Transit Options During Metro's SafeTrack Surge #15



SafeTrack Surge #15 will result in a <u>shutdown on a portion of the Orange Line</u> <u>between New Carrollton and Stadium-Armory stations</u> from May 16 through June 15, 2017.

Highlights:

- New Carrollton, Landover, Cheverly, Deanwood and Minnesota Ave stations closed.
- Orange Line trains will operate near normal service between Vienna and Largo Town Center.
- Silver Line trains will operate between Wiehle-Reston East and Stadium-Armory every 12 minutes.

On Weekdays:

- New Carrollton, Landover, Cheverly, Deanwood and Minnesota Ave stations closed.
- Limited free shuttle buses (every 30 minutes) will replace trains between New Carrollton and Stadium-Armory.
- Express shuttle buses will connect to Blue Line stations for quicker, easier transfers to rail service:
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 - Minnesota Ave to Stadium-Armory

- Deanwood to Capitol Heights
- Cheverly to Morgan Blvd
- Landover and New Carrollton to Morgan Blvd

*Note - riders must tap their SmarTrip card on the shuttle bus to receive a rebate on any difference in fare. More information on <u>wmata.com/safetrack</u>.

- Orange Line trains will run near normal service every 6-8 minutes between Vienna and Largo Town Center.
- Silver Line trains will run every 12-minutes between Wiehle-Reston East and Stadium-Armory.
- During midday and evenings trains will run every 12 minutes.
- After 10:00 p.m. trains will run every 20 minutes.

Weekend train frequencies may change to coordinate with other planned track work on the Metrorail system. <u>Weekend service information is posted in the WMATA</u> <u>Alerts & Advisories section.</u>

The Parenting Education Program



What is the Parenting Education Program and what is its philosophy?

The Department of Family Services Parenting Education Program offers caring, comprehensive classes to parents and their children to help them learn new ways to work together as a family. The program is based on the philosophy that parenting is learned – the way parents were raised directly influences the way they raise their children. The Parenting Education Program teaches positive and effective ways parents can interact with their children at every age and stage of development. The focus is on the family - where children learn the values and beliefs that shape their futures.

Who participates in the Parenting Education Program?

Families enroll in the program to make their families stronger and closer. This program helps participants understand nurturing behaviors and learn how nurturing behaviors can work within their family environment. Together the family learns to:

- Build and develop the ability to recognize and value the thoughts and feelings of others.
- Handle uncomfortable feelings such as stress and anger.
- Communicate in non-threatening ways.
- Establish consistent, nurturing routines for fun family activities.

- Use alternatives to physical punishment.
- Take charge of their own feelings and behaviors, and interact with others in positive ways.

Who may participate in the program?

Families living in Fairfax County and City of Fairfax who want to build healthy interactions and create positive change within their family.

What is the cost?

Classes are FREE and include an evening meal and child care.

What are the requirements for participating?

- Participants must agree to complete the program as a family.
- Participants should be comfortable in a group learning environment.
- Participants must commit to attend the first three sessions to allow the group learning process to develop.

How to Enroll?

- Contact the number listed for the program of interest.
- The staff person will provide details as to dates, times, location of the class.
- An enrollment form will be emailed or mailed.
- A appointment will be made for a phone screening to complete the enrollment process.

In partnership with our community and with a commitment to quality service, the program promotes self-reliance in families and individuals by providing essential knowledge and resources tailored to the needs of the children, adolescents, and adults.

Available classes:

Parents and Children (Newborn to 4 years old) Offered in English and Spanish. 24 sessions

Parents learn to recognize and understand feelings; nurturing parenting routines; infant massage; child development; and ways to foster positive selfesteem in themselves and their children. View the schedule of classes.

Parents and Children (5 to 11 years old) Offered in English and Spanish. 13 sessions

Parents and children learn to increase their empathy, discover new ways to encourage appropriate behaviors, build positive self-concept and self-esteem, and learn how to have fun as a family. <u>View the schedule of classes.</u>

Parents and Adolescents (12 to 18 years old) *Offered in English. 12 sessions* Family members learn nurturing communication strategies, how to recognize each other's needs, how to understand the developmental stages of adolescence, and ways to build their own personal power, self-concept and self-esteem. <u>View the</u> <u>schedule of classes.</u>

Parents and Children: Family Focused African-American – Focusing on


Culture Offered in English. 12-24 sessions

Fairfax County Bicycle Map



The Fairfax County Department of Transportation released the first countywide bicycle route map on May 16, 2008 during Bike to Work Day. Now in its third edition, the printed Fairfax County Bicycle map shows bike friendly routes connecting all of Fairfax County. This map identifies a network of both on and offroad routes to assist bicyclists in navigating Fairfax County. With more than 5,000 miles of roadway and 700 miles of trails, the map highlights the most desirable routes and major trails for recreational and commuter bicyclists as well as out of town visitors. 
Your input will help shape the county's Communitywide Housing Strategic Plan. The goals of the Plan are to:

Nominate Superior Architecture for a 2017 Fairfax County Exceptional Design Award



Because architecture shapes our daily life—whether we consciously realize it or not—Fairfax County created the <u>Exceptional Design Awards</u> program to recognize quality design in our community.

Nominations are <u>sought for the 2017 awards</u> through now through submissions Friday, June 16, 2017.

Entries should:

- Exemplify a superior work of architecture
- Incorporate total site design and landscaping
- Take into account the **context of the work in relationship to its surroundings**, or
- Apply energy and water conservation and other green building practices

Nominations can be submitted in the following categories:

- **Residential**: single-family residential projects, including homes, additions, restorations, renovations, and interiors and multi-family housing
- Commercial" office, retail, industrial
- **Commercial Interiors**: primarily the design of commercial interior spaces

- Institutional: such as fire stations, educational facilities and places of worship
- Recreational: such as recreational facilities, entertainment or performing
 arts centers
- **Historical/Adaptive Re-use**: projects involving the preservation, restoration, rehabilitation or sympathetic adaptive reuse of historic structures
- Adaptive Re-use/Repurposing: projects involving the rehabilitation and sympathetic adaptive reuse of existing buildings
- Mixed Use: some combination of residential, retail or office
- **Community Benefit Project**: such as affordable housing, senior housing or a community center

The awards, judged by a jury, include honor awards, merit awards and honorable mentions. **Winners will be announced on Wednesday, August 16, 2017.**

The program is sponsored by the Fairfax County <u>Board of Supervisors</u> and administered by the <u>Department of Planning and Zoning</u>, in cooperation with the county's <u>Architectural Review Board</u> and the Northern Virginia Chapter of the American Institute of Architects.

- How to connect with your child's network


Resource tables will have free, take-home materials about wellness strategies and mental health resources.

Volunteer Opportunity



Elections Officer

Fairfax County needs dedicated individuals who take pride in their work, are patient and enjoy working with people, who follow directions, and are detail-oriented.

We especially encourage bilingual citizens to serve as we need language assistance in many precincts.

Duties: The Election Officer's main priority is to ensure the accuracy and integrity of the election process. A typical Election Day consists of arriving one hour before polls open to set up voting equipment, hanging up pertinent signage, preparing the polling room for voting, processing voters throughout the day, assisting with operating voting equipment, securing voting equipment and closing down the polling place at the end of the day

Volunteer Benefits: Election Officers are offered a stipend of \$175 for serving a full day.

Qualifications: In order to be an Election Officer, you must: be fluent in English, be a registered voter in the Commonwealth of Virginia, be able to fulfill the Federal I-9 employment eligibility requirements, attend a 3-hour training class, arrive at the polling place at 5:00 am and remain until all work has been completed after the polls close at 7:00 pm, and have basic computer skills
