Name: Diversion First

Brief Description of the Initiative: Diversion First offers alternatives to incarceration for people with mental illness, co-occurring substance use disorders and/or developmental disabilities, who come into contact with the criminal justice system, mostly for low level offenses. This countywide initiative provides a continuum of services and programs designed to meet the needs of this population at various intervention points, with the goal providing assessment, treatment and needed supports. Diversion First is designed to prevent repeat encounters with the criminal justice system, improve public safety and promote a healthier community. This effort involves strong collaboration across multiple agencies, including health and human services, public safety and the courts.

Context:

Those served through Diversion First include marginalized populations such as people with mental illness, substance use disorders and developmental disabilities, as well as those who are homeless and people with a history of incarceration.

Various populations, often based on race, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, and economic status, have disparate access to high-quality behavioral health services, and disproportionate representation in the criminal justice system. People with mental illness are significantly over-represented in the justice system. Nationally, people with mental illness are 9 times more likely to be incarcerated than hospitalized. People with mental illness stay four to eight times longer in jail than someone without a mental illness for the exact same charge. The COVID-19 pandemic further exacerbated these disparities, with impacts such as isolation, fewer employment opportunities and lack of health insurance and other resources.

Behavioral Health Equity is the right to access quality health care for all populations regardless of the individual's race, ethnicity, gender, socioeconomic status, sexual orientation, or geographical location. This includes access to prevention, treatment, and recovery services for mental and substance use disorders (Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, Jun 10, 2021).

Historically, it has been challenging to gather and analyze cross-system data, with multiple data systems, lack of data system interoperability, and lack of common definitions for terms used across systems. To provide the most effective and efficient services it is important to have a clear understanding of who is accessing services, as well as gaps in programming and outcomes.

In addition, many people who need behavioral health care are not aware of services or how to access them, and/or may not access services due to stigma.
