2020 Dog License and Renewal Due January 31, 2020:

All dogs four months and older must be licensed, and the deadline to get a dog license, or renew one, is **Friday**, **January 31**, **2020**. The license fee is \$10 per dog and is good for one year (excluding service dogs, which receive licenses free of charge). After we receive your information and fee, you will be mailed a license tag for your dog's collar.

Please let the Department of Tax Administration (DTA) know if you no longer own your licensed dog, if it passed away, or is living outside the county. You can do so <u>online</u>. You will need your registration number and previous license number that was sent to you in November.



SUPER SHRUBS & TINY TREES

2 Silky Dogwood

(Cornus amomum) 6-12' tall. Full to part sun. Moist to wet soils.

Beautiful white clustered flowers May-June and orange, red, or purple fall color. High wildlife value for birds and small mammals. Perfect for areas near wetlands or streambanks.

2 Common Buttonbush

(Cephalanthus occidentalis) 6-12' tall. Full sun to full shade. Moist to wet soils.

Produces fragrant creamy white flowers July-Aug. and interesting fruit in the fall. Grows well in wetlands and along lake and pond edges. Tolerates drought and flooding to 36".

Used by butterflies and other beneficial insects.

2 Smooth Sumac (Rhus glabra) 2-20' tall. Full sun. Dry to moist soils.

Fruits fuzzy red berry clusters Aug.-Oct. and turns red in the fall. High wildlife value for songbirds, small mammals, and beneficial insects. Extremely drought resistant, perfect for dry slopes and open areas.

2 Eastern Redbud (Cercis candensis) 20-35' tall. Part to full shade. Dry to moist soils.

Pink and lavender flowers Apr.-May and turns a golden yellow in the fall. Commonly found along streambanks. Fixes nitrogen.

2 New Jersey Tea (Ceanothus americanus) 3' tall. Full to part sun. Dry soils.

Clusters of white flowers May-Sept. and yellow fall color. Does well in meadows and other open areas. Fixes nitrogen.

Mapleleaf Viburnum (Viburnum acerifolium) 3-6' tall. Full sun to full shade. Dry to moist soils.

White flower clusters in June, edible black berries Aug.-Dec. Orange, red, or purple fall foliage. High wildlife value for songbirds and small mammals. Performs well in rocky areas and slopes.

2 Aromatic Sumac (Rhus aromatica) 6' tall. Full to part sun. Dry soils.

Fuzzy edible wine red berry clusters July-Mar. and aromatic leaves. Red fall foliage. High wildlife value for songbirds, small mammals, and beneficial insects. Performs well in rocky areas and slopes.

2 Beautyberry

(Callicarpa americana) 6' tall. Full to partial sun. Dry to moist soils.

Lavender-pink flowers June-Aug. and lavender berries Sept.-Mar. Can be easily pruned if overgrown to 18" and will regrow in a season.

The <u>AARP Foundation Tax-Aide program</u> provides **free** federal tax return preparation and e-filing **from February 1 through April 15, 2020** by volunteers certified by the IRS. The 12 centers (shown below) in Northern Virginia also prepare Virginia returns. Although the program has no income limits, Tax-Aide clients are generally low and middle income taxpayers. No site requires appointments. You do not have to be an AARP member to take advantage of this service, which is available to taxpayers of all ages, with special attention to seniors.

January is National Radon Action Month



January is National Radon Action Month. You can't see, smell or taste it, but radon is considered second only to smoking as the leading cause of lung cancer. Radon is a naturally occurring radioactive gas that results from the natural decay of uranium that is found in nearly all soils. It can seep into your home from cracks and other holes in the foundation. The highest levels of radon are typically found in the lowest livable areas of the home, such as basements or other rooms in direct contact with the ground. The higher the radon level and the longer a person is exposed to it, then the greater the health risk. And radon can only be detected by testing. Virginia residents can order a \$3 test kit at www.vdhradon.org. You can also use that link to find certified radon professionals who can test and fix the problem.

FCPS to Add Electric School Buses to Its Fleet


Fairfax County Public Schools (FCPS) has been selected to receive funding assistance to purchase eight electric school buses as part of Dominion Energy's initial deployment of 50 buses across the Commonwealth. These buses will join FCPS' current fleet of roughly 1,625 diesel-fueled buses.

Dominion Energy will cover the difference in cost so that school districts pay no more for electric buses than they would for diesel models. Dominion will also subsidize the cost of necessary charging infrastructure.

Electric School buses in FCPS will benefit not only the school division and its community, but the entire national capital area as they will help reduce carbon emissions, serve as a resource for national emergency planning efforts, provide stability and capacity to the grid with meeting increasing energy demands, and provide charging facilities for other jurisdictions in the area to use when traveling through Fairfax County.
