Name: Diversion First

**Brief Description of the Initiative**: Diversion First offers alternatives to incarceration for people with mental illness, substance use disorders and/or developmental disabilities, who come into contact with the criminal justice system, mostly for low level offenses. This countywide initiative provides a continuum of services and programs designed to meet the needs of this population at various intervention points, with the goal providing assessment, treatment and needed supports. Diversion First is designed to prevent repeat encounters with the criminal justice system, improve public safety and promote a healthier community. This effort involves strong collaboration across multiple agencies, including health and human services, public safety and the courts.

### Context:

Those served through Diversion First are historically marginalized populations, including people with mental illness, substance use disorders and/or developmental disabilities, and people with a history of justice involvement.

Behavioral Health Equity is the right to access quality health care for all populations regardless of the individual's race, ethnicity, gender, socioeconomic status, sexual orientation, or geographical location. This includes access to prevention, treatment, and recovery services for mental and substance use disorders (Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, Jun 10, 2021). Individuals in these population often have disparate access to quality behavioral health services, and disproportionate representation in the justice system.

Nationally, people with mental illness are significantly over-represented in the justice system and are 9 times more likely to be incarcerated than hospitalized. Individuals with serious mental illness (SMI) who are in the criminal justice system tend to have longer jail stays and higher recidivism rates than people without SMI. Additionally, incarceration can worsen mental health, highlighting the need to prevent individuals with severe mental illness from being incarcerated whenever possible, and to connect individuals who were formerly incarcerated to behavioral health care to avoid future justice involvement. While the percentage of individuals with behavioral health issues who are incarcerated varies, Fairfax County saw a 21% decrease in the jail behavioral health population with misdemeanor charges from 2015 to 2022.

Many people who need behavioral health care are not aware of services or how to access them, and/or may not access services due to stigma. Increased awareness and community engagement are needed to reduce stigma and increase access to care. In addition, it is often challenging to gather and analyze cross-system data. To provide the most effective and efficient services, it is vital to have a clear understanding of who is accessing services, disparities and gaps in programming and outcomes.
