I strongly oppose the proposal to rename Lee Highway and Lee-Jackson Memorial Highway.

First, the proposal is an Orwellian attempt to erase history. The importance of Robert E. Lee and Andrew Jackson to the history of the United States and the Commonwealth of Virginia is beyond question. Let that history be studied and debated, not denied.

Second, the naming of highways for these individuals is obviously not an endorsement of everything they ever said or did in their lives. They were 19th century leaders who cannot be expected to have complied in all respects with 21st century standards. Moreover, all humans are imperfect. If the names of Lee and Jackson cannot appear on the highways, then no one else's names can appear on them, because no human is flawless. Every human has said or done something that most would agree should not have been said or done. The result will then be that highways and other public structures can be identified only by numbers and letters, which will make for a barren and sterile world.

Third, one can simultaneously disapprove of the Confederacy and recognize Robert E. Lee's service to the United States before the Civil War, as well as his great bravery during the Civil War in fulfillment of what he regarded as his duty. He was an adversary of the Union, but showing respect for one's adversaries after a battle is often the path to reconciliation. Indeed, it is quite possible that many Confederate monuments erected in the United States after the Confederacy had been defeated were, at least in part, the reflection of a desire for reconciliation. Hundreds of thousands of human beings lost their lives fighting for the Confederacy. They acted to defend a world that they were born into, and it is not wrong to recognize their sacrifice and suffering.

Fourth, and finally, the very effort to change the names is itself clearly part of a political attempt to provoke racial antagonism as a means to promote radical policies on more substantive issues. The names of these highways are not oppressing anyone, but the politicization of these names is being used as a way to make some people of today feel wronged by, and other people of today feel guilty for, events of more than a century and a half ago that no person living today had anything to do with. Manufacturing grievances over road names is just a way of manipulating people to advance the political objectives of those who want to change the political and social systems by replacing a merit-based society with one based on racial preferences administered by bureaucrats. Such exploitation should be condemned, not rewarded with never-ending excursions for dredging up ancient wrongs.

I doubt that you will pay any attention to these comments, because I think your mind is probably already made up, but I hope that you will prove me wrong in that regard by showing the courage to resist the pressure to change these names.

It prolongs trauma inflicted on the minority community, which persists in all aspects of our daily life. They have long cried out about the harm these symbols cause them; to leave the name would be to continue telling them "we don't care about what harms you."

Discarding names and symbols of the Confederacy is the EASIEST & SIMPLEST step to take in addressing trauma inflicted upon minority communities and the LEAST we can do to reverse it. A change sends a small but significant message to our BIPOC brothers, sisters, and children that they matter. It would also introduce to the community at large a figure many may not be familiar with, and incentivize them to learn a little more about a POSITIVE figure in our history.

Dear Sir or Madam:

The essential issue involved here is this: What exactly did the person in question do that justifies his or her being put, sometimes quite literally, on a pedestal? In the case of Confederate leaders, the act for which they are being honored is one of rebellion against the United States of America and in defense of the Southern status quo, a major element of which was slavery. The salient question is not whether the person himself or herself was acting with good intentions but whether the act itself was, in final analysis, noble and honorable and worthy of emulation by future generations. Just as it is possible to do the right thing for the wrong reasons, in which case it is still the right thing, it is also possible to do the wrong thing with the best of intentions, in which case it is still the wrong thing.

It will be of course argued that renaming roads and removing statues is somehow "erasing history". No, no historical documents are being destroyed and no books are being burned. The history is all still there, readily available to all who are interested. Also, the historical value of a road name or a statue is, at best, questionable. Rather, these things are done more to make a point or create an impression, so the question then becomes one of whether the point or impression being conveyed is worthwhile.

It will also be argued that the Confederacy was not all about slavery. Well, no, actually it was. I am writing to offer my thoughts on the renaming of Lee and Lee-Jackson highways.

The roads were named for Generals Robert E. Lee and Thomas "Stonewall" Jackson out of respect for their battlefield prowess. They were seen, at least in the south, as the greatest Civil War generals. While "Stonewall" Jackson did not survive the war, Lee did. We can never know what Jackson would have become had he survived the war but we know Lee was paroled and took the oath to rejoin the United States. Lee was a refined man who took a position as president at Washington College in Lexington, Va. until his death in 1870.

The southern states had little to celebrate about the years 1861 to 1865, except their pride in their generals. Lee Highway was named 54 years after the end of the Civil War and Lee-Jackson 56 years. It was a period when the last of the veterans who served during the Civil War were dying out. The monuments and roads named for these generals were memorials meaningful to those whose families had served under them. Never forget that it is not the soldier who decides to go to war, but rather to obey his government.

Would renaming these roads matter in the overall scheme of things, no. But it would show that we no longer care about those who stood, fought, and died when their country asked them to do so should the political winds change and go against them at a later time.

Personally, I see no reason to make the changes.

Thank you for renaming Jefferson Davis Highway. Now if you would hurry up and get those signs down on Route 1 and 95. They drive me crazy every time I see them!



It is far past the time that we should acknowledge that the confederates who fought against it were traitors. I am a new resident of Virginia, and just retired after 29 years of active duty service. I'm originally from NY; my grandparents or great grandparents having immigrated there in the early 1900's. I have no love for the confederacy or any such cause. I do however recognize and appreciate the reality in which the American people lived in back then. Lee and Jackson were soldiers, loyal their community and most relevant government at the time; their State. That obligation was so strong back then, that families on opposite sides of an imaginary line would go to war with each other due to that obligation. Virtually nobody, given the shear numbers involved, neglected that responsibility.

These men served their country for decades regardless of their personal beliefs, in order to protect their neighbors and their family. They both distinguished themselves in the US Army prior to the civil war, and although Jackson did not survive, Lee further distinguished himself after the war while working to reunite the country. Lee's dedication to serve, and professionalism among political disputes was so respected by the president, Lincoln even asked him to lead the US army after the secession was announced. So much of the public today focus on new and popular movements without understanding the history behind past decisions, or the value of service (military or otherwise) that people are recognized for. Regardless of the size or popularity of public recognition, I'd like to think that the sacrifices made my our soldiers and sailors can be recognized for what they are, and that the continued sacrifices of our soldiers today will not be soiled because of a change in our children's social or political opinion.

These men served their country with honor, regardless of how misdirected their political leaders were. Whether the decision was to invade Mexico, or leave the Union, it was not their decision. This is not a monument to a politician or political ideology, it is a remembrance of the sacrifice and service of these soldiers, and those who served under them. I am not personally tied to the naming of a road, and I'm not even sure what the significance of naming these specific (geographic) roads after them is. I do think that erasing their legacy and the sacrifices they and their troops give up for their government and community is misdirected. They and all soldiers should be remembered and honored for their sacrifice, and not used as the basis for a political argument.







A name change, while costly, will reflect that the beliefs about race for which these two gentlemen fought -- that States or their citizens should have the right to enslave or otherwise deprive people of the fundamental civil or human rights that other citizens enjoy -- no longer reflect the values of the Commonwealth or of Fairfax County.

Why spend that money, whether from public, private, or some combination of funds?

Because I believe that the financial investment in the future culture of Virginia and Fairfax County is worth every penny. The future good of the County and Commonwealth is NOT served by continuing to honor General Lee and "Stonewall" Jackson. Indeed, efforts to preserve their legacy by keeping the names of these two roads, helps to perpetuate cultural attitudes that history, hopefully, is in the process of rejecting. Regardless of how blatant or how subtle the message, continuing to honor these mens broadcasts that our Government "believes" that the Confederate cause was just. The proper place for teaching about these men is in museums and history books, along with education about their mistaken betrayal of human and civil rights at the heart of our great American experiment. We sadly STILL seem to be testing, to this day, whether a nation that is dedicated to the proposition that "all [people] are created equal" can long endure.

So I believe strongly that -- instead of honoring Confederate soldiers -- we ought to be honoring the values at the heart of our Democracy, ones that help to promote its survival as a beacon of hope for true "liberty and justice for all."

Naming public spaces ought to honor such values, or the people whose lives are role models for the values and ideals to which we hope our young people will aspire. Indeed, re-naming those two roads should remind all citizens of the County and Commonwealth, as well as those who work or visit us, that we have moved beyond (or at the very least aspire to move beyond!) the racial questions about which we fought our Civil War.

Meanwhile, ongoing "cultural wars" continue, sadly -- with some people still trying to justify discrimining against groups of people and individual persons who genuinely wish to contribute their gifts and talents to our community, free from unfair, demeaning, and dehumanizing treatment. It's time, or past time, that our government chooses to honor the fundamental civil and human rights that are enshrined in our founding documents.

even though the cause he fought for cannot ever be. Even during the war, Rommel was respected by his opponents (as were Lee and Jackson in their time). Interestingly, Germany's top U-boat commander during World War 2 later became an admiral in the West German Navy, and worked for NATO. At NATO, he worked alongside some of the men who he tried to sink and who tried to sink him. True, there

are some who can never be "rehabilitated" – to my knowledge, no Waffen SS (the combat arm of the SS) leader is held in high regard today, and we would not honor Nathan Bedford Forest for the same reason – but no streets in our area are named for him.

4. Given the Civil War theme, the proposed change goes totally against the spirit voiced by Lincoln in his Second Inaugural – "with malice toward none and charity toward all". If you look at civil wars in other parts of the world, they tend to drag on for a very long time (former Yugoslavia case in point), and leave historic bitterness that lasts even longer. Lincoln had a better idea for how to end our civil war. Unfortunately, he did not live long enough to effectuate his vision. I am willing to bet that the majority of people in Fairfax County don't have a strong feeling one way or the other, but would not want personal cost or inconvenience for something they don't care deeply about, some people are offended by the road names, and others either would be offended at the change, or see it as nothing more than political correctness. Changing road names will tend to exacerbate divisions in our society, not heal them. There are commentaries that changing the road names is a way to promote racial healing. I suggest that racial healing can come about regardless of road names, but if people perceive that powers that be change the names because they can, it will more likely promote a sense of grievance than a sense of healing.


Keeping the names reminds folks of Virginia's history and honors men, who I believe served their state well at the time, though the overall cause for which they fought – especially from today's perspective – was and is morally wrong.**

With respect to the two road names in question, it would seem the Lee-Jackson Memorial Highway designation has a better "historical claim" than Lee Highway since many civil war military actions were fought along that route (similar to the John Singleton Mosby's Highway along route 50). If the committee ultimately decides to rename these highways because of understandable deference to our black citizens, I would encourage the county to still erect historical markers along those routes where important historical civil war actions occurred.

In my view Confederate memorials in front of government buildings or judicial courts ought to be moved, unless (in rare instances) there is a direct historical connection worthy of note, such as the John Quincy Marr memorial. I think it was wrong to remove that memorial since it is my understanding this was roughly where Marr was killed in one of the earliest of skirmishes/raids of the civil war. I think it is also wrong to remove portraits from a gallery in state legislatures just because a man served the Confederacy if other past legislators are displayed. We should retain the historical where appropriate even while we remove the glorification of the "Lost Cause."

^{**} While the extension of slavery in the territories was undoubtedly the driving underlying cause of the war, men in both north and south often viewed their primary duty and loyalty rested with their state. Those men, who resigned their military officer's commissions and followed their state's were not traitors. The military oaths they took to the United States had a history of duality, referring not only to the Union but also to the compact of individual sovereign states. Once a state voluntarily left that compact, the compact was logically dissolved and to these men they were no longer U.S. citizen bound. This is why later, after the war began, Radical Republicans pushed through a changed ("ironclad") oath (July 1862), specifically targeting those who followed their states, or had sympathies for the South. The issue of whether secession was legal or not was of course.



To Whom it May Concern,

My current recommendation is to not change the names of Lee Hwy and Lee-Jackson Hwy. My reasons are below:

- 1) Pragmatic. This potential renaming of highways requires time and costs that the government could use towards helping those truly in need or providing additional safety measures in the county. The names of roadways may be bothersome to some, but an unsafe intersection in need of a stoplight (as an example) is of greater importance. Reliable public transportation for a single mom is more important than a street name. If Fairfax County solves all of its problems which have physical impacts on people in the County first, then perhaps it is time to look at road names.
- 2) Flawless name. I do not believe there is a flawless name that could be presented to replace these highway names. There is not a person in history who is without fault. Other replacement names could be George Washington, but he was a slave owner, or Martin Luther King Jr., but he witnessed a rape and encouraged it. (per David Garrow, the Pulitzer Prizewinning biographer of MLK jr.) Does this take away from the great things Washington and King did? If knowing a historical figure performed actions that people today disapprove of, then where do you draw the line of who to commemorate? There is not a perfect candidate in history.

Thomas Jackson taught Sunday school classes to slaves in Lexington Virginia, even teaching many to read. He took a lot of flak for that act from those who looked down on African-Americans at the time. We celebrate others in history for that same act. Yet he also rebelled against the United States and its government founded on the Constitution. My point is, people do great and awful things in their lives. I believe it is worth remembering both aspects of people, and that's ok. If it is ok to commemorate historical figures with road names, and I believe it is, then you have to be able to accept that they weren't perfect by today's standards.

I believe the county government should focus on issues that impact daily lives in a direct matter, and not on hot topics which are emotional and do not produce any actual result that helps citizens.



Thank you for making Fairfax a better place. I suggest that **Elizabeth Van Lew** and **Mary Bowser** be considered for the highway renaming.

Elizabeth Van Lew lived in Richmond and was the daughter of a slave-owning family. When her father died, she freed her family's slaves and purchased and freed slave families that were in jeopardy of being split up. Significantly, she risked her life in the service of the Union war effort by providing Confederate troop information through a spy network. She also assisted Union prisoners in Libby Prison, providing food and clothing, and helping some escape.

Mary Bowser, who at an early age had been among the slaves freed by Van Lew, obtained employment in the household of Jefferson and Varuna Davis with Van Lew's assistance. As a household servant, and again at great personal risk, Bowser actively spied on Confederate war aims and passed the information through the lines to Union officers.

Both women were credited then, and now, with providing invaluable information that the Union military relied upon to put down the rebellion. 

Dear Sirs and Madams.

I ask you to oppose removing the names of former Confederates from any street in Fairfax County, especially those of Robert Lee and Thomas Jackson.

It is only fair to judge a person's actions and life in light of the cultural context and values of the time in which he lived and not by those of the present. Who knows what transgressions people living150 years from now might hold against those of us alive in 2021?

In 1861 the United States had been in existence only 72 years, and it was not at all unusual to know someone who had been born before there was a United States. For perhaps 98% of those living, the only regular contact they had with the federal government was through the Post Office. The vast majority had a closer connection -and stronger allegiance to- their state than the national government. For all practical purposes, their state was their country.

Such was the case with Lee and Jackson. When it came time to choose whom they would support in 1861, each of them believed there was but one honorable and proper choice – to side with Virginia should the federal government send armed military personnel into their state.

I like to think that if I were an adult Virginian in 1861 that I would have remained loyal to the federal government, but I cannot be sure that I would have. Even if, like Lee and Jackson, I opposed slavery.

Let us not forget that both of them had served the federal government honorably and proudly, even during battle. In the case of Lee, it was for decades and in what today, looking back, we would consider extreme hardship posts. [Try to imagine what it must have been like in the 1850s to travel to and live in a remote fort in Texas without wife or family.]

Many today castigate Lee because he believed Whites were superior to Blacks. But my guess is that so did at least 95% of the White population in the north. In fact, it is a near certainty that the same percentage of northern Whites would never have joined a war against the south if its primary purpose when it began had been to free the slaves.

It is well-established that when it came to slavery, the vast majority of northerners in 1861 wanted only to ensure that it did not spread beyond those states where it already existed. President Lincoln even went so far as to support a constitutional amendment to guarantee slavery where it existed in perpetuity – if the South would agree in return to abandon secession for all time.

We living today should remember that the people who had the strongest claim to hate southern soldiers and demand that they be severely punished were those in the north whose fathers, husbands, brothers, uncles or friends had fallen in battle. Not to mention the thousands more who suffered grievous life-long wounds.

And yet within a relatively short time after the end of the war, these northerners came to understand that those who fought for the Confederacy did so because they believed it the right and honorable thing to do, and respected Confederate soldiers and revered many Confederate generals, especially Lee and Jackson.

Are we today, over 150 years removed from the intense anger, bitterness and overwhelming pain and anguish endured by the northerners of that time, truly in a position to refuse to forgive and honor those who performed what they believed to be their sacred duty, even when that duty would perpetuate an inhumane institution?

A final point about Lee. At the time he surrendered his Army of Northern Virginia to Ulysses Grant in 1865, he refused the earnest entreaties of many of his subordinates to support a fight-to-the-death guerilla war against the Union. Had Lee agreed to their pleas, so high was he held in esteem throughout the Confederacy, that tens of thousands of well-trained, battle-hardened soldiers would have made the decades after 1865 a hell on earth for America.

Instead, Lee instructed his soldiers to surrender their arms, return to their homes, tend to their crops, and care for their families. Which is exactly what all of them did.

For this act alone, all Americans of today owe a debt of gratitude to Lee. At the very least, we should honor this debt by not changing the name of streets that hear his name.

I think all of us like to believe that, if we had to make a difficult and unpopular choice, we would without hesitation choose to do the right thing. This is the situation, Ladies and Gentlemen, that you now face. Which choice will you make?

Do the popular thing and you will be honored and praised by your families, friends, and fellow citizens of Fairfax County. Do the right thing, and you will be ridiculed, slandered, and called every obscene word you have ever heard, and some that you haven't.

I don't envy you.

Dear Task Force Members:

My roots are in Connecticut. After serving as a US Foreign Service Officer (RET), my family and I moved to Fairfax City, Virginia for the first time after living abroad for some 25 years. We were struck with the frequency of the name LEE marking streets, highways and other locations. We were surprised that our local high school recently had a mascot called "Rebel" and the high school was on "Rebel Run." A neighbor, originally from England, pointed out two cannon in front of the historic Fairfax Court House in 2019 and wryly remarked, "they are still pointed north." When I studied the Civil War in Connecticut, it seemed very long ago and decided. After moving to Northern Virginia, I realized that the Civil War was just yesterday for many long-time residents here.

I attended two or three of the discussions sponsored by Fairfax City and George Mason University and learned a great deal about the "lost cause", Virginia's new state constitution adopted in the early 1900s that was in effect until 1971, and southern heritage. After the killing of George Floyd and other innocent black people, the nation saw more dramatically how brutally many black people are treated by police. To my dismay as an American patriot, I see that black people have suffered injustice and continue to suffer it long after the Civil War, indeed, long after Martin Luther King was assassinated. I also see more clearly how twisted the story of the "lost cause" is. Just around the corner from where I live in Fairfax City, one man has a truck with a sticker on it featuring a Confederate flag and the words: "fighting terrorists since 1860."

Therefore, I am in support of removing Confederate officer names from all public roads, streets, public buildings (schools, libraries, hospitals, etc) and highways in Virgiinia. I am in favor of renaming Rt. 29 after John R. Lewis, a true patriot and civil rights leader. However, history should not be erased: that would be an all too Soviet approach. I think that drivers should clearly see in large letters John Lewis Highway. And on monuments at the start of 29 near DC and at the end, near a location significant to John Lewis or the Civil Rights movement should say something like: The People of Fairfax County (or State of Virginia) changed the name from Lee Hgwy to John Lewis Highway in 2021 to celebrate a leader of U.S. Civil Rights and to halt the exaltation of Confederate Officers who attempted to divide the United States in an attempt to preserve slavery. The People of the United States are committed to learning from our history and moving forward together to make our Union a more perfect one."

Regarding the decision to remove the two Confederate cannon facing north from the historic Fairfax Courthouse: fine. However, the small obelisk that stood between them did not glorify the southern rebellion but stated that the first (officer) casualty of the Civil Way fell a short distance from the monument. That is an important marker for historians and citizens who love history. That too was taken away, and I think that it was not wise to erase such a marker. I hope the County will return it, perhaps not to its place in front of a courthouse, but closer to the actual spot where Officer Marr was killed in Fairfax City, or to the small museum in Fairfax City. I think that John Moseby should be removed from streets and subdivisions and of course public schools, but signs that give information about his famous raid and that point to the spot where it occurred are again, matters of history and those markers in Fairfax City should remain to preserve history.

Dear Chair Spain,

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on proposals to change the names of Lee Highway and Lee-Jackson Memorial Highway in Fairfax. I recently relocated to Northern Virginia and appreciate the thoughtful efforts to evaluate our shared history in light of the future we want to build. I am writing to oppose renaming these highways.

Lee and Jackson under his command fought for the wrong side in the Civil War: Virginia's side. So our future should recognize Virginia's past, observing the Commonwealth's role in the most tumultuous time in American history. Robert Lee and Thomas Jackson were among the most influential leaders in our history and it is appropriate to observe that.

Lee recanted his loyalty oath to the Confederate States of America after the war and did swear allegiance to the United States. He was posthumously returned to citizenship, a reflection of the respect Virginians have felt for him for more than 160 years. Jackson died before he had a chance to reverse his rebellion, but there can be little doubt he would have joined Lee and the multitude of Army of Northern Virginia soldiers who returned to peaceful life after the war.

Some argue that these place names celebrate the legacy of slavery its defense at arms. Instead, place names observe the importance of history's pivotal characters and their messy, conflicted reality. We celebrate Werner von Braun's advances in rocketry for NASA, while recognizing his work on V1 rockets defended a ghastly regime. We celebrate General, then President, Eisenhower, whose order to kill certain German soldiers as they surrendered was very likely an unprosecuted war crime. We celebrate President Franklin Roosevelt, who ordered thousands of Americans of Asian descent into concentration camps during World War II.

Fairfax County is named for notorious slave trader Lord Fairfax. George Washington, for whom Washington DC and Washington state are named, was a slaver. Thomas Jefferson owned slaves but also founded the Library of Congress and the University of Virginia.

The list of Virginians who owned slaves or fought with the Confederates to preserve it is too long to recount. History is messy and we can absolutely observe that messy history without celebrating all the values of our past. We do not have to erase history to repudiate the worst of it.

What to do about Lee Highway and Lee-Jackson Highway then? We are not celebrating insurrection with those names – surely our area has the highest share of Federal workers in the country! We are not celebrating slavery with those names – slavery and racism are universally repugnant in the developed world. We are not celebrating the deaths of 700,000 Americans in a meat-grinder of a war These names observe pivotal characters in one of our nation's most dramatic and important crises. The names are a reminder that our Commonwealth was once on the losing side, the wrong side, of that war. That this important event happened and real people fought and died in it.

As a practical matter, I wonder how much the Fairfax task force's recommendation would have. Many in the region refer to these highways by their route numbers already. The roads themselves wind through the Commonwealth and other jurisdictions will have their own naming processes. New signage is expensive and there will be substantial costs to residents and the county for revisions.


Less expensive and more impactful would be contextual signage along these highways, explaining how messy history has been and reality still is.

With this in mind, I ask that the task force retain the current names for Lee Highway and Lee-Jackson Highway, but provide additional context and educational outreach around those names. History is messy and we would do well to understand that messiness to better understand our own time within the Commonwealth.

I DO NOT think these roads should be renamed for the following reasons:


- 1. Like it or not, the civil war was part of our history. Erasing these names is equal to erasing part of our history.



Why Little River Turnpike? Dear Sir or Madam,

I would like to offer the following comments for consideration by the Confederate Names Task Force as to whether or not the two subject sections of public roadway should be renamed.

As a resident of Fairfax County since 1975, I have regularly traveled the subject sections of both Route 29 and Route 50 in the course of my personal and professional travels. While I am in general agreement with the proposed action by the Fairfax County Government to rename these two public roadways, I would like to note several personal concerns regarding the manner in which this action would be taken

it is my personal opinion that any and all planning, design, construction, and administrative costs that may be associated with this action be incurred solely and completely by the Fairfax County Government, and not by any other legal entity of the Commonwealth of Virginia. In particular, I do not believe that any of the costs associated with this activity should be incurred by the Virginia Department of Transportation, an agency whose finances are already being stretched thin to appropriately accommodate the basic operations and maintenance costs related to one of the most complex networks of public highways in the state. The costs associated with this action for the replacement of all street name and directional / wayfinding signs along all local and collector streets, arterial highways, parkways and interstate highways that may be impacted by this action should be costs incurred only by Fairfax County.

It is also my opinion that any such costs should be generated by a dedicated local revenue stream established solely for this purpose rather than by an internal readjustment of funding already budgeted for use by the Fairfax County Department of Transportation on other transportation agency functions. Since any such revenue generation action would likely require a formal action to be taken by the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors, such an action should be fully publicized well before the action date, with appropriate public input solicited as to both the amount of funding which may ultimately be required and the manner in which any such new revenues are to be generated and applied to this purpose.

With respect to the actual renaming of these two sections of US Route 29 and US Route 50 in Fairfax County, I would strongly recommend that the proposed "new" names for these route sections be based solely on either the historical route names previously applied to these facilities or the destinations which are being linked by these public roadway sections. Based upon a personal initial review of the historical maps provided on the Fairfax County web site, it would appear that these basic concepts of destination identification and historical precedence were previously applied to the names of these roadways. The section of U.S. Route 29 in Fairfax County which is today named "Lee Highway" appears to have been known during the early to mid-1800s as the "Warrenton Turnpike". Similarly, the section of U.S. Route 50 in Fairfax County which is today named "Lee-Jackson Memorial Highway" appears to have been previously identified as the "Little River Turnpike." I would thus personally recommend that those historical route names be reapplied to the subject sections of these two highways in Fairfax County.


What I would most strongly not suggest is that any other personal name be either formally considered or recommended for application to either of these two routes. With the current names applied to Route 29 and Route 50 being deemed to be inappropriate at this time, there is no assurance that at some future date 50 or 100 years in the future, another group of Fairfax County residents might conclude that the new personal names applied to these public highways by the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors in the year 2021 are also inappropriate. Utilizing historical destination place names is viewed as a much more valid rationale for renaming the subject sections of these two public roads than the application of the name of any individual person, living or dead, who may be viewed of interest by a simple majority of the current Board of Supervisors.

Members of the Review Commission:

My name is Eli Lehrer. I have lived in Fairfax County for 14 years and, along with my wife, own a home in the Monroe Manor subdivision in the unincorporated portion of Herndon. We are residents of the Hunter Mill District.

I am a conservative and a member of the Republican Party: I currently run a right-of-center think tank called the R Street Institute and previously worked as speechwriter the Republican Majority Leader of the United States Senate, as a fellow of the Heritage Foundation and as a senior editor of the magazine of the American Enterprise Institute. I write to you, however, as a concerned citizen and not as a representative of any of these organizations or any party. My message is simple: both Lee Highway and Lee-Jackson Memorial Highway should be renamed. Neither Robert E. Lee nor Thomas "Stonewall" Jackson are admirable figures who ought to be honored by having roads named after them. The county should pick better and more worthy names.

The reason I believe you should oppose having Lee and Jackson's names on major public thoroughfares is simple: both were traitors who attacked the United States in order to preserve slavery. The South fired the first shots of the Civil War. That war left at least 650,000 Americans dead. Both Lee and Jackson graduated from the United States Military Academy at West Point, served ably in the army of the United States and then took up arms against a country they had been commissioned to protect. If organizing an army to slaughter the army of a country one once swore an oath to does not meet the definition of treason, what does?

And despite talk of "history" and "heritage" it is true beyond any doubt that the Confederacy existed to preserve slavery. Of those confederate states that gave a rationale for leaving the union in rejection of a democratic election, all cited their desire to keep slavery intact in their ordinances of sucsession. They all also agreed to a constitution proclaiming that "the institution of negro slavery, as it now exists in the Confederate States, shall be recognized and protected" and further stipulating that no law "impairing the right of property in negro slaves" could ever be enacted. If that isn't enough, the Confederacy's Vice President Alexander Stephens made the Confederacy's reason for being even more clear "Its cornerstone rests," he said. "Upon the great truth that the negro is not equal to the white man; that slavery subordination to the superior race is his natural and normal condition." Both Lee and Jackson were intelligent men fully aware of the purposes of succession as was everyone around them. They committed treason in order to preserve slavery. Honoring them honors traitors and enslavers,

The issue here is not a matter of erasing history. Both men displayed genuine skills on the battlefield and physical bravery. Lee expressed doubts about slavery before the Civil War and worked for recconcilation between North and South after the war ended. Jackson was a man of deep religious faith who, against the laws of the time, helped teach the African-Americans he enslaved how to read. These are meritorious things but they do not outweigh the serious crimes that both men committed. Preserving battlefields, historic homes and other sites associated with both men is both appropriate. But honoring them is not. And road names are a form of honor.

You will doubtless get many suggestions of worthy individuals after whom to name the roads. I will make but one. An individual well deserving of commemoration in the County but not currently having it is Col. Charles Henry Tompkins. Tompkins was the man who killed confederate terrorist and enslaver John Quincy Marr. Tompkins' action in defeating Marr's terrorist band during a raid on Fairfax County Courthouse in the early days of the war was the earliest action of the Civil War for which a Medal of Honor was awarded. Tompkins' heroism ranks along with the battle of Chantilly/Ox Hill as the most important parts of the Civil War to take place in Fairfax County.

The County, until quite recently, maintained a monument honoring Marr. This monument was deeply offensive to the values of modern Fairfax County and the supervisors were right to remove it. Renaming a major road after Tompkins would rectify this wrong and make it clear that the county understands its history, the terrible crime of slavery and the great moral crusade the Union embarked on to abolish it.

The Civil War should not be forgotten but the war's villains are not deserving of any public honor. You should work to find more worthy men and women to honor.







I also can't see it as troubling to a lot of the people that move into the area from around the U.S. or have just emigrated from other parts of the world care about this as a primary concern.

- 1. If you really want people to feel physically safe with respect to transportation, establish pedestrian flash signals on roads like Blake Lane in Vienna-Oakton. I can tell you from personal experience that drivers rarely pay attention to the non-signalized crosswalks, and on a divided 4-lane road, it is a significant risk.
- 2. Continue sidewalks so that they don't stop and start making individuals walk along roadways.
- 3. Improve lighting in problem areas.



Dear members of the Committee,

I have been giving much thought to the issue of honoring Confederate leaders through the names of parks, roads, schools and the like, as well as by monuments. I would like to share a few ideas for your discussions.

- 1. Honoring the soldiers who fought is a distinct issue from honoring the political and military leaders of the Confederacy. I am not addressing the statue of a generic soldier that appears in many towns.
- 2. What our predecessors chose to honor does warrant some deference in the decision-making process. But we should not be bound by their choices, if they do not reflect current community values.
- 3. What we choose to honor today should reflect our current values and our current knowledge of history. We now understand that
 - a. The Lost Cause was a myth, perpetrated in the late 19th and early 20th centuries not merely to honor the past, but to reinforce white supremacy during the period of Jim Crow segregation.
 - b. The Confederate leaders being honored in particular, Lee and Jackson chose to "levy arms against the United States." Article III, Section 3, Clause 1 defines such actions as "treason."
 - i. The fact that Robert E. Lee was not tried for treason has to do with his oath on parole at Appomattox and his oath of amnesty in October 1861. The absence of a trial is not evidence that he did not commit treason.
 - ii. Thomas Jackson died in 1863, and thus could not be tried for treason.
 - c. Both Lee and Jackson were enslavers. There is no persuasive evidence that either attempted to manumit their slaves, as might be done by someone who opposed slavery.
- 4. Our contemporary society does not honor treason or slavery.
- 5. Honoring Lee and Jackson by continuing to name highways after them is inconsistent with our community's values. It should end.

Thank you for your service on the committee with this difficult mandate.



I just filled out your online survey, and I would like to add a couple of thoughts. I expect that you are going to go ahead and change the highways' names, but I would like to suggest that it is a feckless exercise. You probably believe that the presence of Confederate names on public buildings, highways, statues, etc. oppresses black people, and removing them would remove the burden of America's racist past. I believe there are two reasons why it will have little or no impact on that problem.

- --One is that Americans don't learn history in the first place. There are probably lots of people who never knew how Lee Highway got its name until they heard that the name might be changed. If it is changed, we will lose an opportunity to teach future generations positive lessons about their history. If anyone were to ask how Lee Highway got its name, they should be told that General Lee fought for slavery -- but guess what, he lost, and slavery was eliminated. That is a positive lesson, in contrast to the popular assumption -- which partly underlies the drive to remove statues, change street names, etc. that American society is forever, irredeemably, racist.





He gained renown as the Rock of Chickamauga because in northern Georgia he prevented a rout of the Army of the Cumberland, and as the Sledge of Nashville because in central Tennessee he devastated the Army of Tennessee. The sort of stroke George Pickett's *outside agitators* attempted at Gettysburg, Thomas's forces accomplished—up rather ornerier terrain, to rather fainter acclaim—at Missionary Ridge ("On, Wisconsin!").

With these brilliant feats of defense and offense, and with further estimable victories at Stones River and Peachtree Creek, at Mill Springs and Murfreesboro, Thomas sped redemption of Atlanta and the Atlantic coast by William Tecumseh Sherman. Along these *strong encounters* he helped to keep the United States united and so to preserve what one memorial, not from around here, in its innocence identifies as "constitutional government and human liberty."

By his firm behavior throughout the War, Thomas placed himself among the ranks of the bravest and cleverest commanders from either side: Ulysses Grant, Phil Sheridan, and Sherman; James Longstreet, Pat Cleburne, and Joe Johnston. By it, he proved himself to be what Sherman assayed him to be: "as true as steel."

Patriot Fanciers of James ("beautiful plumage!") Stuart, John (ditto) Mosby, George Pickett, Richard Ewell, Thomas Jackson, Robert Lee, and the other Virginians that chose wrong insist that supporting secession was the sole possible choice (no choice) and therefore they ignore Thomas as chimerical. Reactionary political correctness—not all political correctness enters from the righteous left—insists that supporting secession was the sole proper choice and therefore it condemns him as contumacious. [mingle] with those of Caesar, in the field of Mars, and among the antient monuments of Roman virtue" [Gibbon, Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire, Chapter XXIV] ... each cracker and each grandee "with a glory in his bosom that transfigures" each, plus us. And so, yes, by prodigious deeds through arduous campaigns Thomas did more than 'most anybody else to ensure that the Lost Cause lost. What apologists for that Cause really cannot abide, however, quite aside from his rivin' their idols up an' drivin' Ol' Dixie down, is, again, that Thomas chose right.

Boy and Mensch When Nat Turner's Insurrection detonated close to home, Thomas was 15. He led his family to safety. How? Someone must have pulled his coat. Why? While evidence is meager, he seems to have treated his black playmates with uncommon decency and, in that artless way, to have ingratiated himself with them. An engineer in spirit before he even reached West Point, he liked pulling things apart to see how they work. A phlegmatic fellow, he druther see how things work than seize petty prerogatives based on spurious racial superiority. A magnanimous man, he spurned mean advantage or, in Hobbesian terms, displayed contempt for "little helps" [Leviathan, The First Part, Of Man, Chapter 6]. Can you imagine?

This much does appear clear: If any people in *antebellum* America could have rationally feared the fair and balanced redress black folks might exact once they struck their shackles off, those people were the ones Nat Turner had just missed massacring. Thomas still chose right.

George Henry Thomas quelled Rebellion from the Big Muddy to the Great Smokies, from the Logs to the bogs. *His* was the "duty faithfully performed"; *his* is the "heritage" worth driving home. He was the noblest Virginian of his day; he'll make a noble namesake for our stretch of Route 29 or Route 50. Sherman predicted that the South would come to appreciate him (Thomas, not his own satanic self). Please demonstrate that, after dishonorable delay, at least the State of his nativity at last has come to do just that. *Pace* Jim Webb, "it's [not] complicated."

Dear Sir/Madam:

Most of us have long moved on from the Civil War. But since some want to revisit (and in the spirit of the "Forget Hell" Southerners of my youth, refight) the Civil War, Abraham Lincoln provides wise counsel on how to answer the question presented.

Lincoln firmly rejected the desire, held by many in the soon-to-be victorious Union, to impose a Carthaginian Peace upon the defeated people of the Confederacy. His Second Inaugural Address concluded with this vision for a post-war America: "With malice toward none; with charity for all; with firmness in the right, as God gives us to see the right, let us strive on to finish the work we are in; to bind up the nation's wounds; to care for him who shall have borne the battle, and for his widow and his orphan -- to do all which may achieve and cherish a just and lasting peace among ourselves and with all nations."

Lincoln also referred to the American people as an "almost chosen people." While Americans were chosen to do just and great things, we were also inherently flawed. Because we are all sinners, we should practice the virtues of humility, charity, tolerance (in the true sense of "bearing with"), and forgiveness.

Stripping the Lee name from public places repugnantly repudiates Lincoln's wisdom. It reeks of malice, provides no charity, and seeks to rip apart this nation's scars with a fervor that precludes any just and lasting peace among ourselves. If I can respect the Civil Rights leader John Lewis, whose courage I admire, but, as I can testify from personal experience, became a bitter and hateful old man, Fairfax County can reciprocate with grudging tolerance of Lee. Both were heroic. Both were flawed.

Like his father Henry "Light-Horse" Lee, Robert E. Lee demonstrated extraordinary courage and leadership as a United States Army officer. After his father was beaten and rendered a semi-invalid in 1812 while defending a Baltimore newspaper editor from a political mob, Lee knew how American politics can easily explode into violence. Accordingly, Lee possessed an even temperament – the opposite of those who dominated antebellum debate and, quite frankly, welcomed bloodshed.

Before Virginia seceded in 1862, Lee was offered field command of the Union Army but declined stating that "though opposed to secession, and deprecating war, I could take no part in an invasion of the Southern states." That decision will always be properly debated. For those

claiming an unforgivable sin was committed, they should examine the Hartford Convention of 1814-1815 or recent local declarations of "sanctuary" places that illustrate the perpetual American conflict between local and national allegiances.

Lee should be honored for how he surrendered the Army of Northern Virginia at Appomattox Court House. In the Civil War's closing days, Jefferson Davis urged continued resistance through endless irregular warfare like that exhibited in Bleeding Kansas and by Missouri bushwhackers. Lee refused. He acknowledged defeat, desired peace, and surrendered his forces instead of turning them loose on the countryside. Grant reciprocated by offering generous terms – upon pledging to never take up arms against Union forces, defeated Confederates were paroled (instead of taken as prisoners of war), granted free passage to their homes, and treated with respect and honor by the victorious.

After surrendering his forces, Lee returned to his men. An eyewitness reported: "General Lee stopped his horse, and, after gaining silence, made the only speech to his men that he ever made. He was very brief, and gave no excuses or apologies for his surrender, but said he had done all in his power for his men, and urged them to go as quickly and quietly to their homes as possible, to resume peaceful avocations, and to be as good citizens as they had been soldiers and this advice marked the course which he himself pursued so faithfully to the end."

Because Lee commanded greater moral authority than Jefferson Davis, his leadership was followed by other Confederate commanders in surrendering their forces. Instead of irregular warfare, peace came.

In his classic 1901 essay "Lee at Appomattox," the historian Charles Frances Adams – a Massachusetts abolitionist who fought Lee at Antietam and Gettysburg – described how at Appomattox Courthouse two warriors, Grant and Lee, were magnanimous in victory and gracious in defeat. In the wake of a war that brought much death, suffering, destruction, and white-hot hate, both strived to bring about peace and begin rebuilding America. For this Homeric episode in modern warfare, not only should Lee's and Grant's names be placed on public places but both men's actions should also be studied and emulated by leaders in today's bitterly divided America.

Lincoln's assassination crippled the vision described in his Second Inaugural Speech. After Appomattox, Lee pledged: "to make any sacrifice or perform any honorable act that would lead to the restoration of peace." In October 1865 and at the urging of Grant, Lee signed an oath of allegiance to the United States. In return, the vengeful Radical Republicans and fellow waivers of the "Bloody Shirt" – freed by Lincoln's assassination — indicted Lee for treason. Grant was so outraged by this violation of the spirit of Appomattox that he threated to resign as the Union Army Commander-in-Chief if Lee was arrested. The indictment was eventually pocketed. Because Grant came to the defense of Lee, does that make him unwelcome in Fairfax County? Should we convene a task force to detect and scrub out all public references to Grant?

To see Lincoln's principles lived out today, leave Fairfax County and travel on December 4 to the Antietam Civil War Battlefield. On that evening, the annual Memorial Illumination will be held with 23,000 luminaries – one for each casualty in that horrific battle – placed throughout the darkened battlefield. The sheer size and density of the lights bears witness to the immense suffering that occurred there. Of those 23,000 lights, 10,316 represent Confederate casualties. No one suggests darkening those lights. Rather, charity and peace are demonstrated by honoring their suffering.

After his 1864 reelection, Lincoln urged: "Let us therefore study the incidents of this [e.g. the Civil War], as philosophy to learn wisdom from, and none of them as wrongs to avenge." This task force would do well to follow this advice. Lee's life is not a wrong to avenge.

But I fear that this task force will follow a tiny but vocal minority's hot rhetoric and ill-tempered desire for vengeance by scrubbing names from our past. In doing so, this task force will reject Lincoln's wisdom and temperament and Grant's and Lee's leadership at Appomattox. Rather, you will emulate the South Carolina Fire-Eaters and John Brown abolitionists whose rhetoric and hatred plunged this country into a horrific Civil War.





I write to you today in strong opposition to the effort to remove the names of Generals Lee and Jackson from our collective memory by renaming the highways that honor them in Fairfax County. This effort is just another example of "cancel culture" seeking to deny any praise or benefit to major figures of history who do not align to politically correct standards as dictated by an increasingly demanding and intolerant segment of our society.

I am a resident of Fairfax County, a graduate of the U.S. Military Academy at West Point with 27 years of active-duty service in the U.S. Army, a combat veteran of Desert Storm, Afghanistan and Iraq, and a retired Army Colonel. I have been a resident of Virginia for nearly 20 years.

The current effort to portray Americans like Robert E. Lee and Stonewall Jackson as irredeemable, two-dimensional figures, whose only real distinction is that they were associated with and fought for the cause of slavery, is totally ahistorical and transparently political. This effort is something one would much more readily associate with a totalitarian society like Jacobin France, the Soviet Union, or Communist China rather than a free republic like the United States. Moreover, the effort to deny Lee and Jackson their well-deserved places of honor in our history stems from a misbegotten desire to appease the loudest and ill-informed voices by reinterpreting these men and their lives according to today's standards, rather than those of the times in which they lived. Were such a standard to be applied to all the major figures of our history from the 18th, 19th or even the 20th century, we might very well have very few great figures left to honor. Of course, for those of a more extreme view that is precisely the intent. But for others, who are more reasonable, and whose minds are open to understanding and appreciating our country's history in its proper context, I submit the following concerning Generals Lee and Jackson:

Born to Revolutionary War hero and signer of the Declaration of Independence Henry "Light-Horse Harry" Lee in Stratford Hall, Robert E. Lee graduated ranked second in the West Point class of 1829. He married a granddaughter of George Washington and served for 17 years as an officer in the Corps of Engineers, supervising construction of the nation's coastal defenses. He was the senior engineer who built Fort Pulaski in Savannah, Georgia. He also supervised construction of Fort Monroe, built to defend Hampton Roads against British attack, and prevent a recurrence of the calamity of 1814 when British forces attacked and burned Washington, DC. Lee directed the engineering work that created the first harbor on the Mississippi at St. Louis, Missouri. He surveyed lands and updated numerous maps in Florida. In addition, he supervised construction of the extended break wall at Long Beach, California, which allowed that town to become later the largest seaport on the West Coast of the United States. As a member of General Winfield Scott's staff in the Mexican War, Lee distinguished himself above others, earning three brevet promotions for gallantry. His carefully devised plans enabled the successful storming of the Chapultepec in 1847, which produced a quick victory in what otherwise could have been a long and disastrous conflict. The success of American forces in this war allowed our country to expand dramatically and add the present-day states of Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, Colorado, Utah, Nevada, and California to the Union.

From 1852 to 1855, Lee served as superintendent of West Point and was responsible for educating many of the men who would later serve under him - not to mention many of those who would oppose him - on the battlefields of the Civil War. Given his reputation as one of the finest officers in the U.S. Army, Abraham Lincoln offered Lee the command of all Federal forces in April of 1861. Lee declined and resigned his commission honorably, stating that he could not fight against his fellow Virginians. Throughout the war that followed, Lee commanded the most famous and most successful of all the Confederate armies. In battle after battle, Lee led troops who fought outnumbered, yet repeatedly outmaneuvered their blue-clad adversaries and humiliated their generals, no matter the odds. After the war, Lee returned home peacefully, where he once again proved his loyalty to the United States, eventually becoming president of Washington College. He remained in that position until his death on October 12, 1870 in Lexington, Virginia.

With respect to the question of slavery, it is important to point out that Lee's views on the matter were entirely unremarkable in his day and age. They were, in fact, in keeping with the prevailing views of other moderate slaveholders, not to mention a substantial number of prominent Northerners, many of whose names today adorn highways, schools, and monuments all across America. In addition, Lee clearly recognized slavery as a moral evil, even though it was completely legal. At various times, he helped assist individual slaves to freedom in Liberia, and he provided for the emancipation of his own slaves in his will, in keeping with his sincere desire to see slavery eventually abolished, albeit peaceably.

There are those today who claim Lee was a traitor because he fought against the United States. However, such a claim ignores the fact that shortly after the Civil War, President Andrew Johnson granted Lee a full pardon for all his actions during the conflict. In fact, at various times during the 20th Century, Lee was celebrated on U.S. stamps, and his face appeared on several commemorative coins specifically authorized by the U.S. Congress. These are not the sort of tributes that are given to a traitor. Moreover, Lee's citizenship was fully restored by an act of Congress. These actions, much like the pardon President Carter later granted to over 200,000 Vietnam War draft dodgers, meant the offenses in question were as if they had never occurred. The question bears asking: Does anyone today regard the Vietnam draft dodgers as traitors to their country who deserve to be excluded from all public honor and a good reputation? Before signing the resolution officially restoring Lee's citizenship at Arlington House in 1975, President Ford stated as follows:

"As a soldier, General Lee left his mark on military strategy. As a man, he stood as a symbol of valor and of duty. As an educator, he appealed to reason and learning to achieve understanding and build a stronger nation. The course he chose after the war became a symbol to all those who had marched with him in the bitter years towards Appomattox. General Lee's character has been an example to succeeding generations, making the restoration of his citizenship an event in which every American can take pride. In approving this Joint Resolution, Congress has removed the legal obstacle to citizenship which resulted from General Lee's Civil War service. Although more than a century late, I am delighted to sign this resolution and to complete the full restoration of General Lee's citizenship."

Finally, it is very instructive, and perhaps eye-opening, to consider the opinion of one of our greatest presidents concerning Lee. There is no disputing that Dwight D. Eisenhower - raised in Kansas, a graduate of West Point, Supreme Allied Commander in World War II, a five-star general, and President of the United States - admired Robert E. Lee for his character without considering him a traitor to the uniform or to the country. In fact, throughout his eight years in the White House, Eisenhower proudly hung a portrait of Robert E. Lee in the Oval Office. Queried about this once in a letter from a New York dentist named Leon Scott, Eisenhower wrote the following reply, which I urge every member of the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors to read and consider seriously:

August 9, 1960

Dear Dr. Scott:

Respecting your August 1 inquiry calling attention to my often expressed admiration for General Robert E. Lee, I would say, first, that we need to understand that at the time of the War between the States the issue of secession had remained unresolved for more than 70 years. Men of probity, character, public standing, and unquestioned loyalty, both North and South, had disagreed over this issue as a matter of principle from the day our Constitution was adopted.

General Robert E. Lee was, in my estimation, one of the supremely gifted men produced by our Nation. He believed unswervingly in the Constitutional validity of his cause, which until 1865 was still an arguable question in America. He was a poised and inspiring leader, true to the high trust reposed in him by millions of his fellow citizens. He was thoughtful yet demanding of his officers and men, forbearing with captured enemies but ingenious, unrelenting, and personally courageous in battle, and never disheartened by a reverse or obstacle. Through all his many trials, he remained selfless almost to a fault and unfailing in his faith in God. Taken altogether, he was noble as a leader and as a man, and unsullied as I read the pages of our history.

From deep conviction, I simply say this: a nation of men of Lee's calibre would be unconquerable in spirit and soul. Indeed, to the degree that present-day American youth will strive to emulate his rare qualities, including his devotion to this land as revealed in his painstaking efforts to help heal the Nation's wounds once the bitter struggle was over, we, in our own time of danger in a divided world, will be strengthened and our love of freedom sustained.

Such are the reasons that I proudly display the picture of this great American on my office wall.

With respect to General Stonewall Jackson, many of the same considerations apply, some even more so. Born and raised in a devout Presbyterian family in rural western Virginia, he was largely self-educated as a boy. He worked at a grist mill and on a farm, and as a young man he secretly taught slaves to read, in violation of the law at the time. Jackson cultivated manners are personal virtues that set him apart from others, many of which, sadly, go unappreciated today. He never drank, detested foul language, and never worked on Sundays out of respect for the sabbath. He earned his own way into West Point in 1842 and, after four years of intense and determined effort, graduated near the top of his class in 1846. Like Lee, he served gallantly durin the Mexican War in command of artillery forces and earned two brevet promotions. Following the war, he served for ten years as a professor at the Virginia Military Institute in Lexington. Durir this time, Jackson and his wife Mary Anna organized and operated a Sunday school for local black children, again in violation of the law.

When war broke out, Jackson - like so many others - chose to fight for his native Virginia. And in the short span of two years that followed, he gained a reputation as the most daring and successful general on either side of the war. He earned his nickname for his stalwart defense near Manassas, but it was his ability to maneuver his soldiers and strike rapidly against his opponents that remains unequalled in American history. During his 1862 campaign in the Shenandoah Valley, Jackson's army marched on foot over 600 miles in less than 50 days, winning five significant victories with Just 17,000 troops against a combined force of more than 60,000. In so doing, he won the respect and admiration of even the best Union generals. At Harpers Ferry, Jackson maneuvered his troops so quickly around the defending garrison that the entire force of 14,000 men was forced to surrender without a fight. Later, at Chancellorsville, he repeated the feat on an even larger scale, attacking outnumbered nearly three to one, in a surprise turning movement that forced the entire Union Army to withdraw north of the Rappahannock. During this battle, Jackson was mortally wounded and died a few days later.

As a cadet at West Point 35 years ago, I studied in detail the tactics and battlefield exploits of Jackson during the Civil War. As a professional solider, I came over many year to understand and appreciate how Jackson's military achievements have been the standard against with so many later military commanders have compared themselves. Among the great American generals who sincerely admired Jackson and sought to achieve a comparable level of battlefield success were Douglas MacArthur, George Patton, Dwight Eisenhower, Maxwell Taylor, Lewis "Chesty" Puller, and Norman Schwarzkopf. Today, Jackson cannot speak for himself, and it seems that relatively few dare to defend his name and reputation for fear of being "cancelled" by an intolerant and increasingly politicized popular culture. Nevertheless, the fact remains that the greatest American generals of the 20th century all acknowledged Stonewall Jackson as probably the most capable and formidable tactical battlefield commander in American history. Like Lee, Jackson has been rightly honored on U.S. stamps and on commemorative coins issued by the U.S. government. And like Lee, Jackson is deserving of the respect and honor we can pay to him today.

In conclusion, I urge you in the strongest of terms to retain the names of Generals Lee and Jackson on the two highways in Fairfax County that honor them. Viewed against the long backdrop of history, and judged by the standards of the times in which they lived, both men lived honorably, fought bravely, and were exemplary gentlemen and military commanders. A multitude of American generals, presidents, and the U.S. Congress have all agreed on this question, the painful question of slavery notwithstanding. If the facts of history that support these men's place of honor in our culture go unappreciated or are lost on many who currently reside in Fairfax County, the fault lies not with Lee or Jackson, but rather with our schools, our scholarship, and ourselves. Fortunately, with proper education, we can reclaim this part of our heritage before it is lost to future generations. This Veterans Day, I ask you to commit yourselves to righting this wrong and to restoring a proper appreciation for these great Americans. As President Eisenhower rightly observed, to the degree that present-day American youth will strive to emulate the rare qualities of men like Lee and Jackson, we, in our own time and in a divided world, will be strengthened and our love of freedom sustained.

Dear Sirs:

I have been a resident of northern VA since 1956 having graduated from Washington-Lee High School (as it was then named) in 1958 - going into the Army and returning to purchase my current house in Burke in 1977. As a twice wounded former professional soldier (RVN), I am keenly aware of the purpose and value of historical examples and lineage. And, as a trained professional, I am also keenly aware of the episodic misuse of historical examples and totems. Further, as a reasonably well read adult, I am not unmindful of the tendency for some activists to try and "stuff unpleasant memories of the past" down some Orwellian "memory hole" and thereby create a vacancy for a renaming opportunity to honor some "current worthy" personality, event, or whatever.

I am submitting these comments on Veteran's Day and so I will draw on my personal experiences to explain my thoughts on this renaming initiative.

My concern about the initiative is that I find it it emblematic of the impermanence of political fashion. What is hot today is almost abhorred a season later; sometimes even sooner; sometimes longer.

In my case, the impermanence reminds me that when I went to Vietnam in January 1966, as I traveled from my assignment in West Germany - I was amazed, I couldn't buy a drink anywhere - fellow citizens offered and did so at every opportunity. I served 2 tours back to back. When I flew home in August 1967 (in uniform), I was a pariah. People didn't want to sit next to me, converse with me, and certainly not buy me a drink. And a year later, when I went to Harvard University to complete my Master's in preparation for teaching at West Point - I was assaulted, spit on, my mail vandalized, and rocks thrown through my apartment windows - because I was a soldier who had done my duty and served in Vietnam. And these deeds were done not by some ruffians - these were fellow students. Virtue signaling is not some new activity in our country.

So my point is - beware of fashion - because it will change. And frequently very quickly.

So why do we "name things" - especially public structures or artifacts. Seems to me that your group ought to focus on that. And, once you settle on that - apply that standard.

From my perspective - I've already "given at the office to this current renaming fashion." As I noted, I'm a 1958 graduate of W&L. I didn't care for process Arlington County followed in their renaming "process" of W&L - because it wasn't a process, it was a foregone conclusion/outcome. And to reflect my displeasure with the outcome chosen - where as in earlier years I had contributed several thousand dollars to the W&L Scholarship Fund - I have stopped giving - because W&L has ceased to exist. I certainly hope that the parties that pushed the outcome that obtained have assumed the financial support I formerly provided. But I doubt it. And so, worthy, needing students will suffer because of political ambition and fashion.

I raise the example of W&L because it seems to me that the initiative your group is working on springs from the same point of departure. Generals Lee and Jackson were both flawed human beings. Conjure up your list of human failures and flaws - Confederates (insurrectionists), slave owners, and I'm sure there are other imperfections - some large and some smaller. But in creating this list of objections, it seems to me that we should not be unmindful of their many positive virtues and attributes - and it seems to me that those positive features should be the focus to help guide other people in their personal example and development.

To me - it is incredibly dumb to only focus on their flaws - because any other human being that will receive the renaming honor will also have flaws. And so in the renaming event all that is being broadcast to the polity is that fashion has changed - and on some future day this honoree will also be recycled.

Is that the real message we want to send to our citizens? I think not. It's hardly inspirational.

I am opposed to your task. And I favor making no change. But I also question placing a person's name on a highway. Use a destination such as Richmond Highway or Middleburg Pike.

To whom it may concern,

I am writing to express my concern with renaming roads in Fairfax County to remove references to their origins. History, by its very nature, is messy. It is filled with imperfect people, rife with conflict, and evokes mixed emotions -- as it should.

As a minority, I assume that I am part of the demographic you have in mind when you think of those whom you may be "helping" with the proposed name changes. To me, this is patronizing and distracts from the real problems facing our county. I do not wish to see our county's budget being wasted on street sign changes to supposedly coddle my feelings, when the things minorities like myself do care about are being ignored. The biggest issues facing Fairfax County include wasting too much taxpayer money, declining quality of education, increasing property taxes driving out lower incomes and raising rents, and traffic problems. Please tell me, how do new signs and street names help me in any practical way?

Frankly, the only real effect these name changes will have are negative. (1) More traffic as crews have to be in each intersection to replace the street signs. (2) More harm to our environment because the signs are made of steel; production of steel accounts for approximately 8% of greenhouse gas emissions. (3) More cost to taxpayers to remove and replace signs. (4) More confusion in navigating around the county because people will inevitably use different names, apps may not be updated right away, etc. Maybe it will be minor, like my Uber Eats order is delayed. Or, maybe it will affect emergency responders because people won't all be familiar with the new street names when they have to describe their location. Before you think that's far-fetched, please understand that my elderly neighbors still can't remember what the new number that replaced 7100 (Fairfax County Parkway) is, and that was changed how many years ago?

I am not offended by the names Lee Highway or Lee Jackson Memorial Highway in the slightest. In fact, I have discussions with my children about these characters and how complex they are in our history. To simply label them "good" or "bad" does history a disservice. Robert E. Lee fought for the Confederacy, but after the Civil War concluded, was instrumental in reuniting the country that was once divided. Able to put their differences behind them, President Ulysses Grant and Lee met in the White House in 1869. What an example of forgiveness and unity! Stonewall Jackson, in spite of his difficult upbringing as an orphan being sent to live with other relatives, his lack of formal education, and his disability, went on to become a military genius. He was another imperfect character. He owned slaves, and it was only as recently as 2018 that new research enabled us to learn more about them. On the other hand, he also defied laws prohibiting Black people from receiving an education by offering free education to enslaved Black people. Regardless of how we view his support of the Confederacy and the abhorrent ownership of slaves, he is a fascinating historical character.

The county continues to grow, and as we consider names for new roads, we might consider other historical characters -- even controversial ones -- that prompt discussions like this about our history. But let's not allow these old names to become a distraction from the real issues plaguing the county, and let's not patronize our diverse population by thinking all is well if we just erase the bad parts of history. I would like to think that we are both smarter and stronger than that. The bad parts are inextricably woven into the good parts of history. Our history will never be erased, and it is time to move forward in unity -- much like Lee chose to do.

What is the criteria for naming a street or school? This is the parent question to whether or not Lee Highway and Lee-Jackson Highway should be renamed?

Since I did not receive any postcard announcing the opportunity to participate in the survey nor was there any kind of referendum concerning any proposed change, I really question the validity of any recommendation provided by the task force. That being said, I think it is important that we learn from history and not try to re-write or obliterate it by removing names simply because of political agendas. To Whom it my concern: I am appalled that this activity is even being considered by Fairfax County. You cannot, and must not, change the name of the Lee-Jackson Memorial Hwy. Generals Lee and Jackson are part of the American history story. The Civil War, which, if you all actually studied it, was fought not primarily because of slavery, but for economic reasons. Slavery was a terrible thing, and no one would ever say differently. But know there were many Caucasians here in America who were, in effect, "slaves" as well. And Europe was awash in slavery. In fact, the percentage of slavery overall in the United States was less than 4% - and some of that percentage were blacks enslaving blacks. Federalism vs the US as a Republic with states having their Constitutional rights was the primary issue.

Did you know that under the Constitution, and with the governing of the country, e.g. the states, as a Republic, succession was legal? It wasn't until the Civil War that that the "American United States" became the "United States of America" making succession illegal. Again, and in fact, General Lee was initially in charge of US military. He was a Republican - as was Lincoln, but Lincoln was a federalist as well. He did not want slavery, but he loved his state – the Commonwealth of VA (not STATE of VA), and chose to leave the union to support what he believed was written by our forefathers in the Constitution. At that time, succession was legal. And Jackson, much the same, with the commitment but without the ardor or the fame (I guess you now call it "notoriety") of Lee.

I am a Virginian born and bred. My family has contributed to the growth and prosperity of the Commonwealth of Virginia for generations. I love this country, I love Virginia. Attempts to erase even a portion of its history greatly distresses me. I leave you with GOD BLESS AMERICA.

Dear Task Force Member,

I understand the desire of some people to change the names of these roads, but I think that it is important to remember the importance of historical figures, not necessarily agreeing with all of their actions. Lee Highway has been called that for many decades, and many people use that name in planning their travels. The name itself does not mention Robert E. Lee, but only the last name of an important family that settled our area more than a hundred years before the Civil War. The Lees were patriots during the Revolutionary War and signers of our founding documents. Keep the name and commemorate the Lee family, if not it's most famous member.

As for Robert E. Lee, I fear that many of the proponents of erasing his name have never read a serious historical biography about the man. He chose state over nation, as did many during that conflict, but he did not do it to preserve slavery. He was by all accounts a humble and virtuous man, respected by both Virginians and the Union generals who defeated him. He lived out his life simply and honestly, serving as president of Washington College (later renamed Washington and Lee University) during the tenuous years after the Civil War. Most importantly, he urged his former comrades-in-arms to become loyal citizens of the Union, and he demonstrated that commitment by his own example. In sum, he ended well.

No historical figure was perfect, but let's not judge our ancestors too harshly, lest we hold them to a higher standard than we hold ourselves. If we were to remove every name of an imperfect person from the public sphere, we would have to remove references to John F. Kennedy, Martin Luther King, and many others. I say leave them all on the signs as reminders of the good we should emulate and the errors we should avoid. Thank you for listening.







studied were unsafe - one street was determined to be within acceptable safety parameters and no calming changes were made. This illustrates that, in a proposed street name change, the Task Force could use the RTAP method to take the issue to the Virginians who are most affected by the proposed change - the Task Force can know if changes promoted by a partisan group do or do not have the support of the community at large.

The RTAP has a formula for determining the area of residents and businesses likely to be most affected by the street change, and directs how to poll these residents and business owners to determine support for a future study and potential street change. I believe the RTAP process to consider making physical changes to a street - i.e., adding street bumps, signage, etc - can be adapted for the consideration of making a name change to a street.

A name change decision should not begin with the opinion of a group, nor should it begin with my opinion or the opinion of a Task Force. Any decision by this Task Force to rename roadways should be predicated by the level of support there may be among those Virginians who are most immediately, and permanently, affected by a name change for these sections of highway - those residents and businesses who are located on the subject highways.

If the County will follow RTAP methodology for a changing a street's name as it follows for permanently changing a street with traffic control measures, then the Task Force can be assured that it is not simply imposing the opinions of its members. To adapt the County's "street calming" approach to street naming, the Task Force could, at "Step 1", undertake the consultation with the citizenry to determine if the Task Force should study a renaming for the subject highway sections. If "Step 1" indicates that renaming should be studied, then "Step 2" proceeds and the Task Force steps in to do that. At "Step 3", the Task Force would present its findings, its recommendations to the community on if/how to choose and implement a new

name, and, then, proceed with obtaining concurrence from the affected property owners, etc., through the following Steps 4 and 5.






