Background

- Despite significant past commitments by the Board, new pedestrian and bicycle projects lack funding.
- Current funding is committed to approved projects through FY 2025. List of Currently Funded Pedestrian and Bicycle Projects (Attachment 9)
- Board has expanded safe bicycle and pedestrian access for County residents, and the Board has emphasized this importance especially near schools, parks, activity and revitalization centers, and transit station areas.



Background

- During the pandemic, pedestrian and bicycle activity increased considerably.
- However, the increased interest also highlighted the inadequacies of our infrastructure.




Board Direction (Joint Board Matter October 5, 2021)

- Make one-time investments in pedestrian and bicycle infrastructure. Goal through FY 2027 shall be at least \$100 million in new funding.
- Identify new funding during FY 2022.
- **Compile a list** of previously identified and currently unfunded pedestrian and bicycle projects.
- Recommend **criteria for evaluation** of projects to be funded in FY 2022, and in FY 2023 and beyond.

Process and Criteria for Evaluation of Projects

- Four-step process to analyze hundreds of potential projects using data criteria (Attachment 1)
- Step 1 identify projects with the greatest public benefit:

Public Demand
Public Need
Safety
Regional connectivity
Board member input
Community and stakeholder input



Process and Criteria for Evaluation of Projects

- Step 2 Include additional key projects prioritized for other reasons such as school safety, placemaking and economic development.
- Step 3 refine and **develop a short list** of potential projects.
- Step 4 complete **final evaluation** of short-listed projects by feasibility, relative costs, constructability, property and environmental impacts.
- Step 5 Board consideration and action
