaterSense labels

The <u>August 4-6 sales tax holiday</u> includes qualifying items purchased in stores, online, by mail, or over the phone. This is a statewide tax holiday, but we want you to shop right here in our county!

School Supplies, Clothing and Footwear:

In time for back-to-school shopping, most **school supplies under \$20**, as well as many **clothes under \$100**, qualify for the sales tax exemption. A few items on the list include:

- Binders
- Bookbags
- Boots and shoes
- Coats
- Calculators
- Flash drives
- Pencils and pens
- Lunch boxes
- Socks
- Sheet music

Hurricane and Emergency Preparedness Supplies:

We are in hurricane season through November (and an emergency can strike at any time), so this is also a good time to stock up on emergency preparedness supplies. **Qualifying items are in different price categories so carefully check the state's list** below. You will not pay sales tax on many of these items during the sales tax holiday:

- Flashlights
- Batteries
- Cell phone chargers

- Bungee cords
- Tarps
- Weather radios
- Power generators (Check qualifying price range)
- Chain saws and accessories (Check qualifying price ranges)


Items With Energy Star or WaterSense Labels:

Need a new air conditioner or washing machine? The sales tax holiday includes qualifying items carrying either the Energy Star or WaterSense label that cost \$2,500 or less (and purchased for noncommercial home or personal use). Some items on this list include:

- Light bulbs
- Ceiling fans
- Dishwashers
- Bathroom sink faucets
- Toilets
- Landscape irrigation controllers

Workhouse BrewFest on August 12, 2017



It is not too late to buy early bird tickets for the second annual <u>Workhouse</u> <u>Brewfest</u> on August 12, 2017, from 1:00 to 8:00 p.m.

You can purchase discounted tickets starting at \$40 until Tuesday, August 8, and prices increase after this date.

The festival, which takes place at the Workhouse Arts Center in Lorton, will feature:

- 15 Virginia craft breweries, including ones located in Fairfax County
- 5 distilleries
- 1 cidery
- 12 bands
- Local food trucks
- Lawn games
- Art for sale at the center's studios and galleries, including commemorative growlers and beer steins handmade by Workhouse ceramic artists.

Brewfest is one of many cultural and arts events offered by the Workhouse Arts Center. The event is helping to stimulate arts and culture tourism to the <u>recently created NOVA Arts District</u> that encompasses the Workhouse, Occoquan Regional Park, and Town of Occoquan.

Located at 9601 Ox Road, Lorton, VA on 55 acres once occupied by the historic Lorton Workhouse prison, the Workhouse Arts Center is a vibrant community of visual artists, performing artists, and arts educators working together to serve over 100,000 visitors annually from communities throughout Fairfax County and the greater Northern Virginia region.

6 Reasons to Dispose of Meds & 5 Ways to Do It Safely



The Fairfax County Health Department advises that there are six good reasons to safely dispose of your unused medications:

- 1. Unused prescription medications are a public safety issue, leading to accidental poisoning, overdose, and abuse.
- 2. The majority of teenagers abusing prescription drugs get them from family and friends—and the home medicine cabinet.
- 3. Pharmaceutical drugs can be just as dangerous as street drugs when taken without a prescription or a doctor's supervision.
- 4. The nonmedical use of prescription drugs ranks second only to marijuana as the most common form of drug abuse in America.
- 5. Unused prescription drugs thrown in the trash can be retrieved and abused or illegally sold.
- Flushing unused drugs in the toilet contaminates the water supply. Proper disposal of unused drugs saves lives and protects the environment.

The American Pharmacists Association urges you to follow these five steps for safely disposing medications:

- 1. Keep the medicines in their original container. This will help identify the contents if they are accidentally ingested.
- 2. Cross out your name and prescription number for safety.
- 3. For pills: Add some salt water to start dissolving them. For liquids: Add something inedible like cat litter, dirt or ash.
- 4. Seal the container and secure with duct or packing tape.
- 5. Put the container in the trash as close to pickup time as possible. Do not put in the recycle bin.

Boating Safety Tips



As we enter the dog days of summer, our Marine Patrol Unit has some great tips and safety recommendations if you plan to enjoy the local waterways:

- 1. Wear a life jacket. There is not a case of a water-related death in this area where a life jacket was worn.
- Have a plan for emergencies and be sure to tell someone not going with you about your plans. Bring plenty of water, snacks, cell phone, and a VHF radio (they monitor channel 16) with you and know how to use it if in distress.
- Be sure your boat is sea-worthy before attempting to put it in the water. Too many people get stuck with bad gas, dead batteries, etc.
- 4. Be sure to have the basic requirements for your boat! EVERY operator no matter the age is now required to have taken a boater safety course and must have proof. Each vessel (depending on size) is required to have a life jacket (that fits) for every person, a fire extinguisher, horn/whistle/bell, and a life preserver. There are other requirements depending on the size/usage of you boat as well.
- 5. Last but not least, they take boating while intoxicated just as seriously as if you were driving a car. It is against the law and can get someone

seriously hurt, or worse, killed. Please use your best judgment and do not operate your boat while intoxicated.

Did you know our Marine Patrol Unit covers all of the inlets from the Occoquan to the Woodrow Wilson Bridge on the Potomac River? This is around 80 miles of shoreline. Plus they are responsible for coverage of the 17 lakes in Fairfax County.

They are the only full time unit in Northern Virginia and regularly assist boaters outside of Fairfax waterways. Finally, they train with most of the surrounding jurisdictions and have worked multiple cases with them over the years.

Our Marine Patrol Unit wants everyone to enjoy the water this summer and have fun, but do so in a safe manner.

Northern Virginia Senior Olympics



Registration for the 2017 Northern Virginia Senior Olympics (NVSO) is now open.

The NVSO includes about 70 events that exercise the mind as well as the body. To qualify for the Olympics participants must turn 50 by December 31, 2017.

Participants can register online at <u>www.nvso.us</u> or can register via mail with paper registrations that are available at most county recreation and senior centers. Registrations can also be downloaded at <u>www.nvso.us</u>.

Deadline for online NVSO registration is September 2. All paper registrations must be postmarked by August 26. The games are scheduled to commence Saturday, September 9 and conclude September 20.

The NVSO is celebrating its 35th anniversary this fall. The games began in 1982 with about 80 persons competing. In 2016 more than 900 Northern Virginians took part. The NVSO is one of the largest annual seniors events in the region.

The NVSO's basic registration fee is \$13. A fee of \$1 is added for each event entered. Some events require additional fees including bowling \$10 (includes lunch), cycling \$5 (to help cover the cost of traffic control and electronic timing), Golf \$65 (includes green fees, lunch, and cart), and orienteering \$5 (includes compass rental).
