Absentee Voting Begins: What You Need to Know

Four Important Things to Know About Absentee Voting in Fairfax County:

- Your absentee ballot is counted on election night and your vote is included with the reported results.
- There are 20 <u>valid reasons to vote absentee</u> in Virginia, including working and commuting to and from home for 11 or more hours between 6 a.m. and 7 p.m. on Election Day. Check the Virginia Department of Elections <u>list</u> to see if you are eligible.
- 3. There are two ways to absentee vote, in-person and by mail. To do either, you should first <u>check your voter registration status</u> to make sure it is up-to-date. Then you will need to apply for an absentee ballot. Note: If you vote absentee in-person you will fill out the application when you arrive at the in-person absentee location (see locations below). Voting absentee by mail? Read below for the process of applying for your mail-in ballot.
- 4. You can <u>apply for an absentee ballot online</u> by accessing your Virginia Voter Record. You will need your **Social Security Number** and information on your **Virginia Driver's License** to complete the application. Information is also provided on how to apply if you do not have a driver's license.

November 4 is the last day to absentee vote in-person.

Absentee Voting by Mail:

Important note if you are voting absentee by mail using the United States Postal Service (USPS): The USPS has changed its delivery standards and First Class mail delivery is now two to five days. Standard delivery is now two to nine days. Please take this into consideration and allow ample time to apply for and mail-in your absentee ballot so that it is delivered to the Office of Elections by Election Day at 7:00 p.m.

Track the status of your mail-in absentee ballot application and ballot go to the <u>Virginia Citizen Portal</u>; access your Virginia Voter Record to view your voter-related information.

Deadline to apply for an absentee ballot online, by mail, fax or email is 7 days prior to Election Day by 5:00 p.m.

What you need to do:

You can apply for your absentee ballot <u>online</u>

Or

- Print the <u>absentee ballot application</u> (PDF). Absentee ballot applications are also available at county governmental centers and library branches, or call the Office of Elections at 703-222-0776 (TTY 711).
- Complete the <u>absentee ballot application</u> (PDF) make sure you sign the application.
- Fax the application to the Office of Elections at 703-324-3725. Or, scan then email the application to absenteeballot@fairfaxcounty.gov.
 Or, mail to the Office of Elections, Box 10161, Fairfax, VA 22038.
- Once your completed application is received and accepted, your absentee ballot will be sent to you within three business days. If you have questions about your ballot, call the Office of Elections at 703-222-0776 (TTY 711).

The deadline to return your absentee ballot to the Office of Elections is Election Day at 7:00 p.m.

VDOT Unveils Website for I-66 Express Lanes Inside the Beltway



With express lanes opening this December on I-66 Inside the Beltway, the Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) unveiled a new website, 66ExpressLanes.org, to educate travelers about how tolling will work, the necessity of getting an E-ZPass or E-ZPass Flex, and other changes coming to the highway. The express lanes, which will be in effect Monday through Friday, 5:30-9:30 a.m. eastbound, and 3:00-7:00 p.m. westbound, are designed to offer new travel choices that move more people on I-66 with greater speed and reliability.

This new website provides comprehensive information to prepare commuters for the opening of the Express Lanes, including:


 How the dynamically-tolled I-66 Inside the Beltway Express Lanes will operate;

- Who is subject to the toll by explaining the difference between a free and tolled trip. Solo drivers will be able to use the highway during rush hour for the first time since it opened in 1982 by paying a toll, while carpoolers, transit riders, motorcyclists, and emergency and law enforcement vehicles performing their duties will experience toll-free trips. The elimination of exemptions for special user groups such as clean-fuel vehicles and Dulles International Airport-bound vehicles, to treat all I-66 users equally;
- What type of transponder to choose by making a distinction between E-ZPass (which enables solo drivers to pay a toll to access the rushhour Express Lanes) and E-ZPass Flex (which enables vehicles with two or more occupants to travel toll-free);
- Where to get an E-ZPass/E-ZPass Flex, including AAA Mid-Atlantic locations, select Wegmans and Giant grocery stores, Virginia
 Department of Motor Vehicles centers, and online;
- When are the new HOV/tolling hours? In the morning driving eastbound between 5:30 and 9:30 a.m. and in the evening heading westbound between 3:00 and 7:00 p.m.; and
- How much will it cost? A toll calculator that will display current toll rate estimates, which will be activated when the Express Lanes open.

After covering the cost of maintaining and operating the facility, remaining toll revenues from the I-66 Inside the Beltway Express Lanes will be invested in transportation alternatives that improve mobility and benefit travelers using I-66 Inside the Beltway will be administered by the Northern Virginia Transportation Commission.

Now is the Time to Take Care of Your Lawn for Next Year



Fall is often associated with cool weather, hayrides, and pumpkin-flavored goodies. But it is also the best time of year to fertilize your yard and give it the best chance to thrive next spring and summer.

Here are some tips from the <u>Northern Virginia Soil and Water Conservation</u> District.

Why Now?:

Timing is everything when you apply fertilizer.

Fall is the best time. It's when the roots that will sustain the plants through the following summer are actively growing. Sooner is better. Effective lawn feeding after Thanksgiving often is hampered by wintry conditions, when precipitation will wash the fertilizer into local streams, contributing to waterway pollution.

Spring fertilizing is not particularly helpful for your lawn. It encourages leaf

growth at the expense of root development. It also feeds weed species and can lead to disease and insect problems later in the season. In addition, you will have to mow the lawn more frequently. If you must fertilize in the spring, limit it to a light feeding (0 phosphorus) after the initial flush of growth has subsided in May.

Never fertilize in the summer. Most lawn grasses in our area are cool season species, which go dormant during the heat of the summer.

Soil Matters:

Before you fertilize, test your soil to learn what, if anything, it needs. The most common need in this area is lime because most soils in Northern Virginia are acidic and lime helps to neutralize the acidity. A balanced pH will improve the absorption of nutrients, encourage thatch decomposition and benefit soil microorganisms, all of which are essential to the soil's health and fertility.

Lime can be applied to your lawn area any time of the year. However, because it takes several months to be fully incorporated into the soil, it is best to apply it in the fall. For turf, pelletized limestone is preferable to pulverized limestone. The pellets spread more evenly with less dust.

For just \$10, the <u>Virginia Cooperative Extension</u> will analyze your soil sample and return the results to you. Pick up a soil test kit at any Fairfax County Public Library or at the Virginia Cooperative Extension on the 10th floor of the <u>Pennino Building</u>. Another resource is <u>Home Turf: a Healthy Virginia</u> Lawns program.

Mowing Your Yard:

One common mistake with lawn care is mowing your grass too short. It is best to set your blades for a mowing height that will remove only the top one-third of the grass blade. Higher settings allow the grass to compete effectively with lower-growing weed species. Higher growth also shades the ground from the sun, reducing moisture requirements. If you have a small lawn, consider using a manual-reel mower. It saves energy, reduces pollution and burns calories, too!

Also be sure to keep your mower blades sharp to produce a cleaner cut that slices through grass rather than pulling it by the roots. A sharp blade will give your lawn a more uniform appearance. In addition, sharp blades help extend the life of your mower because the engine will not have to work as hard to produce the same results.

After you cut the grass, let the turf clippings lie on the yard since they are mostly composed of the grass's leaf tissue and reduce decompose rapidly. Clippings left on the lawn will contribute a substantial amount of nitrogen and other nutrients to the soil and reduce fertilizer requirements.

Supplement your mowing by using healthy lawn care practices. If you use pesticides, apply only to the area that is affected by the pest.

Choosing a Lawn Care Company:

If you decide to leave lawn care to the professionals, carefully research a company's methods of operation. Some questions to keep in mind include:

 Does the company offer a variety of pest management approaches from which you may choose?


- Does it apply pesticides on a regular schedule regardless of need or does it limit pesticide use to only when needed?
- Does it evaluate and treat your lawn as a single entity or does every lawn get the same treatment?
- Does the company routinely combine fertilizer and pesticides in each application?

Volunteer Opportunity in Sully



Cub Run Stream Valley Park Volunteer Team

Cub Run Stream Valley Park is the third largest park in Fairfax County, but until recently, has not had a formal group dedicated to supporting it. To fill this need, the Cub Run Stream Valley Park Volunteer Team was formed in partnership with the Fairfax County Park Authority. The mission of the group is threefold: **Preserve, Share, Connect**. Their plan is to reduce park litter

through organizing biannual clean-up events, share photos and video via Facebook of the natural, historic, and cultural aspects of the park, and finally to connect with nature and with other neighbors resulting in a more resilient community. The long-term goal is the creation of self-organizing teams to focus on the area of the park adjacent to each community. They have already coordinated 6 park clean-up events in the past year and have removed 98 bags of trash, 12 tires, a desk, a couch, a computer monitor, and 4 bikes.
